HON. MR. SIFTON.

from the provincial field to Dominion wide prominence. As acting Premier of Manitoba during Mr. Greenway's illness in 1895, Mr. Sifton introduced into the Manitoba Legislature in June of that year the famous resolution declaring the province's refusal to carry out the Bowell government's order-in-council for the re-establishment of the separate school system in that province.

Again in February, 1896, he introduced in the Manitoba Legislature resolutions protesting against the adoption by the Dominion Parliament of the Manitoba Remedial Bill, then under consideration, and which finally wrecked the Conservative government. In March of the same year he was appointed by the Manitoba government one of their commissioners to discuss the school question with representatives of the Dominion Government, when he firmly supported the refusal of the province to accede to the Government's demand. In all these important negotiations, Mr. Sifton so distinguished himself that his speedy translation to the Dominion sphere was regarded as inevitable, and, after Laurier's defeat of the Tupper administration in June, 1896, he was called to the Liberal Government as Minister of the Interior, which portfolio he has held ever since.

EDUCATED AT VICTORIA.

Hon. Clifford Sifton, B. A., K. C., was born in 1861 in Middlesex Co., Ont., son of John W. Sifton, who later became Speaker of the Manitoba Legislature. He was educated at the London, Ont., High School, and Victoria University, Cobourg, winning the Prince of Wales gold medal in 1880. In 1882 he was called to the Manitoba bar and commenced practice at Brandon, where he continued until his entry into the Dominion cabinet. In 1895 he was created Q. C., by Lord Aberdeen.

Mr. Sifton has been a life-long Liberal. His active political career began with his election to the Manitoba Legislature for North Brandon in 1888. In 1891 he was called to the Provincial Government by Hon. Thomas Greenway, then Premier, and was appointed Attorney-General in succession to Hon. Joseph Martin. His most important work in this office was the Code of Civil Procedure, which regulates the working of the Province's Superior Courts, and has greatly simplified its legal procedure.

After taking a leading part in the Manitoba school controversy which convulsed the Dominion during 1895 and 1896, Mr. Sifton resigned his provincial portfolio to enter the Laurier Government, and on Nov. 17th, 1896, he was sworn in as Minister of the Interior and Superintendent-gen-

eral of Indian affairs. The constituency of Brandon becoming vacant by the resignation of Mr. D'Alton McCarthy, Mr. Sifton was in the same month returned for that riding by acclamation, and he has represented it at Ottawa ever since.

HIS WORK AS MINISTER.

As Minister of the Interior, Mr. Sifton has had great and responsible duties, being charged with the administration of the unorganized territories, and especially the Yukon territories which came into existence under his regime. He also gave birth to the Legislature of the Northwest Territories in 1898 introducing and carrying through Parliament the legislation which gave them responsible government. It is another remarkable coincidence that one of the notable incidents of his career was this creation of responsible government for the Northwest Territories, while the immediate cause of his resignation was his leader's bill to advance these same territories to the full status of provinces.

BUILDING UP THE YUKON.

Since the invasion of the Yukon in 1897 by hordes of gold seekers much of Mr. Sifton's energies have been devoted again to the creation of a new territory, which may ultimately also become a province of the Dominion. Although his administration of the extraordinarily difficult and delicate piece of statecraft has been attacked with continual savage criticism, the fact remains that, despite minor failures the inevitable result of the unrestrained cupidity of the lawless thousands who rushed to the gold fields, the world's history cannot show another instance where the opening up of a gold mining country of such magnificent proportions and riches has been attended by so little lawlessness. Mr. Sifton grasped the magnitude of the situation from the first, and at once took steps to give the district suitable laws and to properly enforce them. Although in a singularly remote and savage district the laws have been well administered the mails promptly delivered and telegraphic service speedily arranged, so that within a very few years under Mr. Sifton's guiding genius the Yukon has been changed from a howling wilderness to a typical, well governed and supplied Canadian district.

HIS IMMIGRATION POLICY.

On assuming office Mr. Sifton took the ground that the most important question before Canada was the settling of the west by encouraging immigration. The story of how he has realized this idea is a familiar and a proud one to Canada. Year after year largely through his judicious efforts, the tide of immigration has turned more and more strongly to Canada, and the prairie lands of the west have been filled with an excellent class of settlers, who are already doing their share in the building up of the Canadian nation.

Despite the multitudinous nature of his duties, on the opening of the Yukon, Mr. Sifton undertook a per-

sonal study of the conditions there. He made a trip to the Yukon, inspected the inlets, such as the White and Chilkoot passes, the Taku inlet and the Stikine river route. At that time there was great friction between Canada and the United States over trade facilities to reach the interior. On his return Mr. Sifton visited Washington and concluded arrangements with the United States Government which gave far better facilities to Canadian trade going into the Yukon over strips of land then claimed by the United States, and which have since been given to that country by the Alaskan Boundary Commission, despite the efforts of Mr. Sifton, who on the recommendation of the Canadian Government, was accepted by the Home Government as British agent before that tribunal.
