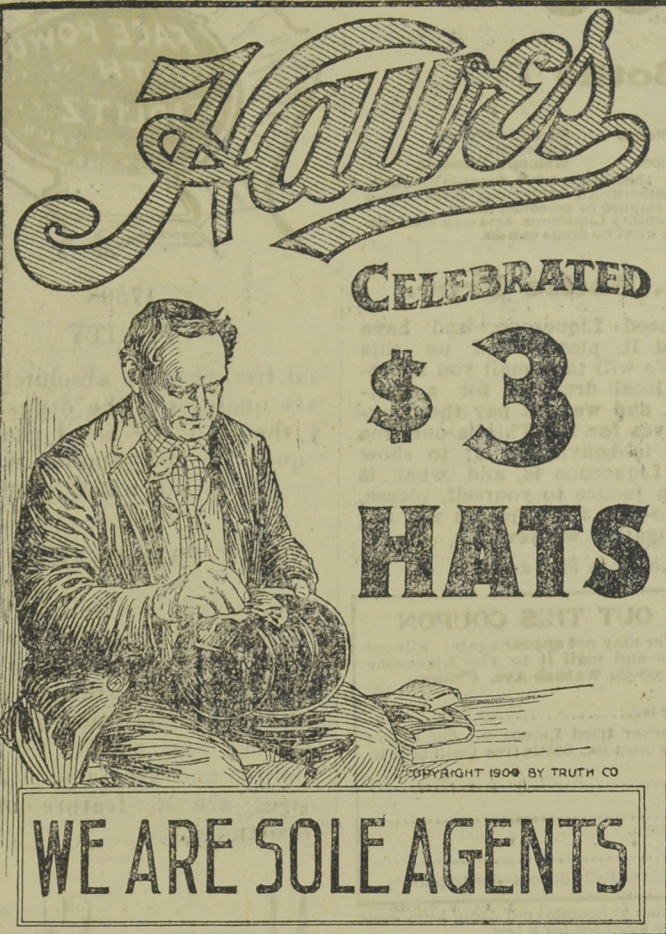

JAPS IN HOT PURSUIT.

They Are Expected at Harbin in April.

CZAR AND HIS MINISTERS DISCUSS PROSPECTS OF PEACE.

Tokio, March 19.—Headquarters of the Japanese armies in the field, reporting under today's date, says: "Our detachment continuing its advance north pursued the enemy to Kalyuan (some 20 miles north of Tie Pass.)"

"Kalyuan was evacuated by the enemy on Saturday after he had set fire to the railroad station."

LINEVITCH SENDS GLOOMY REPORT.

St. Petersburg, March 19.—Commander-in-chief Linévitch in a telegram dated Saturday, says:

"On March 17 Japanese batteries bombarded our divisions in the valleys of Tavanpung and Yenpi. The enemy appeared near Kaotaise (on the railroad about 22 miles north of Tie Pass) and their cavalry has occupied Pakoman. Our armies continue their concentrations."

Gunshu Pass, (about 60 miles north of Mukden), March 19.—Morning.—The first army, which has been covering the retreat of the Russian forces from the south, is withdrawing slowly, checking comparatively light attacks by the Japanese. The Japanese are conducting a flanking operation on the right, and from the Russian column Japanese batteries are visible, keeping pace a short distance away.

OYAMA LIKELY TO FULFIL PROMISE.

How far or how rapidly Field Marshal Oyama will be able to continue the pursuit remains to be seen but the Chinese at Harbin expect him there April 10, and if this opinion proves to be founded on a Japanese proclamation, many persons here, remembering the fulfillment of Oyama's assurances regarding the occupation of Mukden, March 10, will be inclined to accept three weeks as the limit.

The Russian government continues to declare whatever may be the fate of Harbin and of the present Eastern army, the war will continue. Vice Admiral Rojstvensky's orders to try issues with Vice Admiral Togo have not been cancelled, preparations for the mobilization of a new army are continuing and the financial department is busy with measures to provide necessary funds.

MUNICIPALITIES COMMITTEE.

Organized this Morning Electing Mr.

Allen Chairman—St. John Bill

Considered.

The municipalities committee of the legislature met this morning and elected Mr. Allen chairman.

The bill in amendment of the act, to authorize the St. John common council to make a grant of money for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the assessment committee was considered.

Mr. Maxwell explained that the object of the bill was to enable the common council to make further expenditures to enable the commissioners to obtain information in regard to the rental of real estate.

Mr. Copp objected to the third section which provides a heavy penalty for refusing to give information or giving incorrect information to the commissioners.

As there was no section authorizing any further expenditure of money, the bill was held over until Wednesday to enable Mr. Maxwell to communicate with the common council.

The auto bill will be taken up by the committee tomorrow morning.
