Barker of this city, Mrs. Enock Lunt of Bright, Mrs. Landon of Boston, Mrs. Edwin Good of St. Stephen, Mr. Havelock Wheeler of Kingsclear, and Mr. Charles Wheeler of Woodstock. The funeral service will be conducted at the house tomorrow morning at 10 45 o'clock, by Rev J. H. Macdonald, and the remains will be taken to Kingsclear for interment. Undertaker George W. Adams will have charge of the arrangements.

GENIAL GEORGE HAM.

Head of C. P. R. Advertising Department
Now in the City.

Mr. George H. Ham, the genial, goodlooking and loquacious advertising agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway, is among the visitors to the city today. He is accompanied by Mr. F. R. Perry, the district passenger agent, and they are guests at the Queen. Mr. Ham has been a frequent visitor to Fredericton in days gone by, and has a number of warm friends who are always pleased to grasp by the hand such a worthy exponent of truth, righteousness and goodfellowship. He was to have been accompanied on his present trip by Mr. C. E. E. Ussher, the general passenger agent of the C. P. R., but important business detained the latter in St. John.

Mr. Ham, who is now making a tour of the maritime provinces in the interests of the C. P. R., spent yesterday in St. John, and this morning's Sun disposes of his case as follows:

"George Ham, head of the advertising department of the C. P. R., is at the Royal. He intends to leave in the morning. The reports that have been circulated as to Mr. Ham's feeble state of health are happily incorrect. He looks quite as happy as he says he felt when he received \$5 for reporting the proceedings of a bunch of bush legislators, who comprised the county council of the small Ontario town where he had the honorable and arduous position of printer's devil. It is reported that Mr. Ham got more ink stains on his hands than any other devil who had ever occupied that important position in the rural weekly upon which he shed the effulgent rays of his genius a half century ago.

Mr. Ham passed through the various stages of evolution and was able to retire from it some years ago, and now is a respectable railway man. He says that the report that the Canadian Pacific Railway is the greatest railway in the world is quite correct. It has attained this commanding position since Mr. Ham was added to the staff. Even since he became chief of the advertising department of the company, it has been a source of wonderment to Mr. Ham how the road attained the little prominence that it had without his services in the publicity department.

REV. DR. LATHERN DEAD.

Was at One Time Pastor of Fredericton
Methodist Church.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 8.—Rev. John Lathern, D. D., one of the most loveable clergymen in Halifax, and probably the most outstanding figure in Maritime Methodism, died tonight, after a short illness. He had been in failing health for six months, but recently rallied and was around the city until a week ago, when his last illness came.

He was in his seventy-third year, and was born in England. He studied for a mining engineer, but later joined the British Wesleyan conference, and was ordained in 1859, immediately coming to Canada and becoming pastor of the Methodist church at Fredericton, N. B.

He was elected president of the Nova Scotia conference in 1882, and was appointed editor of the Wesleyan in 1886, which position he filled with distinguished ability until a few years ago. He has resided in Halifax nearly twenty years. He was a graceful and easy writer, and was the author of several treatises and pamphlets.

As a preacher he easily ranked among the ablest in the Methodist church, eloquent, impressive and singularly sympathetic. He was an ardent advocate of temperance. Prominent in the Evangelical and Lord's Day Alliance and a most enthusiastic supporter of church union.

The loss of this "old man eloquent" will be keenly felt by all denominations in this city, where he was loved and respected by all.

The Factory Commission.

The commission will hold meetings at St. John and Moncton in the near future, to complete the work. A report will be prepared for submission to the Legislature at the next session.
