

WAR AND STRIKE.

Student Shot a Policeman at Warsaw.

RUSSIANS BOMBARD IN JAPANESE POSITION.

Strike Reaching More Extended Proportions.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Mukden, Feb. 24.—A daring Russian raiding party under the command of Col. Slenski completely destroyed with explosives, the bridge south of Naicheng ten miles west of New Chwang.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 24.—Grand Duke Vladimir, commander of the military districts of St. Petersburg, has ordered the trial by court martial of Capt. Davidoff of the Seventeenth battery regiment of horse artillery guards, three other officers and three men of the first battery of rection firing in the direction of Emperor Nicholas, a charge of case shell during the ceremony of the blessing of the Neva waters, Jan. 19.

The Grand Duchess Elizabeth has been appointed commander of the Fifth Kieff grenadiers in succession to Grand Duke Sergius.

Warsaw, Feb. 24.—The police of this city threaten to strike for higher pay.

They constitute an independent force paid by the city and at present receive \$6 per month and uniforms.

The police subsist on money obtained from other sources. They will make a formal demand for increase of pay to the chief of police tonight.

The operating departments of the Warsaw division of the St. Petersburg railway have struck. The train service is maintained by the aid of the army railroad corps. The strike on the Vienna-Visula railroad continues. The military occupy the gas works and the employees threaten to strike tomorrow.

Warsaw, Feb. 24.—A policeman was shot and killed by a student in a disturbance today at the Vienna station.

The police attempted to arrest a student and great crowds gathered around.

The mob tried to rescue him but the policeman drew his sword, whereupon a student killed him and disappeared in the crowd.

The Cossacks are guarding the telegraph lines on the Warsaw and St. Petersburg railroad, fearing that the strikers may cut off communication between the two cities.

Mails from Warsaw to Lodz, a distance of sixty miles are being delivered on carts.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 24.—Representatives of the ship builders of various nationalities have been attracted hither by the prospect of rich contracts in connection with rebuilding the navy, and increasing the volunteer fleet.

There are good prospects of American capital securing a good share of the contracts awarded.

Tokio, Feb. 24.—The Manchurian reports to the army department say that the Russians are shelling points in the vicinity of the Shakhe river.

Commencing at 1 o'clock, Feb. 23 a Russian battery of heavy guns posted west of Litajou Tum, began shelling Lapatel and vicinity.

AN AGED MINISTER.

Secretary of State Celebrated 80th Anniversary of His Birth.

Ottawa, Feb. 24.—Hon. R. W. Scott, senator and secretary of state was eighty years old today. The Liberal senators presented him this morning with a handsome loving cup, and he made a suitable reply.

EXTENSIVE REPAIRS.

Old Kirk to be Raised and Wall Put Under It—Electric Lighting for New Church.

The trustees of St. Paul's church are undertaking some extensive work in con-

nection with the church and the Old Kirk, which is used for congregational purposes. The old church, which is sitting on cedar posts, is to be raised a couple of feet, excavation made under the whole building and a solid stone wall put under it.

The trustees have also decided to introduce electric lighting into the new church, partially at present to improve the light under the galleries, and eventually the system will probably be extended to the whole building.

A special meeting of the trustees to deal with these matters was held last night attended by the following gentlemen: Jos. Howe Dickson, Col. Loggie, Joseph Walker, H. S. Campbell, Geo. W. Hodge, L. C. Macnutt, W. L. McFarlane, E. A. McKay, J. R. Howie and W. R. Logan. Col. Loggie occupied the chair.

Tenders had been called for the repairs to the old church, and there were four responses, from Jas. Cunningham, Chas. A. Hall, John Maxwell and Lyons & Son. Mr. Cunningham's tender for \$656 was accepted and the property committee of which Mr. Howie is chairman, were authorized to enter into a contract with Mr. Cunningham at once for the prosecution of the work.

The matter of removing the old pillars from the interior of the building and replacing them with iron columns was referred to the property committee.

The light committee, composed of H. S. Campbell, Geo. W. Hodge and L. C. Macnutt reported through Mr. Campbell estimates for lighting the new church by electricity, and the committee was authorized to make arrangements at once for introducing incandescent lights under the gallery, a portion of the church poorly served by the present gas lights. The question of extending the electric light service to the whole building was left for future consideration. The cost of the proposed improvement will be in the vicinity of \$50.

SACKVILLE'S CHAMPIONS.

Beat Moncton in the Deciding Game of N. B. Hockey League.

Sackville, N. B. Feb. 24.—Sackville won the New Brunswick hockey championship last night by defeating Moncton by a score of 3 to 1. The match was by far the most interesting and exciting seen in Sackville this year, and notwithstanding the furious storm raging, was witnessed by fully 700 people. About 150 came from Moncton, while quite a number were present from Dorchester.

The match began at 8.30, and while the play was chiefly in Moncton's territory, it was close enough to be intensely interesting and excitement ran high. The teams fought hard, but failed to score in the first half, and it ended as it began.

During the first half Norman, of Sackville, was struck in the stomach by the puck, and had to be carried off the ice. The game was consequently delayed several minutes.

A minute after the commencement of the second half, Crockett secured the puck and notched one for Moncton. This was the signal for a demonstration from Moncton rooters, who crowded on to the ice and would not be quieted. After this delay Sackville got in some good work, and a few minutes later shot a goal. Then it was Sackville's turn to yell.

A little later Sackville scored again and shortly before time was called notched number three.

THE PARK ASSOCIATION.

Recorder Colter Elected a Delegate to the Moncton Meeting.

The Fredericton Park Association held a meeting last evening, those present being Recorder Colter, Byron Phair, H. C. Jewett, Hugh O'Neill, Harvey McCoy and others.

A letter was read from Mr. R. A. Snowball of Onatam, in reference to the formation of a Maritime Province circuit for next season. The letter stated that a meeting of Maritime Province horsemen was to convene in Moncton on March 1st, and invited the association to send delegates to the same. It is proposed to debar "ringers" from the New England States from entering the races this year, by making a provision to the effect that all horses competing must be owned in the Maritime Provinces prior to June 1st.

The meeting elected Recorder Colter a delegate to attend the meeting and instructed him to advocate having the circuit races divided into four classes, viz., 2.35, 2.25, 2.20 and 2.17. It is proposed to do away with the free for all event.
