

SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

Nineteenth Annual Session to be Held at Yarmouth, N.S.

The nineteenth annual session of the School of Science for Atlantic provinces will be held at Yarmouth, N. S., from July 11th to 28th, 1905. Some idea of the magnitude of the work done by this school and its increasing popularity may be gathered from the fact that for the last twelve years, the average attendance has been 160 students, with a staff of ten or twelve regular lecturers each year. The school at Yarmouth this year promises to surpass all previous years both in points of numbers and excellence of equipments and provisions made for carrying on the work.

The magnificent new academy with its splendid outfit, supplemented by the extra equipment of the school, will be at the disposal of the students.

The teaching staff is made up of the best men from the three provinces and will include:

Botany—G. U. Hay, Ph. D., St. John, N. B.
Chemistry and Mineralogy—W. W. Andrews, L.L.D., Mount Allison University, Sackville.
Drawing and Manual Training—F. G. Matthews, Truro, N. S.
Geology—L. W. Bailey, University of N. B., Fredericton.
Literature (English)—Miss Eleanor Robinson, St. John.
Physics—J. E. Barteaux, Academy, Truro.
Physiology and Hygiene—George D. Turnbull, M. D., C. M., Truro.
Zoology—G. J. Oulton, M. A., Moncton, N. B.; G. W. Bailey, Fredericton, N. B., Assistant Instructor.

Additional instructions will be associated with these in the different departments where enrolment is large enough to require it or where students elect to take different departments of the same subject.

Among those who will take part evening lectures and round table

talks will be Principal Solano, Normal School, Truro; Dr. Hall, Truro; Dr. Mackay, Dalhousie College; several of the District Inspectors, with two or three special lecturers not yet arranged for.

The course for study will include Physics, Chemistry, Geology, Mineralogy, Botany, Zoology, Physiology, Entomology, Literature, Drawing. The work will be of the most practical nature possible, conducted by means of experiments, lessons and practical discussions in which teachers will have an opportunity of observing the best methods of conducting classes, and of gaining help with those difficulties which so often confront them in their school room.

Yarmouth is one of the most delightful summer resorts in the province and is an ideal spot in which to spend a few weeks. A number of special excursions have been arranged to places of interest in which the school will take part as a whole. In fact, in addition to the beauties of Yarmouth itself, one can scarcely go a mile from the town in any direction, without meeting with some charming piece of natural scenery, while within a radius of a few miles are several flourishing villages all of them ideal places for outings.

Arrangements have been made with the different lines of travel for excursion tickets at one fare provided a "standard certificate" is asked for when purchasing ticket. Good board can be obtained at reasonable rates if early application is made to Geo. D. Blackader, Yarmouth.

Teachers who wish may bring friends with them and the privileges of the school will be extended to them on the same terms as regular teachers.

GRAFT FOR LIFE.

Boy Giving of His Own Skin to Save His Sister.

UNIQUE SURGICAL OPERATION.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 10.—(Special.)—Tightly bound with leather straps, almost covering his whole body, to prevent the slightest motion, Edward Ickel, a thirteen-year-old boy, began his long ordeal in the remarkable grafting operation to supply skin to the chin of his half sister, Lydia Finnegan, who was severely burned in an accident almost a year ago.

This unique operation began at the Methodist Hospital, and the physi-

cians say it will be a week or 10 days before the children can be liberated from their cramped positions and relieved of the tremendous strain which they must undergo.

During the time when the flap skin on the arm of the boy is adhering to the chin of his sister, the slightest movement of either patient may cause the operation to be unsuccessful, and during the nights, when there is the possibility of the children attempting to change their positions, while asleep, nurses will be on the watch to prevent this.

Drs. Stallery and Robert, who have charge of the operation, say that owing to the great strain but one or two cases like this have ever been successful, and these were with grown people.

A LUMBERMAN'S VIEW.

Product of the Miramichi Mills May Come to St. John For Shipment.

(St. John Globe.)

A prominent lumberman, talking with The Globe, gave it as his opinion that the building of the Grand Trunk Pacific will give a great boom to the lumber shipping business through the port of St. John. In the opinion of this gentleman the route selected will be that through the centre of the province to Chipman, and thence to Moncton. This line will go through some of the finest timber lands on the Tobique and the head waters of the Miramichi, and will open up timber lands that have never yet been reached by the woodsman.

The lumberman said it was his opinion that the operators on the head waters of the Miramichi would erect mills along the line of railway and ship their manufactured product to St. John by rail instead of driving down the Miramichi. The advantage would be that they would have an open port all the year round from which to make shipments. Now there is only about seven months in which vessels can reach the Miramichi ports.

St. John will be as good a port as

any on the Miramichi for the shipment of merchantable lumber and better far the sale of laths, etc., while it will also afford a market for birch, which cannot now be shipped from the Miramichi.

In the view of this lumberman the whole lumber business of the Upper Miramichi will come to St. John over the new line, and he said he would not be surprised if Tobique lumber also came here by rail from mills on the head waters.

If this prediction should prove correct there will be a large increase in the yearly lumber shipments from St. John, and more work for our lumber dealers, laborers, etc., all of which means growth and development for St. John.

The Cryptic Inscription That Ornamented a Swiss Church.

Dedicated to St. Theodore, this church was built in 1726 on the site of an ancient chapel. The tower, with its unique pierced crown, carries a gilt statuette of the patron saint, a quaint old clock and the following cryptic inscription, which has puzzled many travelers:

HOC SAN CHRIS DULCE LA

By taking the syllables above and below with those in the middle it reads:

which may be freely rendered:
