

APPEAL FOR PEACE.

St. Petersburg Citizens and Press Urge Government

TO DISCONTINUE A USELESS WAR.

Japs Seize a Dutch Steamer.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

New York, Jan. 17.—A despatch from London quotes the London Times' Russian correspondent, who says a number of citizens of St Petersburg have drawn up an address to the Czar representing the uselessness of the war, urging the government not having proved itself competent to carry the war to a successful issue, should not be allowed to continue to prove their incapacity at the cost of the blood and tears of the nation. The address has been largely signed.

The Liberal paper, Nasha zheza, says: "It is high time that the myriads of men sent to Manchuria should return to the peaceful pursuits of life and Russia resume her normal course."

Advices from St. Petersburg say it has been hinted that the fall of Port Arthur might render Russia more receptive proposals of mediation. The answer of the foreign office on this subject is a negative.

Tokio, Jan. 17.—A Japanese torpedo boat destroyer captured the Dutch steamer Wilhelma, carrying Cardiff coal to Vladivostok in the Tushima straits, Monday, and brought her to Sasebo.

REID ARBITRATION.

Case Finished at Toronto--Handsome Fee for Arbitrators.

Moncton, Jan. 17.—P. S. Archibald, C. E., chairman of the arbitration board in Reid of the Newfoundland Railway Company vs. the Newfoundland Government arrived home this morning from Toronto where the arbitration court sat.

The arbitrators unanimously awarded the Reid Company for the telegraph system expropriated by the Newfoundland government.

Sir Edward Morris, minister of justice in Newfoundland and others engaged in the case, passed through here enroute home.

It is understood the arbitrators, P. S. Archibald of Moncton, chairman, Hon. Edward Blake, M. P. and Donald McMaster, K. C., of Montreal, will receive \$15,000 each for their services.

PARIS SENSATION.

Police Unearth a Financial Swindle—A Baron Arrested.

Paris, Jan. 17.—The police are investigating a great financial swindle connected with the circulation of \$200,000 fictitious shares in the African Mine Company.

The discovery was made when a woman attempted to secure a loan on some shares.

She said she got them from Baron De Chalpeny, who was recently acquitted of the charge of financial irregularities.

The Baron was arrested and the shares found in his house.

MANITOBA BOUNDARIES.

Prairie Province Anxious for More Territory.

Winnipeg, Jan. 17.—A motion to extend the boundaries of Manitoba north to Hudson Bay, westward, including a considerable portion of Assiniboia, and Saskatchewan, passed the local house unanimously last night, and a memorial to this effect will be presented to the Dominion Government.

afternoon, is considering a bill to regulate the speed of autos within the county limits, the rate to be fifteen miles per hour in the country and ten in the city.

SUFFERED BY FIRE.

Cumbertand Farmer Lost His Barn, Live Stock, etc.—No Insurance.

Amherst, N. S., Jan. 17.—Fire broke out this morning in a barn owned by Solomon Nelson at Blair's Lake, two miles from here.

Nelson was eating his breakfast when the blaze was discovered, and being unable to get assistance, the barn was totally destroyed. He also lost 14 cows, 2 horses, and much hay and farming materials, etc. Cause of the fire is unknown. No insurance.

COUNTY AUDITORSHIP.

Contest Has Narrowed Down to H. F. McLeod and F. S. Peters.

The contest for the position of county auditor took a rather unexpected turn this morning, when Mr. W. P. Taylor, who certainly was the pale horse in the race, withdrew his application. Simultaneously with the retirement of Mr. Taylor, Mr. R. B. Hanson entered the field as a dark horse. The other applicants are Messrs. F. S. Peters and H. F. McLeod, both of whom have been pledged a liberal measure of support. Wardean Scott is supporting Mr. Hanson, and this is taken by many as a pretty good indication that Mr. Hanson will get the job. The majority of the municipal councillors are Conservatives, and Mr. McLeod, who has always been a valiant fighter for the party, will naturally feel disappointed if his claims are passed over by the council.

All of the applicants are canvassing hard and the result of the contest is awaited with considerable interest.

A number of the councillors are for continuing Mr. McCreedy in office, but it is said that he will not ask for reappointment.

It is reported that Mr. Taylor has accepted a position with a law firm in western Canada and will remove from the city in the near future.

Later.—Mr. Hanson retired from the contest this afternoon, having been discovered that he was ineligible not being a ratepayer of the county. The appointment will be made at eleven o'clock tomorrow morning. The last of applicants have dwindled down to Messrs. H. F. McLeod and F. S. Peters.
