

RUSSIANS BEATEN.

Kuropatkin Reports a Disastrous Defeat.

JAPANESE BROKE THROUGH HIS LINES—CUT OFF PART OF HIS ARMY.

And Are Marching on to Mukden.

RUSSIAN GENERAL'S POSITION EXTREMELY DANGEROUS.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Berlin, March 4.—A despatch to the Tageblatt from St. Petersburg says "Kuropatkin in a telegram which arrived here at 7 o'clock last night, said that 260,000 Japanese had broken through the Russian line which is cut off from the remainder of the army."

"At 10 o'clock another message came from Kuropatkin, which read:—'The Japanese are marching on Mukden, my position is extremely dangerous.'"

The government circles here are convinced that Kuropatkin has been fully beaten, his army dispersed, and that the railroad north of Mukden will probably be cut.

Tokio, March 4., 4 p. m.—Advices received today from the headquarters of the Japanese armies in Manchuria say that the fighting on the right centre means steady gains for the Japanese and that they have defeated the Russians at Sennintin.

St. Petersburg, March 4.—The whole rolling stock, consisting of 145 locomotives and 5,173 cars, just delivered, are employed to reinforce the main line of the Siberian railway, instead of being utilized for general commercial traffic, as was intended.

The minister of railways has been obliged to order 15,000 cars for various lines in the empire.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

St. Petersburg, March 3—5.30 p. m.—According to the latest information from the front the battle is now general, and of the most desperate character. The losses have been exceedingly heavy on both sides during the preliminary fighting.

Although it is not officially admitted, it is regarded as certain that General Kuropatkin is directing all his efforts to the withdrawal of his army to Tie Pass.

It is now practically a rear guard action, but the task of extracting himself is proving very difficult.

The Japanese have not only driven in his left, but a column is already reported to have crossed the Hun river, east of Fushun. At the same time the Japanese are pressing the Russian centre under cover of the fire of their siege guns, and General Kuropatkin is gradually retiring before the Japanese advance.

The efforts of the Japanese to envelope the Russian right wing have been unsuccessful, but it has been forced back almost in a line with Mukden.

Two Russian divisions were despatched to head off the rear flanking column advancing from the Liao river towards Sennintin (about thirty miles west of Mukden), but according to the latest advices they were too late, the Japanese having entirely entered the town yesterday.

No official figures regarding the losses are obtainable, but according to unofficial reports the Russian losses up to last night were nearly 7,000 men.

A CELEBRATED CASE.

Gaynor and Greene, American Fugitives, Re-arrested at Quebec.

ST. JOHN CITIZEN'S DEATH.

Geo. W. Gerow, Former Shipowner and Auctioneer, Succumbed to Pneumonia.

St. John, Mar. 4.—George W. Gerow, a life long resident of this city, died at 9.20 this morning. He had been ill a week from pneumonia.

At one time he was a shipowner, but retired twelve years ago and became an auctioneer, retiring a year ago.

He was twice married, his first wife being Julia Travis of St. John, to whom two children were born. His second wife was Evelyn Losee, of New York State, who survives.

Six children also survive, James W., of Virginia, Frank A., of Halifax, Berton L., barrister of St. John, Wilbur W., of St. John, Clara, a trained nurse, of New York, and Minnie at home.
