The regular monthly meeting of the Victoria Hospital trustees was held yesterday afternoon. Randolph and the secretary, C. A. Sampson.

The audit committee, to whom the accounts of the past year had been referred,

reported that they had carefully examined the same and found them accurate and neatly kept. The accounts showed a balance of some \$300 on the right side of the ledger. A committee was appointed to prepare a statement of the year's transactions for publication.

PARENT GETS TIME.

To Reconstruct His Cabinet Before the Legislature Meets.

Quebec, Feb. 7.—Lieut. Gov. Sir Louis Jette has granted the request made by the cabinet on Saturday for permission to postpone the opening of the legislature called for the 9th inst., until March 2nd, in order to afford the premier time to reconstruct his cabinet and replace three ministers who resigned.

Friends of Hon. Mr. Turgeon state that among the reasons why the lieutenant governor granted Premier Parent's request for postponement was on account of his physical condition.

In respect to the reconstruction of his cabinet the premier said today that he had called a meeting of the government in caucus for Wednesday when he would give them all a voice in the matter of choosing the three ministers to replace Hon. Messrs. Gouin, Turgeon and Weir and also nominate the candidate for the speakership.

Hon. Mr. Parent's friends say that the lieutenant governor's decision is a victory for the premier over his political opponents, but the impression prevails that Mr. Parent's term of office will not be long, that he will, of his own accord, retire from active political life in the course of a few months. His health demands such a course, but he will not be forced out if he can help it.
