

A SPY'S TRIAL.

Portuguese Charged With Disclosing Secrets to Russians.

NEW COMMANDER AT PORT ARTHUR.

Bullets Fired at the Russian Emperor.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

St. Petersburg, Jan. 19.—The annual ceremony of blessing the waters in front of the winter palace, was performed by Emperor Nicholas this morning.

During the ceremony several shots were fired from across the Nava, the bullets entering the windows of the palace. Nobody was hurt.

Tokio, Jan. 19.—It is considered probable that Major General Ijichi, of General Nohi's chief staff, will be appointed commander of Port Arthur.

The Japanese captured the British steamer Oakley in Tushima straits Wednesday afternoon. The vessel left Cardiff November 17, carrying 5,900 tons of coal for Vladivostok. She was brought to Sasebo.

Yokohama, Jan. 19.—H. B. Collins, a Portuguese, for a long time a resident of Japan, was tried today, charged with disclosing military secrets.

The evidence shows that he visited Port Arthur and Tien Tsin last year and received a thousand yen from Generals Ogorodinkoff and Dessino by private cipher, that he might transmit information.

Last October Collins wrote from Yokohama detailing in a despatch about Japanese troops, giving their number, their destination and their purpose to Gen. Dessino. The letter was stopped at Nagasaki.

IMPORTANT CAPTURE.

Prominent Windsor Man Arrested for Smuggling Chinese.

Windsor, Ont., Jan. 19.—Alex. Forbes, a Forester, and a prominent man of high social standing, was arrested this morning by U. S. officers, charged with smuggling Chinese into the States.

The police believe the capture is important, and say they have proof that the prisoner is head of a gang conducting extensive smuggling operations.

Severe Storm.

St. John, Jan. 19.—A heavy wind storm with snow prevailed here today. The street car service is demoralized and there is a high tide in the harbor. A coal laden barge was sunk at North Wharf.

Considerable anxiety is felt over vessels that are out. Quite a number are due here and should be somewhere on the coast.

Last Sad Rites.

St. John, Jan. 19.—The funeral of the late David Brown, who died at the Queen Hotel, Fredericton, was held this afternoon. Rev. G. M. Campbell and Rev. Mr. Motheringham conducted the service, and the funeral was largely attended. Interment was made at the rural cemetery.

Sugar Advanced.

St. John, Jan. 19.—Advices received this morning from New York show that the sugar refineries have advanced the price 1 cent per cwt. Halifax followed with a similar advance. The jobbing price is now \$5.90 per cwt.

SISTER ST. BRIDGET'S DEATH.

Deceased Lady Was a Member of a Well Known and Respected Fredericton Family.

Sister St. Bridget of Charity departed this life on Sunday last at the Convent of the Sisters of Charity, Quebec, in about the 40th year of her profession.

The deceased was a daughter of the late Timothy O'Connor of this city, so long and prominently identified with the management of the crown lands of this Province, and was his second child; Rev. Arthur O'Connor, late of Wisconsin, whose demise we announced last summer, being the eldest. Two brothers, Mr. T. G. O'Connor of this city, and ex-Consul Chas. A. O'Connor of Manchester, N. H., and two sisters, Mrs. E. A. Wood of Waterbury, Conn., and Miss Francis C. O'Connor of this city, survive her. Miss O'Connor left for Quebec Tuesday night to attend the funeral services which took place this morning.

The family has not yet received full particulars of Sister St. Bridget's death, further than that it was calm and peaceful. She fell asleep sweetly in the Lord after a prolonged illness and with the fullest resignation.

Sister St. Bridget was a devoted and most active member of that busy army of over 650 heroines who, forsaking home and kindred for their Lord, care for the wants, spiritual and temporal, of over 8000 of their fellow creatures in Quebec city and its missions, doing a work of charity the extent of which will never be known this side of the grave.

Sister St. Bridget was known and beloved by all the community. Active, cheerful and indefatigable, no good work daunted her. Caring for the sick in their fine hospital, as a teacher in the academy, as a collector from friends all over the continent of specimens of minerals and animals and preparing them with her own hands for the Sisters' fine museum which we believe she herself chiefly established and which was opened with fitting eclat by His Eminence the late Cardinal Taschereau, or in the work she especially loved, administering to the poor of the district confided to her care, by whom she was loved and respected, she was ever the same cheerful, devoted, untiring worker, wise counselor and sympathizing friend.

AN ESTIMATE OF DARWIN.

Famous Thinker Was a Sweet-Natured, Quiet Country Gentleman.

Sir Leslie Stephen, in the last instalment of his "Reminiscences" in The Atlantic Monthly, expresses a high opinion of Darwin, whom he knew personally. He says:

"I had the privilege of seeing something of Darwin in his later years. To me, and my opinion was not exceptional, he appeared to be simply the most lovable person whom I ever encountered. A little party of us used at one time to take long Sunday tramps in the neighborhood of London. Those were days to be marked with a white stone when Darwin received us at the famous house at Down. It is in the quiet region of chalk downs, which had been left untouched in the gaps of the network of railways; and still looked as rural as it had a century earlier. One could expect to meet the old smugglers whose paths from the coast to London were laid through the unfrequented district. There Darwin found an admirable retreat for contemplating flowers and bees and worms, and for slowly elaborating the thoughts which had revolutionized science. He was as free from pretensions as if his investigations had no more claims to respect than those of a commonplace pigeon-fancier. The simplicity of the man was evident in the delightful easy terms in which he lived with a family which was worthy of his affection. I could sympathize with the young German who burst into tears on leaving the house, touched by the contrast between the famous thinker and the sweet-natured, quiet country gentleman, so free from the pedantry which sometimes haunts the professor's chair."

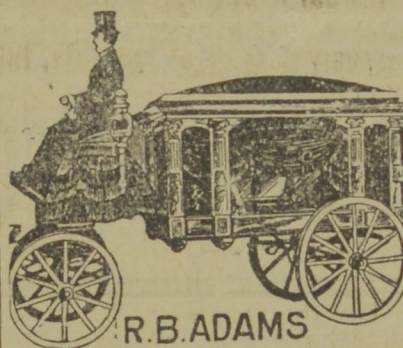
