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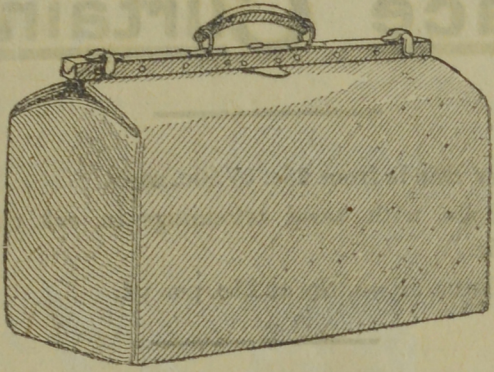

NOW HE IS JUDGE LONGLEY.

Attorney General of Nova Scotia Appointed to Supreme Court Bench of that Province.

A SHORT SKETCH OF HIS CAREER.

Ottawa June 12.—(Special)—Hon. J. Wilberforce Longley, attorney general of Nova Scotia, has been appointed to the supreme court bench of that province.

(Judge Longley is a native of Paradise, Annapolis Co., N. S., and was educated there and at Acadia College, where he graduated B. A. in 1871, and M. A. in 1875. He studied law and was called to the bar of Nova Scotia in 1875, and appointed Q. C. in 1890. For fourteen years he was chief editorial writer of the Halifax Daily Recorder,

has contributed largely to magazines, and is the author of "Love," and a Biography of Hon. Joseph Howe. He was elected to the Nova Scotia Assembly for Annapolis in 1882, and has represented that county ever since. In 1884 he became a member of the Fielding government without portfolio, becoming attorney general in 1886, and continuing in that position ever since. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the Commons of Annapolis in 1896. He is 56 years old.)

PROMISING FOR PEACE.

Russia Has Agreed to a Meeting of Plenipotentiaries to Discuss a Basis for Negotiations.

St. Petersburg, June 12.—(Special)—All attempts to create the impression that there is the slightest hitch in the preliminary negotiations for peace are absolutely without foundation.

Foreign Minister Lamsdorff has formally notified several of the continental powers that a meeting of plenipotentiaries to see whether it is possible to agree to terms of peace is assured.

Russia's official reply is now on its way to Washington. Foreign Minister Lamsdorff transmitted it to Ambassador Meyer, and the later

Ambassador had an interview with the foreign minister at the foreign office.

M. Witte, president of the committee of ministers is leaving St. Petersburg for the east in two weeks. This is a very significant announcement, coupled with the statement that he is going on "public business."

His visit was instantly associated with peace negotiations and possibly Emperor Nicholas decided, if a reasonable basis for negotiations is offered by Japan, to make use of the services of the ablest and strongest personality in the empire.

REVENUE BUOYANT.

Returns to May 31 Show Substantial Increase—Prefontaine's Tour.

Ottawa, June 12.—(Special)—The Dominion revenue for the fiscal year to May, totals \$68,324,329, an increase of \$606,212 over the corresponding period of the previous year. In May alone the revenue increased \$204,416.

The minister of marine has made arrangements to set out on a tour of inspection of all ports and important aids of navigation in the maritime provinces, with a view to seeing what already has been accomplished, and ascertaining where further improvements are required. The tour will probably commence as soon as the parliamentary session concludes.

ALIEN LABOR ACT.

Cape Breton Electric Company Convicted of Violation.

Sydney, N. S., June 12.—(Special)—The Cape Breton Electric Co. was convicted in the lower court today of violating the alien labor laws of Canada, and fined \$200.

Stone and Bubbler of Boston, are managing directors of the company, and the violation complained of was the employment under contract in Boston, of A. F. Townsend, as electrical superintendent of the road at Sydney.

DROWNED IN A WELL.

Keldon, Ont., June 12.—(Special)—John Miller, while drawing water from a three foot well lost his balance and falling in head first, was drowned in a few inches of water. He was unmarried.

A MUCH NEEDED IMPROVEMENT.

Another step has been taken by the city council towards providing for the safety of the citizens of Fredericton who attend performances in

the Opera House. During the week last fire escapes have been erected on either side of the building coming down from the central windows of the theatre. This is a much-needed improvement and greatly lessens the danger which a fire would cause. Four exits are now provided in case of a panic of any sort, and if more improvements such as these are added from time to time the building will soon be in a fair way towards being safe from accidents.

LOCAL IMPROVEMENT.

To the Editor of The Herald:

Sir,—I live in the back part of the city and came here some years ago from St. John; and passing through the old burying ground I noticed heaps of earth on the upper side of the grounds, and, seeing a gentleman directing a teamster where to put it, I asked him a good many questions. He informed me that the Local Improvement Association was doing the work, and intended to cover up the lime, broken stone and earth with good earth, levelling it and seeding it down and making it look like a lawn. I was very much pleased, as I had noticed ever since I came here to live, the water that always laid there, and it looked more like a pond than a place for our respected dead. I have always taken a great interest in the Improvement Association, and they deserve more consideration from the public than they get.

I have watched the improvement from year to year, and more especially this year, the streets and gutters have had more attention than usual; it seems to me that a wave of civic betterment is sweeping over the whole city, and efforts are being made not only to preserve the natural beauty that we already possess, but also to make two roses bloom where only one bloomed before. I am a poor woman comparatively, and have the disposition to help in the means. I do hope my sex will think over the matter, and see how they can help these men, who are struggling to beautify this beautiful city.

PRESBYTERIAN GEN. ASSEMBLY.

Business Transacted at Saturday's Session.

Kingston, Ont., June 11.—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian church at a short session Saturday, considered the reports of the Ottawa, Ladies College and foreign missions. Sanction was given a recommendation that the salary of the secretary Dr. McKay, be increased from \$2,000 to \$2,400.

The assembly completed its examination upon its fund for aged and infirm ministers, one hundred and fifteen ministers infirm, or over the age of seventy, are drawing annually, allowances ranging from \$200 upwards, according to length of service.

Permission was given for the appointment of an agent to assist the convenor in increasing the endowment and in awakening a deeper interest in the fund. The aim is to secure an endowment of \$500,000.

HOUSE HAS NEW SPEAKER.

London, June 8.—James William Lowther, Conservative, deputy speaker and chairman of the committee on ways and means, was unanimously elected speaker of the House of Commons this afternoon in succession to William Court Gully, who recently resigned. This is the first time since 1833 that the Conservatives have been able to put one of their own party in the chair. After the election the house adjourned at 4 June 20.

Right Hon. James William Lowther was born on April 1, 1855, being the eldest son of Hon. William Lowther, for twenty-five years M. P. for Westmorland, and Alice, third daughter of Baron Wensleydale. He was educated at Eton, King's College, London, and Trinity College, Cambridge, and took honors in the Cambridge Classical and Law Tripos. In 1879 he was called to the bar, and entered parliament for Bedford in 1883.

In 1886 he successfully contested Penrith, Cumberland, and has represented that constituency ever since. In 1891 he became Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, was the representative of Great Britain at the international congress at Venice in 1892, and since that time has been chairman of the Parliamentary Committee of Ways and Means, and Deputy Speaker.

He married in 1886 Mary Frances, youngest daughter of the late Right Hon. A. J. B. Beresford Hope, of
