DEATH OF MR. J. PHILLIPS.

One of Fredericton's Most Esteemed Residents Passed Away.

A LONG AND USEFUL CARER.

The death occurred last evening shortly before nine o'clock, of Mr. Joseph Phillips, at his home on the corner of Regent and George streets. Deceased, who was in the eighty-first year of his age, was born at Rustiaomish, and later on moved to this city.

During the early part of his life he taught school at Keswick for a number of years. Coming to Fredericton he engaged in the hotel business, and was at different times proprietor of the York and Queen hotels and Braxley House.

Mr. Phillips had the distinction of being the joint owner of the Queen Hotel at the time of its opening. During all his experience in this work Mr. Phillips was known everywhere for his hospitality, cordiality, and upright dealing.

Leaving the hotel proprietorship he was for some years connected with running the stage between this city and Woodstock. During the last few years of his life he has held the position of janitor of the county court house and court crier at which occupation he worked until the time of his illness.

During all his life Mr. Phillips has taken an active interest in public affairs and has won the respect of the community.

Out of a family of five brothers and four sisters, but one brother, Mr. Thomas Phillips and one sister, Mrs. John Nevins, both of Rustiaomish, survive.

He leaves one son, Mr. Bedford Phillips, of the Post Office staff, and one daughter, Miss Ida Phillips, who resides at home.

The greatest sympathy is felt for the bereaved family in their affliction. The funeral will probably be held on Tuesday afternoon, at an hour to be announced later.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon with service at the house at 3 p. m., by Rev. J. H. McDonald, interment at Forest Hill cemetery.

DEATH OF DR. ROBERTS.

Sad News Received Here Yesterday from the West.

DECEASED A BROTHER OF REV. DR. ROBERTS AND U. N. B. GRAD.

Word was received here yesterday morning of the death of Dr. J. C. E. Roberts, brother of Canon Roberts of this city.

His death occurred in Alberta, Northwest Territory, where he has been living for the past year.

Dr. Roberts and family spent a few days in this city last summer while on their way to their home in the west. Deceased, who was sixty-nine years of age, was very well known here, and the deepest sympathy will be felt for his sorrowing family and relatives.

Dr. Roberts leaves a wife and three daughters in Alberta, two of whom are married and settled in that place.

He also leaves one brother, Canon Roberts of this city, and three sisters, Mrs. John Robinson and Mrs. Sterling Brannen of this city, and Mrs. Howard, who resides in the west.

Dr. Roberts was a graduate of the University of New Brunswick, taking his degree of B. A. in 1859. Later he studied at McGill, taking his degree as M. D., and for a few years he practiced at Oak Point. Then he removed to Dorchester, where he lived for some years.

While still a young man he removed to Jamaica, where he lived for twenty-five years.

Last year he moved to the west, where his death occurred.

Dr. Roberts was a gentleman of the highest standing, of a kind and genial disposition, and of an upright and honorable character. As a doctor he reached a high standard and his place will be indeed hard to fill in more ways than one.

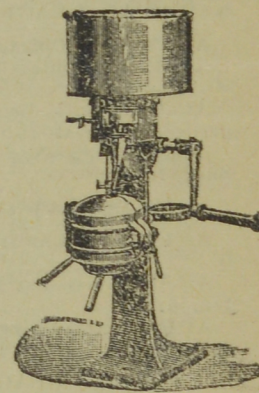
