COUNTY COUNCIL.

Secy-Treas' Accounts Found Correct and Neatly Kept.

A SUBSTANTIAL BALANCE AT THE BANK.

Auditor McCready's Resignation Received and Accepted with Regret.

IMPROVEMENTS AT THE JAIL AND COMPLAINT AGAINST THE HOSPITAL.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

The council met again at 2.30 p. m. with Warden Scott in the chair and all the members in attendance, including Couns. Moffat and Green of McAdam, who arrived by the noon train.

The secretary treasurer read a statement from the registrar of deeds showing the receipts of the office for the year to have been \$2,073.82. The sum of \$2,000 was deducted for the registrar's salary, leaving a balance of \$73.82 to the credit of the county.

The warden announced that the administrator of justice committee would meet with the city committee at four o'clock to adjust the accounts.

SECRETARY TREASURER'S ACCOUNTS.

The following report from the committee on the secretary-treasurer's accounts, was read by Coun. Estey, and adopted:

On motion of Coun. Cliff, seconded

by Coun. McMullin, it was resolved,

that the election of county officers

take place Wednesday morning at 11

o'clock.

COUNTY BUILDINGS.

The report of the committee on county buildings was read by Coun. Murray. It referred to the sanitary improvements to the county court house and jail, and to the new fence erected in rear of the jail, also to the improvements made in the heating apparatus at the jail. It stated that the contracts for mill wood were awarded to A. E. Hanson and F. D. A. Clements, the former at \$3.30 and the latter at \$4.47 per cord. The committee in conclusion asked authority to fit up the free country market at the court house, should it be required.

Coun. Cliff said he had learned through the newspapers that the county jail was not in a condition to hold prisoners. The grand inquest of the county had made no reference to the matter, and it had not been referred to by the chairman in his report. It was possible that the committee wanted to leave a loop-hole to escape from should they ever be incarcerated in jail. He (Cliff) wanted improvements made so that if the time ever came when he should be in jail, he would want to feel safe while there.

Coun. Murray suggested that Coun. Cliff would probably find the jail strong enough to hold him.

Coun. Hinchey made a few humorous observations on the subject. He did not wish to criticize the committee, he said, but he wanted things done right, both at the court house and jail. He did not want the grand jury of the country constantly finding fault.

Coun. McManiman contended that the discussion was out of order.

Coun. Cliff took issue with Coun. McManiman on the point. He contended that the only time to discuss the report was when it was before the council for adoption.

Coun. McMullin thought that some action should be taken by the council in regard to the recommendation of the committee in reference to the country market.

A copy of the contract made with McFarlane, Thompson & Anderson for a heating apparatus for the jail, was read by Coun. Murray, at the request of Coun. McFarlane.

Coun. McFarlane said that some trouble had been experienced last year in heating the jail. The furnace was out of repair and the stoves in the cells were found to be unsuitable for the purpose. A new furnace was installed and a hot water apparatus was added to it. As a result of the improvements the jail is better heated today than it ever was. The improvements only cost \$500, notwithstanding the fact that a firm in Montreal wanted \$1,800 to do the work.

Coun. Hinchey thought that Coun. McFarlane should explain what was wrong with the heating apparatus at the court house.

A motion to adopt the report was then carried.

Coun. Cliff gave notice that he would move a resolution at a future meeting of the council to the effect that steps be taken to take over the hay scales and fit up a free market at the court house.

AUDITOR McCREADY RESIGNS.

The warden read the following communication:

John Scott, Esq., Warden Municipality of York.

Sir,—I beg to announce, through you, to the county council of the municipality of York, that with the close of the present session of the council I shall retire from the position of county auditor.

In doing so I desire to thank you,

sir, and the members of the council,

for the sturdy support I have always

received during the past fourteen

years in the performance of my duties

as auditor, and my hope is that my

services have been as satisfactory

to the council as they have been

pleasant and agreeable to myself.

Coun. Hinchey moved that the resig-

nation of Mr. McCready be ac-

cepted, and in doing so moved that

the thanks of the council be tender-

ed to that gentleman for the val-

uable services rendered the county dur-

ing the past fourteen years.

Coun. McMullin, in seconding the

motion, also paid a tribute to the

worth of Mr. McCready.

The resolution was adopted by a

standing vote.

Coun. McMullin said there were

some vacant rooms in the court

house, and he thought the council

should take steps to fit up the

same and rent them for offices. He

thought one might be utilized by the

secretary-treasurer.

Coun. McManiman endorsed the

views expressed by the previous

speaker.

Coun. Carr said the cost of heat-

ing the rooms would amount to

quite an item, and would have to be

locked into by the council if any

change was made.

Coun. Haining said that when the

court was in session, the rooms were

required by the grand and petit

jurors.

Coun. McMullin said that two

rooms would be sufficient for the

use of the jurors.

Coun. Hinchey said that if the

plan to fit up a market was car-

ried out the rooms would be needed

by country ladies coming to the

market.

THE VICTORIA HOSPITAL.

Coun. McMullin said he had seen a statement in the Fredericton Herald last spring, about a young lady from the town of Marysville being refused admission to the Victoria Hospital because she had not the money to pay for a room. The hospital was a public institution and received a grant from the council, and therefore the case was one of some importance to the board.

Coun. McNally said he had made enquiries in regard to the matter mentioned by Coun. McMullin, and had satisfied himself that the statement in the Herald was substantially correct. He also learned of a similar case where a man from an upriver parish had been refused admission to the hospital simply because he did not have the money in his pocket to pay for his room. Another man offered to go responsible for the amount, but the hospital authorities declined the offer.

Coun. Fawcett said that Coun. McFarlane had prepared a resolution on the subject, and at his suggestion further discussion was deferred.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

The annual report of the chairman of the local Board of Health was read and referred to the public accounts committee. It was as follows:

To the warden and councillors of the municipality of York:

Gentlemen—I beg leave to submit the statement of the local Board of Health for District No. 3, with the expenses incurred since July last, with the bills annexed showing details, and respectfully ask that an order be passed, in favor of the board for the sum of \$805.14, which is the amount of indebtedness incurred since July last; also the sum of \$49.26, which amount was incurred by the former board of health, and to bring before you for your consideration the account of Fred Williams

for \$86.50, the board not having seen fit to deal with this last account at its last meeting.

At the last meeting of your council the Board of Health reported a case of smallpox in the Armenian colony at St. Marys. No further cases developed and the Board of Health was able to remove the quarantine in July.

Two cases of typhoid fever, two of chicken pox, and nine cases of diphtheria from Gibson and St. Marys, have been reported up to January, 1905, but we are pleased to report that there has been no further development of the disease and hope it has been eradicated. At the last meeting of the Board of Health it was decided to recommend the enactment of a schedule of fees for the guidance of the Board and to obviate the difficulty of excessive charges for services rendered the same.

CANADIAN WHEAT WORLD'S SUPPLY.

United States Has None to Export Says Mr. Carruthers.

Montreal, Jan. 17.—"Conditions in Chicago certainly indicate that the United Kingdom and the continent will have to look for their supplies of hard spring wheat from our Canadian Northwest," was the statement made to-day by Mr. James Carruthers, the well known grain man, who has just returned from Chicago. "The United States this year has practically no wheat for export," added Mr. Carruthers. "There may be a small quantity of low grade wheat shipped out of the country, but the good wheat will all be required for local use and this state of affairs is liable to continue in years to come as the acreage of wheat growing lands has reached its maximum, and on account of the enormous increase in people in the United States it would seem as if the whole exporting powers from now on would be very limited."

Referring to what the United States Government would likely do to allow American millers to bring in Manitoba wheat Mr. Carruthers said it would likely allow them to mix it with low grade United States wheat and then export the produce of this mixture. By doing so it would allow the Minneapolis miller to use a lot of low grade Northwest wheat which is practically nothing but feed and cannot be ground alone.

A TALE OF THE WAR.

How a Chinese Gentleman Recovered His Titles.

The Cook of the War Correspondents' Party Had Looted His Host's Treasure Chest.

We are in the home of a man who belongs to the "writing class," the educated class, writes F. C. in the New York Evening Post of the conditions at the front near Mukden. We are crowding him and his wife and niece and his four children into a place 5 feet by 8, while we occupy uncomfortably enough, the best apartment, 20 feet by 14, five of us. He is a meditative person, and his wife and children have the marks of quality. His family ranks here as that of a prosperous Wall street broker's ranks in your suburbs, such is the honor done in Manchuria to even slight literary attainments. Suppose the prospering broker alighted at Scarborough or Greenwich, or Englewood, or Hempstead some afternoon, to be met by his coachman saying, "The invading troops are camping in your house, and your wife and children have had to go to the groom's room over the stable. The stalls are occupied by the cavalry horses which are eating your grain, and your own horses are tied to the rose and the syringa bushes on the front lawn. Your kitchen garden, lettuce, beets, asparagus, everything has been pulled up by the roots. Besides, your safe has been rifled by a cook, and the title deeds to your estate, left you by your father, are in his bag."

Nothing here is overdrawn in the slightest. The condition is literally presented. Last night by candle-light the owner of the house entered our dim apartment with an interpreter. He pointed to the little black grip of our cook who had just gone to the trenches with a member of the mess. The owner of the house was very excited. "What is it?" was inquired of the interpreter. "He says that Chin Tung has in that bag some papers, the deeds to his house, some money and valuables."

"How did the cook come by them?" we asked. "He learned where the owner of the house had buried his treasure. It was under the camp fire. It is now in that black bag."

Sitting "in bank" as justices we had the claimant describe his box of treasure. He did so; and opening the bag, there was the package in plain sight. The claimant leaped for it, but was restrained. "What is inside?" he was questioned. "Deeds to this property, my father's will, accounts of debts owing to me, promissory notes, some money and some jewelry."

We opened the box. Everything was as described. We caused the claimant to write his autograph in Chinese. It corresponded precisely with signatures to certain papers, old and yellow.

"Now, if these are not yours we will complain to the mandarin, and you will lose your head," was the way in which they were handed over to him. He touched the ground three times, and spoke rapidly in Chinese, and made three swift passes with one hand across his neck. He would willingly suffer the loss of his head if these articles were not his. Then he went backward into the other room.

Loud greetings met him, then a joyous confusion. There came a knock on the door. His wife, she of the tranquil face, was there beaming in upon us, and holding out the jewelry made of the green sheney parts of the wings of Kingfishers. "She wishes," said the intrep. "She wishes," said the interpreter, "to present you with these trinkets, which were in the box you restored. They are her wedding hair ornaments—the ornaments she wore when she came to this house as a bride. She would like to give them to you to show her gratitude."

Her marriage jewels—Kingfishers feathers mounted on gold; her wedding ring in effect—were what the lady, her eyes wet with emotion, was offering to us for not protecting one who would have looted from her house and home.

No; they were very beautiful, these jewels—like polished malachite; but they were no decoration for our fresh, unstained ermine.
