Zebley wrote the paper of the day upon the evolution and work of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. But every other woman either had a dog or rejoiced that she hadn't and said so.

"When my husband is out evenings I should be very lonely if it wasn't for my dog," said one member, and that seemed to clinch the argument. Mrs. Boynton furthermore declared that persons who loved dogs were always kind.

"It seems to me from what I see from my windows that the dogs in the city are pretty well cared for," said Mrs. Margaret Holmes Bates. "Women get into the cars with one, and sometimes two dogs attached to long straps, twisting around them and nearly throwing them. If they were children, wouldn't they get well spat?"

"I have a great deal of sympathy for dogs, but I think there ought to be an institution for the feeble-minded people who keep them in cities. All day long up by the Park women are leading dogs out by strings to exercise. I get to know some of them by sight. There is one stout woman who always has two dogs jumping around her and nearly tripping her up. Early in the morning the dogs, with the women attached, begin to come to the Park, and I have seen them out as late as 10 o'clock at night."

"I am not feeble minded," said Mrs. Sallie Morris Cory, "but I had a little dog for twelve years. Then he was sick, and I had to have him put out of his misery, and I sent for the men from the society to come and take him. The man took him up very tenderly."

"Kiss your dog good-bye, Madam, he said, and—well, I couldn't tell that story for a long time, and I think I had better not finish it now," concluded Mrs. Cory, with a husky voice.

Mrs. Jones told of a mother who found her little girl in a room talking to a fly.

"Poor little fly, she was saying. I love you, little fly. Do you want to go to heaven? Then go to heaven, she concluded, as she crushed the fly against the pane. It is that same spirit which makes boys tie tin pails to dogs' tails."

"They are most awfully cruel to animals at Aiken, S. C.," put in Miss Carter. "I have been there and know. They bring poor little deer and foxes to be hunted, and they are so economical that they won't kill them and put them out of misery, but keep them to be hunted over and over again. One woman asked me if I had seen the sport, and when I told her 'No, indeed!' she said it did seem rather cruel, for the poor deer came in so tired."

"Well, I have a dog," said Mrs. J. H. Judge, returning to the tone of discussion, "and my neighbors have dogs. And I have taken my dog to the country, and I never pitied anything so in all my life. He was covered with ticks and he never has anything in the city. I am very fond of dogs, though I am not foolish about them."

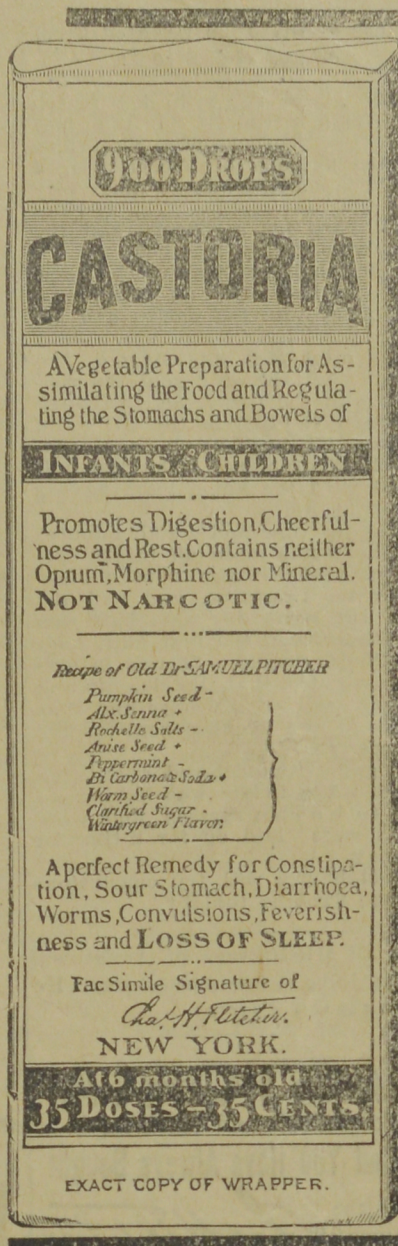
