DIED AT LYNN.

Alex. Christie, Formerly of this City.
Suddenly Called Away.

Mr. John Christie, sr. received a telegram yesterday conveying the sad intelligence of the death at Lynn, Mass., of his youngest son, Mr. Alexander Christie, a former resident of this city. No particulars were given but it is assumed that the call was very sudden and unexpected. Mr. Christie had no previous intimation of his son's illness, and had a letter from him no later than Tuesday of last week. He was then working as usual and was apparently enjoying the best of health.

This deceased young man was a machinist by trade and was in the employ of an electrical manufacturing concern at Lynn. He was about thirty-five years of age and unmarried. Besides sorrowing parents, he is survived by one sister, Mrs. Kindred, of Fitchburg, and four brothers John, of this city, William and Jas. of Fitchburg, and Charles of Bristol, R. I. The deceased had many friends and acquaintances here who will be greatly shocked to learn of his death. He spent several weeks here last summer visiting relatives.

The remains will be brought here for burial by the noon train tomorrow and the funeral will take place on the following day at an hour to be announced later.

The deceased was a member of the Independent Order of Oddfellows.

Undertaker R. B. Adams will have charge of the funeral arrangements.

SONS OF ENGLAND.

Annual Church Parade Held on Sunday Afternoon.

The members of Islington Lodge of the Sons of England, held their annual church parade yesterday afternoon under most favorable auspices.

The brethren to the number of about fifty, assembled at the church hall at three o'clock, and forming in procession with the Fredericton Brass Band in the lead, marched to St. Ann's church by way of Carleton King and Westmorland streets. The service at the church was conducted by Rev. Canon Roberts, who delivered a very able and patriotic discourse in which he embodied some words of wholesome advice to the members of the order. Members of the band rendered valuable assistance to the choir during the service.

After the National Anthem had been sung and the impressive service brought to a close, the procession reformed and proceeded out Westmorland to Charlotte street, down Charlotte to St. John street, in St. John street, in St. John to Queen street, up Queen to Regent, in Regent to Brunswick, thence to the hall, where it was disbanded.

The sidewalks along the route of the procession were lined with spectators, who commented very favorably on the large turnout, fine appearance and excellent marching of the brethren.

REFUSED TO PUT MOTION.

And the Lake of the Woods Milling Co.'s Dividend Was Not Declared.

Montreal, May 29.—Why the Lake of the Woods Milling Company did not declare its 6 per cent. dividend at the last meeting is almost as much of a mystery as why Henry Dabry left the Star.

It appears that all of the directors, save Mr. Fyche, the vice-president, who presided, were in favor of the dividend, as a good deal more had been earned, and such conservative business men as Jas. Crathern and others considered the declaration of 6 per cent. on Lake of the Woods common a very conservative policy.

Mr. Fyche, however, blocked the whole business by refusing to put the motion. He told his fellow directors that they were a lot of stock speculators and high words generally were exchanged. Most of the members of the Board declared they would never attend another meeting held while Mr. Fyche presided, so there will be nothing done till Mr. Robert McQueen, the president of the Company returns from England, after which the dividend will of course, be declared.

ST. JOHN WOMAN.

Interested in a Divorce Decree Said to Have Been Tampered With.

MAN WOOD HER AT ST. JOHN UNDER A FALSE NAME.

Bangor, Me., May 29.—A decree of divorce granted to F. Warren C. Wiggin, of South Framingham, Mass., from Mrs. Georgie Wiggin of Levant, Me., by Justice Whitehouse at the April term, it was discovered on Saturday, has been tampered with and these additional important words added thereto:

"And it is further decreed that the said F. Warren Wiggin be allowed to change his name to F. Warren Campbell."

While the rest of the decree was written with pen and ink, the quoted words were typewritten. The discovery was made by Clerk of Courts Sweet of this city.

The matter was at once laid before County Attorney Patten, who, after looking into the matter, came to the conclusion that while the forgery was

committed in Massachusetts, it was uttered in St. John. The courts in the Bay state have no jurisdiction over the case, and those of New Brunswick would have little, though they might prosecute the guilty person should he visit that province.

It appears that a St. John woman—whose name the authorities refuse to divulge because of the prominence of her family there—is engaged to Wiggin, having become acquainted with him three or four years ago, when he did business in St. John under the name of "Campbell." She was a buyer for a big mercantile concern and "Campbell" prevailed on her to establish him in business there.

One day a stranger informed her that "Campbell's" real name was Wiggin, and that he had a wife and two children in Levant. "Campbell" was confronted by his fiancée with the statement, admitted the accusation, told a hard luck story and begged to be forgiven.

The title to the store was turned over to her and the woman told Campbell that if he could get a divorce and change his name, so that St. John people would never know it was other than Campbell, she would marry him.

In due time she received the degree of divorce with the added degree changing his name. She was suspicious and came to Bangor Wednesday to investigate the validity of the document.

After Clerk Sweet had called the attention of County Attorney Patten to the matter, the latter sent for the St. John woman, who told him her story as narrated above. She also told of calling upon Lawyer Robinson of this city, who was Wiggin's attorney in the divorce proceedings, and he had said that the quoted words had been affixed to the decree after he had last seen the document.

Mr. Robinson had letters from Wiggin asking him to make an application for a change of name from Wiggin to Campbell. In one he stated that the change of name meant for him the securing of a large legacy.

Twenty years ago Wiggin was a school teacher and one of the most conspicuous figures in educational circles in Penobscot County. The last seen of him in this section was about a dozen years ago, when he suddenly disappeared, deserting his wife.

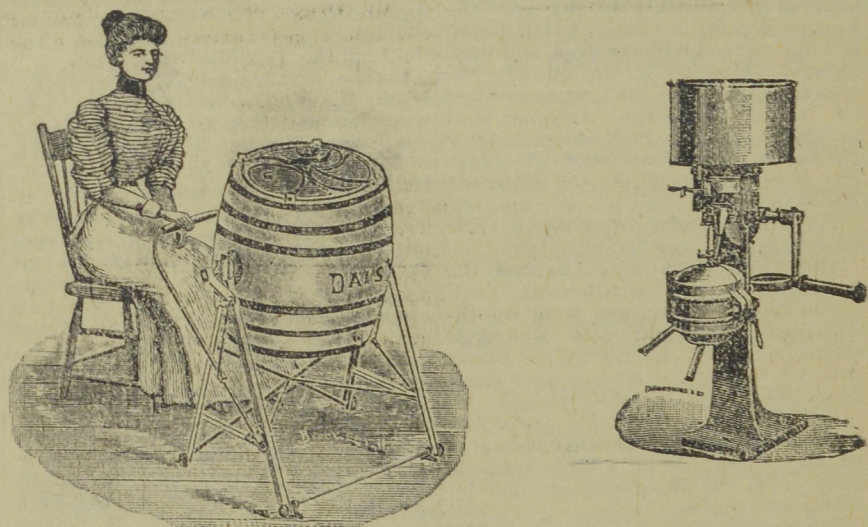
