FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

Guy Peppers Home Again After an
Absence of Four Years.

Mr. Guy Peppers, who has been in South Africa for the past four years, arrived home quite unexpectedly on the noon train today and gave his friends quite a surprise. He is here on a visit to his mother, Mrs. James Peppers, King street, and will probably remain about a month. Mr. Peppers went to South Africa with a draft for the constabulary at the close of the war, and saw two years of pretty hard service. He purchased his discharge from the corps and engaged in the drug business in Capetown, having previously served an apprenticeship with Hunt & McDonald of this city. He afterwards tried his hand at farming for a time near Springfontein.

Mr. Peppers started for home early in the year and came by way of Australia and Vancouver, thus completing the circuit of the globe. He spent about a month in the Antipodes, visiting Sydney, Brisbane and other cities in Australia and Tasmania, and then took passage for Vancouver, stopping at Honolulu and Fiji while en route. He is a trifle sunburned as the result of his long journey, but is in the enjoyment of good health.

Mr. Peppers has a very high opinion of South Africa, and his intention is to return to that country in the course of a few weeks.

Asked in regard to other Fredericton boys who served in the constabulary, he said that all of them had severed their connection with the corps. John Wandlass had married, and settled in Durban and Archie McAdam had also located in that place. Arthur Limerick and William Block have left the country, the former being now in Boston and the latter in the Klondike.

NEW DEFENCE LINE.

Two Witnesses who Drank Eight
Quarts of Beer to Show it was
Not Intoxicating.

Moncton, May 18.—In a couple of beer Scott Act cases in the police court yesterday a novel form of defence was introduced. The proprietors of the restaurants charged with Scott Act violation alleged that the hop beer that they sell is not intoxicating and in support of this contention yesterday afternoon introduced

ed two subjects who had been filled up with beer before coming to court to prove that the beverage produced no alcoholic effect.

The young men swore that they had been furnished with free beer by the defendant to prove that it was not intoxicating and inside of five hours had drank seventeen large glasses or nearly equal to eight quarts. The condition of the witnesses and their testimony did not convince the court that the sale of beer was not a violation of the law and the usual fine of \$50 was imposed.

A TRURO SUICIDE.

Young Married Woman Drowned Herself in Reservoir.

Truro, N. S., May 18.—(Special)—Mrs. Wm. Reid, twenty-four years of age, committed suicide this morning by drowning in the reservoir.

She was temporarily insane and leaves a husband and one child three years old.

WINNIPEG'S GROWTH.

Prairie City Making Great Strides in Wealth and Population.

Winnipeg, May 18.—(Special)—At last night's meeting of the city council the most interesting event was the reading of the report of the Assessment Commissioner, which showed the total realty assessment for the city to be \$53,714,430, a net increase over last year of \$12,607,560.

The population of the city is placed at 79,975, a gain of nearly 13,000 over last year.

MEETING OF FIRE COMMITTEE.

Contract for Hose to be Divided Between Two Concerns.

The fire committee of the city council held a meeting last evening, and decided to recommend the purchase of 250 feet of Premier hose from the Gutta Percha and Rubber Company for 80 cents per foot, and 250 feet of Keystone hose from the Canadian Rubber Company at 85 cents.

Those present at the meeting were Mayor McNally in the chair, Aids, Chestnut, Hanlon, Edwards and Mitchell, and Messrs. W. L. Ogle of St. John, representing the Gutta Percha and Rubber Company, and Warren Libbey, F.B. Edgecombe, and L. W. Bailey, agents for the Canadian Rubber Company, and Chief Engineer Rutter.

A number of samples of the different lines of hose on the market were spread out on the table before the committee, and about an hour was taken up in a discussion of their merits and demerits.

Mr. Libbey was first called upon and gave some information in regard to the varieties of hose sold by his concern. He dwelt particularly upon the virtues of Keystone hose, which he unhesitatingly pronounced the best on the market. He informed the committee that no less than 42,000 feet of this hose was in use in the city of Montreal. The company was ready to deliver it here at 85 cents per foot, freight charges paid, and guaranteed it for three years.

Mr. Ogle, next addressed the committee on behalf of his company. He said he had been selling hose in this city for the past twenty-six years, and he had yet to hear of a complaint. He also sold in a number of other Maritime Province towns, and the hose supplied by his concern always gave the best of satisfaction. He was ready to supply hose that

would stand a 400 pound pressure, and would be guaranteed for three years. Mr. Ogle read a number of testimonials in praise of the product of his concern.

Mr. Edgecombe also made a few remarks along the same lines as Mr. Libbey, after which the delegation withdrew.

Ald. Edwards wanted the committee to delay making the purchase for two weeks, and in the meantime have the chief correspond with other towns and cities and secure further information.

Ald. Hanlon saw no reason why the committee could not dispose of the question.

Chief Rutter being asked for his opinion said that he had had no experience with Keystone hose and but little with Paragon.

After some further discussion the committee decided to divide the order as stated above.

The average price to be paid is 82½ cents per foot, which is 12½ cents per foot less than was paid for hose one year ago.

Before the committee separated Ald. Hanlon wanted to know how it came that the meeting was held in the council chamber instead of in the committee room.

Ald. Chestnut stated that so far as he was aware the custom had always been to have meetings public where delegations were to be heard.

The mayor said that the matter was one for the discretion of the chairman.

Ald. Hanlon said that as chairman of the city hall committee, he would always have the meetings open to the press and public.

Chief Rutter was appointed to act with City Treasurer Golding in the purchase of a horse for the fire department.

COTTON MILL STRIKE.

Weavers at Windsor Walked Out and Mill is Closed

Windsor, N. S., May 18.—(Special)

—Weavers in the Windsor cotton mill have been on strike since Monday.

They have been working for 48 cents, a cut of 130 yards. Monday morning the company decided to re-

duce the figure to 45 cents.

The weavers refused the reduction and went out and as a consequence the mill closed down yesterday afternoon.

About 250 people are affected.

MINES CONSOLIDATION.

Properties in British Columbia Likely to Come Under Joint Management.

Winnipeg, May 18.—(Special)—Regarding the proposition to consolidate British Columbia mines, a meeting was held at the Empire Hotel, Winnipeg, between representatives of the principal mines.

There were present representatives of Leroy and Snowshoe, War Eagle and Centre Star interests, and Prof. W. R. Brock, who had been agreed upon to value the mining properties.

Prof. Brock submitted valuations, and amalgamation will be recommended.

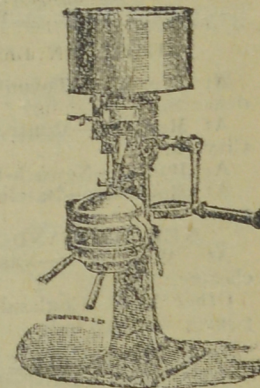

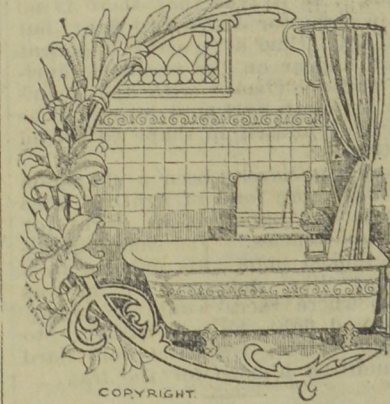
