Sun.—It is understood that Rev. Robert Crisp, of Marysville, N. B., has resigned, and accepted an invitation to go to the Milltown church. It is thought probable that Rev. W. W. Brewer, now on the retired list, will assume active work and succeed Mr. Crisp at Marysville.

BOWLING ALLEYS QUIET.

There were no tournaments or match games at either of the bowling alleys on Saturday. There is some talk of starting another tournament at the Queen Hotel alleys in the near future, after some improvements have been made, but nothing has been done as yet. At the Arctic rink alleys on Saturday some good games were played but no records broken.

THE RICHARDS PROPERTY.

It seems to be the general impression that the sale of the Richards lumbering property to an American syndicate is as good as completed. Messrs. H. H. Gunter and J. A. Rundle, who went to New York on Thursday on business in connection with the matter, are expected home on Tuesday. It is said the purchase price will be close to three quarters of a million.

ANOTHER BALL GAME.

Arrangements have been completed for a game of base ball to be played here next Thursday afternoon between the Portlands of St. John and the Tartars of this city. Both teams are playing first class ball this season, and the game should be very interesting. The Tartars are out to win this year, and they may be relied upon to give a good account of themselves.

TENNIS TOURNAMENT.

The Local Tennis Club are fast getting into shape for their tournament with Rothersey. This match will be held in Fredericton either on July 1st or Labor Day. A letter of invitation has been sent to the Rothersey Club by Mr. C. F. Randolph, the secretary of the Fredericton Tennis Club, but it is not known yet which date will suit the visitors. The local club comprise a good number of players this season, there being about forty in all, who are determined to make a good showing this year against their opponents.

MR. BROWN'S APPOINTMENT.

Gilmour Brown, C. E., of this city, is the engineer selected by the local government to go over the Central railway to determine whether the recommendations made by Senator King and George McAvity in their report are practicable from an engineering point of view. Mr. Brown will commence his tour of inspection almost immediately, and it is probable that his report will be considered at the meeting of the government, which will be held at St. John on the evening of the 15th.

DEATH AT KINGSCLEAR.

Mr. George Scott, a well known and respected resident of Kingsclear, died at that place on Saturday evening after a lengthy illness from abscess of the head. The deceased, who was seventy-three years of age, is survived by a widow and two daughters, Mrs. Fred Thomas and Mrs. Fred Kelly of Kingsclear. The funeral took place this afternoon at two o'clock, and was largely attended.

Interment was made at Hammonville. R. B. Adams had charge of the arrangements.

SWEET CLOVER.

"Sweet Clover," which will be the offering on Thursday, June 15, tells a more serious tale than most plays, though there is a delicious comedy vein in the roles of "Abigail Holcombe," the spinster, and her backward lover, "Job Masson," who has been courting her for thirty years and is still "a-leadin' up to it," and the characters of young "Jack Hamilton" and his sweetheart "Sunny Andrews," with her many lover's quarrels. Though the play is sometimes called a pastoral idyll, only one scene is laid in the country, while the other three are located in the metropolis, thus allowing considerable scope for some beautiful scenic effects, handsome costuming, odd furniture and original lighting effects. FIRES DYING OUT.

The forest fires that were reported as raging along the line of the Intercolonial, above Doaktown and vicinity, have practically ceased without doing very much damage. Had it not been for the rain of Saturday night and yesterday the results would in all probability have been much more serious as by Saturday night they had assumed quite a threatening form. The Gibson Company's offices at Marysville, however, reported this morning that nothing had been heard as yet from the scene of the fires, and that they had probably been swamped out completely by the rains.

CHURCH WORKERS RETURNED.

The party of Sunday School workers who left last Monday for Sussex to attend the sessions of the annual Sunday School Teachers' Conference, returned by Steamer Majestic on Saturday. The party included Miss Agnes Tabor, Miss Stella Sherman, Miss P. L. Babbitt, Miss Nora Stop-and others. They report that the conference of the association was a most beneficial and interesting one. Several excellent papers were read and discussed, two of which were of special interest, one being delivered by His Lordship Bishop Worrell of Nova Scotia, and the other by President Hanna of King's College.

A GOOD PREACHER.

Rev. Dr. Bachman, of Illinois, who is touring the provinces in the interests of the Sunday School work, was in the city holding services yesterday. In the morning he occupied the pulpit of the Methodist church, and in the evening that of the Presbyterian church. Able addresses were given on both occasions. In the afternoon Dr. Bachman addressed a special joint meeting of the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Free Baptist Sunday schools in the Free Baptist church and after evening services spoke to a large congregation in the Baptist church.

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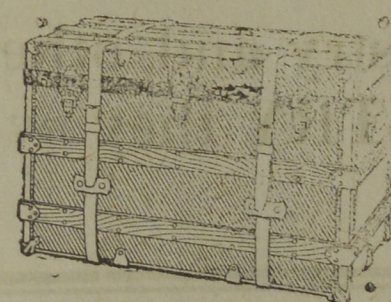
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
