THE TURF.

New York, June 9.—James Todhunter Sloan, at one time the best jockey in America and England, is in this city looking for reinstatement from the English and American Jockey Club stewards.

Tod was at the Gravesend track yesterday. He had just arrived from the West, where he rode Edward Corrigan's horses with indifferent success. He was not the debonair Tod of former years, but meek and penitent, asking only for a chance to make amends for any mistakes he may have made in the past. Straitened finances caused his change. He said:

"I am anxious to secure a license here and ride in the East. I was not under contract with Edward Corrigan in the West. I accepted fifteen mounts from him, six of which I landed winners. I did that to tide me over some little financial difficulties. For four years I have been under the ban of the English Jockey Club and it was necessary for me to go to work if I did not want to starve."

"I think I have been punished sufficiently for whatever I may have done. There never was any charge of fraud against me abroad or in this country. For some reasons, which I have never been able to understand, the English Jockey Club stewards took away my license. Since then the Reiff boys, Lester and John, were published in a similar manner, but now they are in good standing. Unlike Lester Reiff I was never ruled off Newmarket Heath."

GOLF.

New York, June 9.—Something unusual in the line of professional golf is promised when the Scots gather at Fox Hills for the first annual all-Easter cten championship.

At a meeting of the Board of Governors of the Fox Hills Club, \$800 was subscribed and in addition to this a subscription list which has been started will account for \$200 more, thus making a thousand dollars, or the largest prize list ever offered in an open golf competition in this country.

Although not decided officially, the plan is to divide the moneys as follows: First, \$400; second, \$200; third \$100; fourth, \$60; fifth, \$40; sixth, \$25. This leaves \$175 to be divided into prizes for a 36-hole handicap on the third day. This handicap would be open to amateurs and professionals who would be paired with each other.

In raising a purse of \$1,000, the Fox Hills Golf Club shows unusual enterprise. It is practically certain that the inducement will serve to bring every player on for the tourney who is eligible. The event will take place the week preceding the national plan championship at Myopia.

The Western open championship bars no one, and the belief is growing among golfers hereabout that the Eastern should be conducted along the same broad lines. The first plan was to have it open only to professionals connected with clubs in the metropolitan district. From this a step in advance was agitated by the suggestion of making it an Eastern championship. It is not at all improbable that the bars will be let down entirely before the final conditions are announced and in that event the "pros" would gather from all parts of the United States.

GOLF CHAMPION.

London, June 9.—James Braid, the former British champion, won the open golf championship today with a score of 318.

The third round of the 45th annual tournament for the championship opened at St. Andrews today with only one trans-Atlantic player, Alex. Smith, left in the contest. The others dropped out because they were all more than fifteen strokes behind the leader at the end of the second round. Smith's aggregate for the three rounds was 255. James Braid, the former British champion, was leading with 237.

CARE OF BABIES.

Waltham Health Board Gives Pointers to Mothers.

A MUNICIPAL DEPARTURE.

THREE THREE THREE
A new ally has arisen to aid the president in his war on race suicide. It is the Waltham, Mass. board of health, which, realizing the necessity of proper caring for babies, will, in a few days, send out hundreds of circulars on "How to Feed the Baby," thus gaining for itself the distinction of being the first health board to come officially and in detail to the rescue of the infant.

The circular is prepared by Dr. Samuel P. Strickland, a member of the board, and the object is to give professional advice on the feeding of babies, especially during the warm weather. It reads as follows:

"If you nurse your baby, do not nurse your baby oftener than once in two hours. Do not nurse a baby of more than six months oftener than six times in twenty-four hours. When it is thirsty in the meantime give it cold water."

"If you cannot nurse your baby you cannot bring it up without milk. But the milk (cow's milk) must not be given pure, nor with water. Boil a teaspoonful of barley, ground fine, with a gill of water and a little salt for fifteen minutes, then add half as much milk and a lump of loaf sugar, or give modified milk; give it lukewarm from a nursing bottle. Bottle and mouthpiece are always to be kept in soda water when not in use. Babies of five or six months half barley water and half boiled milk with salt and loaf sugar or modified milk. When the bowels are costive, take farina instead of barley flour. When they are very costive take oatmeal gruel. Strain it before mixing with milk."

When you have but half enough breast milk, use the same food. Give

the food and breast milk alternately. Then your milk can have time to get fit for your baby to take, or feed from bottle days and from the breast nights. You may give beef tea or beef soup mixed with your barley or farina or gruel to babies of five months and older. When ten or twelve months old a piece of rare beefsteak can be given every day to suck on. No child under two years ought to eat from your table. When babies vomit and purge, give nothing to eat and nothing to drink for at least four or six hours, after which give a few drops of essence of peppermint in a teaspoonful of ice water now and then, but no more until you have seen the doctor. Stop giving milk at once. Give no lard, no butter, no paragon, no soothing syrup, no cast. When you see the doctor trust in him and not in the women; they do not know better than you do yourself."

"If the food don't agree: First, baby seems all right out does not gain in weight. Give more food. If still no gain strengthen food in quality. Second, baby is hungry; he sucks his fingers, cries, will not sleep. First increase quality then quantity. Third, baby vomits after food. Too much in quantity or has been jostled too soon after being fed. Fourth, stools. If stools are green, indigestion, inflammation of the bowels. Yellow or white curds with bowel substance, milk is too rich in proteids and should be diluted more. Black or brown, beef juice or medicine may cause this color; they may contain blood. Claylike, white, pasty with a foul odor, chronic indigestion. Fifth, baby vomits sour milk between feedings, may contain too much cream, may have been sour when given, or mixture may be too strong. Sixth, baby has colic after feeding, too much proteids. Dilute. Seventh, when baby is teething, has any fever, or does not feel well the feedings should always be diluted by at least one-fourth the original strength, and in some instances to one-half strength. Eighth, loss of appetite. Diminish strength of food."

The circular closes with six formulas for the modification of cow's milk, adapted to the life of the baby from the third day to the end of the first year.

TO SAVE STEWARD'S LIFE

Big Majestic Hove to in Midocean for Hours.

One of the Ship's Crew Fell Ill, and the Engines Were Stilled While the Surgeon Performed an Operation.

New York, June 10.—(Special.)—The Majestic, in today from Liverpool and Queenstown, reports that for two hours last Tuesday her engines were stopped and that the big ship lay as quietly as the turbulent seas would permit while the surgeon labored to save the life of Arthur Campbell, a second cabin steward.

Campbell had injured himself so severely during a violent attack of sea-sickness that the surgeon had decided that a delicate surgical operation must be performed at once. To obviate as much as possible the tossing and pitching of the steamer on the high seas her engines were stopped during the operation. Campbell was said to be on the road to recovery when the steamer arrived today.

The Majestic had a stormy passage all the way across, and many of her passengers suffered severely from seasickness.

A NEW DEPARTURE.

Department of Education to be Established at Toronto University.

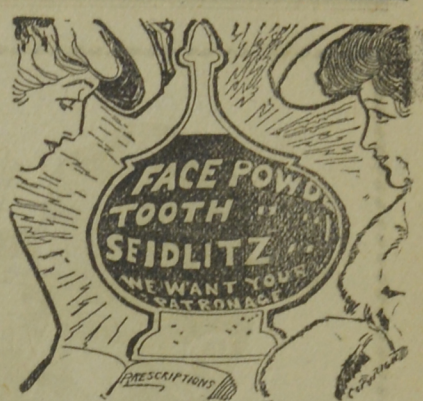
Toronto, June 10.—(Special.)—The senate of the University of Toronto, at its next meeting, will consider, and in all probability pass a statute, establishing a department of education in the faculty of arts, for the instruction of teachers, similar to that carried on at the School of Pedagogy at Hamilton.

This department is being taken on the recommendation of a special committee, which reported at the senate meeting last night. The committee was instructed to draft a statute, which will be referred to the government for approval. The members of the committee are the president, Chancellor Burwash, Professor Burwash, Mr. Mayberry and Vice-Chancellor Ross.

In connection with the department a professor of pedagogy will be appointed, and possibly one or two assistants. Funds for its maintenance will be required from the government.

The move is in the direction of unifying the educational system of the province. It is thought that the University, occupying as it does a position at the summit of the educational system, should play a more active part in the preparation of teachers for the lower grades.

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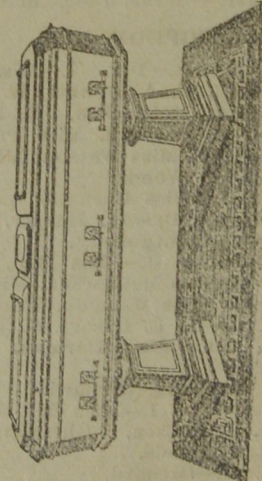
