JUDGMENT FOR DEFENDANT.

Mr. Justice McLeod gave judgment Saturday in the case of Rev. M. B. Babineau, of St. Jacques, Madawaska County, against Fred LaForest, ex-M. P. P., of Edmundston. He found that on one count of the declaration the defendant owed the plaintiff \$1,200, and dismissed the counter claim for damages which the defendant alleged he sustained by the plaintiff taking out attachments in the State of Maine. The court also held that the writing which the plaintiff claimed to be a promissory note was not a promissory note, and on the count of the declaration ordered a verdict to be entered for the defendant, with leave to the plaintiff to move the full court to enter a verdict for him.

POLICE COURT.

A soldier, who saw active service in South Africa, and two civilians were arrested by the police on Saturday night for drunkenness. All were released on making deposits of \$5 each, but the soldier put in an appearance at the police court this morning, and had his money refunded. He afterwards pleaded guilty and was fined \$3, a net gain of \$1 on the transaction. He told the court it was his first drunk in seventeen years.

HAD GREAT SPORT.

Messrs. J. J. McCaffrey and J. H. Hawthorne returned this afternoon from a three days' fishing trip to Indian town, on the Miramichi. They had a very pleasant outing and succeeded in killing sixty sea trout, ranging in weight from one to four and one-half pounds and several grilse. Mr. McCaffrey had the misfortune to break his rod in a battle with a twenty pound salmon, which he had hooked on a trawl. The fish, of course, succeeded in getting away.

BRIDGE WORK.

Coun. W. R. Fawcett, of Temperance Vale, left today for Oakville, Carleton County, where he is to complete the erection of a handsome new bridge over the north branch of the Medusakog at that place. This bridge, which is known as the Briggs' Mill bridge, was commenced last winter, but owing to the high spring freshets at that place had to be abandoned until the present.

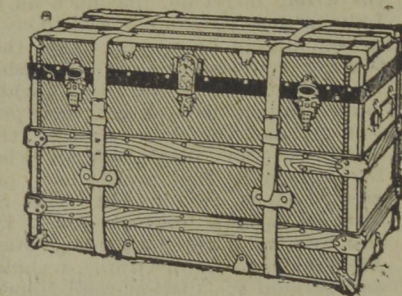
