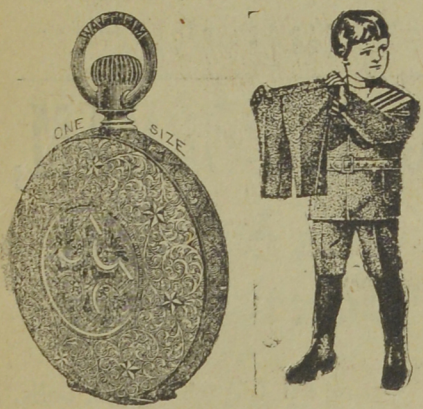

AGAINST GRANTING A BONUS.

City Council Does Not Look With Favor on Proposition of Morgans & Co.

MR. J. D. PHINNEY OPPOSED THE PETITION ON BEHALF OF MR. EBEN MILLER.

The city council in committee last evening further considered the application of E. A. Morgans & Co., for a bonus of \$15,000 to enable them to engage in the manufacture of carriages on a large scale. Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C., on behalf of Eben Miller, opposed the granting of a bonus. The matter was afterwards discussed by the committee and the general opinion seemed to be that the proposition put forward by the company was a little too vague to justify the council in granting the prayer of the petition. The following resolution, moved by Ald. Barbour, and seconded by Ald. Everett, was adopted:

"Resolved, that this council is not adverse to assisting in the establishment of new industries in the city of a suitable character, but does not consider that the present application conforms to the necessary requirements."

Mr. Phinney, in his address to the council on behalf of Mr. Miller, stated that his client had been manufacturing carriages in the city for twenty-six years and had always been able to discharge his obligations. He was not afraid to meet any of his competitors on even ground, but he objected as a taxpayer to their receiving financial assistance from the treasury of the city. The company, which had applied for assistance according to the petition, apparently now had good financial backing, and Mr. Miller did not think it was fair that he should be taxed in order that his business might be injured. It had been stated to the council at the last meeting that the other manufacturers of the city had no objection to the Morgans Company receiving a bonus. As far as Mr. Miller was concerned he

was never consulted on the matter, and he certainly did object to a bonus being given.

Mr. Phinney thought that competition in the carriage business was already very keen, and it would be unfair to Mr. Miller if any undue advantage was given to the proposed company. He believed that it was all right to assist new companies which would not enter into competition with existing industries, but a mistake would be made if it was done in this case. Mr. Clarke, who spoke on Mr. Morgans' behalf, had assured the council that he had no personal interest in the matter, yet as a matter of fact he was a dealer in carriages, and had agencies in different parts of the provinces. It seemed reasonable that he would require the agency for the Morgans' concern, and would practically have a monopoly of the business. He (Phinney) knew of no special reason why a bonus should be given to the factory. If steam power was introduced it would not give employment to mechanics already here, as they are used to hand work and a different class would be needed. The city has already bonused the shoe factory, but the concern did not enter into competition with local industries. Taxes were likely to increase in the next few years, and Mr. Phinney did not think it would be wise for the council to engage in any special venture at the present time.

It is likely that at the council meeting this evening some action will be taken towards getting a bill through the legislature to enable the council to grant financial assistance to any new industry locating here, providing the rate-payers approve of the same by means of a plebiscite.

THE LAST SAD RITES.

Remains of the Late James Edney Laid to Rest.

The funeral of the late Mr. James Edney took place at 3.30 o'clock this afternoon from his brother's home on Charlotte street and was largely attended. It was under the auspices of the Fire Department and the members of that organization walked in a body in advance of the hearse. The band of the 71st York Regiment led the procession.

An impressive funeral service was conducted at the house by Rev. A. A. Rideout, who paid an eloquent tribute to the deceased. At the close of the service the remains were borne to the hearse in waiting and the funeral cortege was formed and proceeded to the rural cemetery, where interment was made.

The pall bearers were Capt. Fleet, and Messrs. Andrew Lindsay, John Tomar, Roy Smith, John Bolster and William Thorburn, all members of the Hook and Ladder Company.

There were a number of beautiful floral tributes, the list including a wreath from the fire department and a crescent from Acting Chief Rutter. Undertaker George W. Adams had charge of the funeral arrangements, and Acting Chief Rutter was marshal.

THE LATE JAMES HAYES.

The funeral of the late James Hayes took place at ten o'clock this morning from the residence of his parents, St. Marys, and was one of the largest seen at that place for some time. The remains were taken to St. Anthony's church, where Rev. Father Ryan celebrated High Mass of Requiem, and Rev. Father Hayes, cousin of the deceased, read the prayers. Rev. Father Ryan delivered an eloquent tribute to the deceased young man, at the close of which he explained the ceremonies connected with the service. The church was crowded, all classes being present to attest their esteem for the deceased. The pall bearers were Messrs. J. Val Magee, Fred Duffy, Charles Duffy and Harry Bowlan. J. G. Adams had charge of the funeral arrangements.
