

WAR AND STRIKE.

Russians Continue Bombardment of Japanese Position.

SUNDAY WAS QUIET IN THE GREAT STRIKE CENTRES.

The Dead and Wounded at Lodz Poland.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Feb. 13.—A telegram from Sachetun says:—General Kaulber, commander of the third Manchurian army has taken over the command of the second Manchurian army, vacated by Gen. Gripenberg. London, Feb. 13.—The Times prints a statement that the Hamburg-American Steamship Co.'s steamships Deutschland and Hamburg are to be sold to Russia for \$3,500,000 and \$3,000,000 respectively. Tokio, Feb. 13.—The Russians continued to bombard portions of Field Marshal Oyama's centre and right, Saturday.

The Russians continue the construction of defensive works to the southwest of Hentapan, where they are erecting an emplacement for a battery of 24 guns. The Japanese recently surrounded a Russian cavalry detachment near Hsinchang, killing three and wounding seven. St. Petersburg, Feb. 3.—Quiet continues in the city. The Putiloff Iron Works and other works are still idle. Warsaw, Feb. 13.—Advices from Lodz say that a number of men resumed work this morning, but after a couple of hours again walked out. The town is quiet. It is semi-officially announced that as a result of the disturbances at Lodz, one hundred and forty-four bodies have been buried and two hundred wounded persons are still in the hospitals.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 13.—The admiralty confirms the statement that Admiral Nebogatof's division of the Russian third Pacific squadron will sail from Libau at the end of the week. Mukden, Feb. 13.—During the last few days the movement of large bodies of Japanese have been observed on the Russian right flank, where the presence of part of Gen. Nogi's army has been established. The Japanese are energetically fortifying the villages of Vandzyanov, Yatzipao and Milandau, southward of Sandepas, and also the districts of Toutotzi, Tzutsahedzi and Huan-tai, on the right bank of the Hun river. Tokio, Feb. 13.—The Japanese captured an eminence south of Chang-chichia on Thursday morning, Feb. 9, driving off two companies of Russian infantry. The Russians have continued shelling Field Marshal Oyama's centre and left since Thursday last. The Russian dead who were buried after the battle of Heikoutai totalled 2,000. The Japanese on that occasion captured 2,000 rifles.

ICE BROKE UP. And a Dorchester Schooner Went Ashore.

Vineyard Haven, Mass., Feb. 13.—The expected break up of the great ice field at the head of the harbor, in which nine vessels have been held fast for more than two weeks, came at one o'clock this morning, when a portion of the field broke away and carried the British schooner Greta ashore and demolished all the wharves on the west side of the harbor with the exception of the steamboat wharf. The Greta grounded on sandy bottom and was not leaking an hour after she went ashore. The Greta is owned in Dorchester, N. B., and is bound from New Haven to St. John N. B. At 2 o'clock this morning eight schooners were still held in the ice.

BITS OF NEWS.

The Kansas legislature has passed the equal suffrage bill granting women the right to vote for presidential electors in Kansas. W. R. Betty, a former M. P. P. for Parry Sound, Ontario, was recently burned to death in a British Columbia lumber camp. During a hockey match at Pembroke, Ontario, Friday, Robert Fraser, aged 16, fell on the ice and broke his neck. He died instantly. James Black, an I. C. R. employe, was instantly killed at Campbellton Saturday, by falling under a moving train. Black leaves a wife and large family of small children. He belonged to Newcastle. The Knox Presbyterian Church at St. Marys, Ontario, including the new pipe organ, only installed a few weeks ago, was totally destroyed by fire Sunday morning. Loss, twenty thousand; insurance eight thousand. Louis V. King of Toronto, fourth year student of the faculty of arts of McGill University, has been selected for the scholarship of Christ College, Cambridge, which is worth £90 yearly for three years. The selection is not competitive, but is made by the governors. W. D. McCallum, for many years town clerk of Truro, has resigned. There were ten applications for the position at salaries ranging from \$1-300 down. Harry G. McDougall, of Sydney, a native of Truro, once in the Truro post office staff, received the appointment at \$1,000.

While looking through the effects of the late John T. Oxell, who prior to his death conducted a small tobacco and stationery store at Gallitzan, Pa., the administrators of his estate came upon a tin box in a small safe which contained \$27,000 in gold. Further search revealed \$13,000 in bills of large denominations in an old belt he wore, making a total of \$40,000. Jane Boardman, seventy-three years old, a negress, who has received a prize for high scholarship at the Boardman High School, New Haven, is the oldest person ever given a diploma at that institution. The woman, who was once a slave has struggled long to obtain an education, and it was only recently, when a modest competence was settled upon her, that she could gratify her desire. J. Tresidder, father of Violet Tresidder, the five-year-old child who disappeared from her home at Canon City, Colorado, several weeks ago, has received an anonymous letter which states that his daughter will be returned safe and sound for a ransom of \$750, for which she is being held. It is believed the little girl is being held in Canon City by well-known persons. Mr. Tresidder has offered a reward of \$500 for the recovery of his daughter alive.

PARENT CONFIDENT That He Will Yet Win Out in Struggle at Quebec.

Quebec, Feb. 13.—Premier Parent's friends indignantly deny the rumor in circulation here that his resignation will be tendered to the lieutenant governor early next week. He has had an interview with some of the Quebec ministers at Ottawa. Mr. Parent says that he will win out all right. He complains of the absence of Conservative opposition at the general election when the party refused to put up candidates against him. This led to opposition among the Liberals which started the present trouble.

St. John, Feb. 13.—St. John had a big fire this morning. The Lordly building, cor. Germain and Church Streets was burned. The fire originated on the second floor and had a good headway before the firemen arrived. The building was occupied by Jas. Tufts & Son, wholesale toys; A. E. Clarke, photo supplies; W. C. Dunham, the Lordly Furniture Co., and H. E. Gould, florist. There is \$15,000 insurance held by the various tenants. The building was badly gutted.
