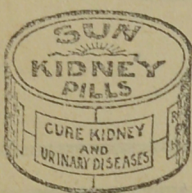

THE UNFIT HOUSEKEEPER.

Causes for Rejection of Immigrants to Canada.

The Jewish Seem to be the Least Healthy of the Races Seeking Admission.

Ottawa, Feb. 13.—During the fiscal year ending June 30th last the steamship companies running to Canadian ports carried 99,741 immigrants. Of this number 1,825, being 1,420 males and 405 females, were detained for medical treatment. Two hundred and seventy persons were deported as diseased or undesirable immigrants. The ratio of persons detained to total was 1 in 47. The ratio of deported to the total was 1 in 416. Tables of statistics setting forth in detail the nationality, disease and disposition made of the immigrants detained or deported, are embodied in the annual report of Dr. P. H. Bryce, Chief Medical Inspector for Canada. From the table of nationality it appears that very few natives of the British Isles were detained. "It naturally follows," Dr. Bryce observes, "that those steamship lines which sail from continental ports and those which carried most continentals from British ports are those having the largest number of detained or deported passengers. But one exception seems to exist in the general agreement of the ratio in the number detained to the number deported. This is in the Hamburg-American boats, whose ratio of deported to those detained was relatively very low, and was due to the fact that this line especially carried the Galicians, who were seldom deported for general physical unfitness, but were detained for treatment of trachoma or other curable malady.

"Remarkably few indeed of English speaking people were detained, only 35 out of 50,374; while of the group of Syrians and allied races from southern Europe and Asia, 159 were detained out of a total of 510. Of the peoples from northern Europe the Russian group show by far the largest number of detentions, there having been 624 in a total of 1,955. These figures as indicating a special prevalence of disease in Russians are misleading, since it is found that the large proportion of those detained in hospital as seen in the tables of the Quebec Immigration Hospital, are Jewish people speaking Russian. As there were 5,247 Russian Jews recorded on the shipping manifests, it is evident that the hospital returns have in many instances given patients as Russian instead of Russian Jews. There was a very considerable number of Galicians detained, 327 in 7,729, proportionately more than of Italians, of whom 110 in 4,445 were detained. The ratios of nationalities detained were:—British immigrants detained, 1 in 1,325 persons; Italians 1 in 40 persons; Russian and Russian Jews, 1 in 11.6 persons; Syrians and allied races, 1 in 3.4 persons.

"The one special cause of detention was trachoma, or the chronic form of ophthalmia, prevalent among the poorer classes of the races referred to.

"Other diseases for which persons were detained are few. It is evident that there are diseases, such as epilepsy, insanity, incipient tuberculosis, all of the greatest importance, yet of which cases, in the necessarily rapid examination of the hundreds coming off a vessel, will not infrequently pass unrecognized. That there are not more of these would seem to show that care has been exercised in the selection of those emigrants given passage by the steamship companies."

Little Girls' Hard Lot in China.

After the marriage in China girls have no part with their own family and no part in the worship of their ancestors. To have no son means no ancestral worship, and the girl is often sold as a daughter-in-law. Poor people buy their sons' wives when they are but babies, as they can be had then for a few dollars. These little ones are usually drudges in the mother-in-law's household.

A missionary overheard two women conversing. One said: "I am going to get a daughter-in-law into the house. You see, a daughter-in-law is no more expense than a servant. If I curse or beat a servant she leaves, but you can beat a daughter-in-law and get obedience, and your work will be done as you wish it." The other replied: "Just so, just so. I am thinking of getting a daughter-in-law too. I can then live at ease." As a consequence of this custom little girls look forward not to betrothal or to marriage, but to becoming mothers-in-law, when they in turn can have authority.—Good Housekeeping.
