THE RING.

GOSSIP OF THE FIGHTERS.

Now that Jeffries has retired from the ring, or, in fact, has been forced into retirement through lack of some worthy opponent, what will the other heavyweight fighters do? This question is asked by prominent sporting men when the heavyweight championship is discussed.

When Jeffries announced his retirement he made no disposition of the title, and the honors are now open for any legitimate aspirant to fight with Jeffries at the head of the heavyweight division the others realized that it was a hopeless task to try and defeat the big boiler-maker.

Some of them stated, in fact, that so long as Jeffries remained the champion they had no desire to seek the title for the simple reason that it was impossible to defeat Jeffries.

Jim Corbett, the former heavyweight champion, recently announced that he would not fight again until Jeffries had retired. Now that the champion has found it necessary to give up the boxing game, Corbett will undoubtedly be heard from, for there are a couple of heavyweights who would give him an interesting tussle. It makes possible another championship battle with his old rival, Bob Fitzsimmons.

Since Fitzsimmons won his memorable battle over the Californian, both have fallen victims to Jeffries' terrific wallop, and they are now on the level, so far as the championship is concerned. Nothing could be more interesting in the first game than another match between Fitzsimmons and Corbett. Both are still in good physical condition, and a couple of weeks' training would fit them for the hard battle which would undoubtedly result when they clash.

The year that have passed since Fitzsimmons made his solar plexus blow famous at Carson City have not wiped away the bitter feeling that then existed between these rival heavyweights. Champions have gone down to defeat and have been the best of friends with their conquerors afterwards, but with Fitzsimmons and Corbett neither ever shed the other from the first time they met, and every effort on the part of their friends to make them bury the hatchet have failed.

They are just as bitter enemies today as when they entered the ring March 17, 1897, and if they were to meet again in the night it would be a fight to the bitter end. That Fitzsimmons is not through with the ring is shown by the fact that he has planned to meet Schrock this summer. Corbett is ready to enter the ring whenever there is any big purse in sight, so that it is possible that Corbett and Fitzsimmons may yet fight for the championship laurels, of which they have at different times been the proud possessors in their careers.

Gus Ruhlin has never given up the idea that he is a championship possibility, and, with Jeffries out of the running, he believes that he can have things all to himself in the heavyweight division. Marvin Hart, who defeated Jack Johnson, the colored champion, is now satisfied that he will not be handicapped by Jeffries' weight, for their is no aspirant who is within 40 pounds of the champion.

GOLF.

SCHOOLBOYS PLAYED WELL.

New York, May 26.—Yesterday was a day of unexpected reverses for the most prominent players in the Metropolitan Golf Association's annual championship tournament on the links of the Foxhills Golf Club.

In the first round of match play, even M. Boyers of Pittsburg, who won the match play round Wednesday, was defeated by James Rhett, of the Crescent Athletic Club, Brooklyn.

In the afternoon Walter B. Travers was put out by Jerome D. Travers, who is practically a schoolboy, by 7 up and 6 to play. Dwight Partridge of Garden City, the interscholastic champion, held his own against good players, so that two of the eight remaining for the club honor or are schoolboys, while the other six are somewhat more seasoned.

ENGLISH LADIES WON.

London, May 26.—The ladies' international golf match, arranged by the executive committee of the Ladies' Golf Union, between the British and American women players, was played at Cromer yesterday and resulted in a British victory.

Before the game began the number of competitors was changed to seven on each side and the British won by 6 to 1.

Miss Georgian Bishop, the former American champion of Bridgeport, Conn., was the only American who won, defeating Miss Lottie Doi, the English champion.

YACHTING.

THE HAMBURG IN LEAD.

New York, May 26.—The German racing yacht Hamburg led the Endymion and Ailsa by 136 miles in the trans-Atlantic race for the Emperor William's cup on May 22nd. All three of the yachts were sighted by the Steamer St. Louis that day, the Endymion and Ailsa at 1:36 p. m., mean Greenwich time (about 8:40 p. m., New York time). The Ailsa was leading the Endymion about two miles. A light southeast breeze prevailed. The Hamburg had light, variable winds.

This information was sent to The Associated Press by Marconi wireless telegraph from the St. Louis by a roundabout route which resulted in a considerable delay. From the St. Louis it was given to the Steamer Campania, by the Campania to the Marconi station at Siasconet, and thence to New York. The message follows:

"S. S. St. Louis, May 24, via S. S. Campania, via Marconi station, Siasconet, Mass., May 26, Associated Press, New York."

"May 22, 1:36 p. m. T. lat. 39.57, long. 55.22, Endymion, Ailsa, latter leading two miles, light southeast breeze, same day, 7:50 p. m. T. lat. 34.59, long. 55.25, Hamburg, 136 miles ahead of Endymion and Ailsa, light, variable winds."

The Hamburg was leading the Endymion by more than 55 miles when both yachts were sighted by the Cunarder Celtic on Wednesday last. The Celtic sent her report to New York and Mr. Marconi as follows:

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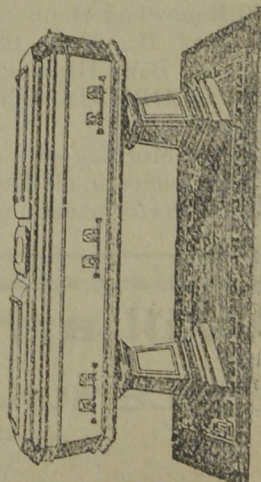
