

RUSSIA'S PROTEST.

To the Powers Against China's Alleged Breaches of Neutrality.

SECOND PACIFIC SQUADRON LEAVES SUEZ.

Much Discontent Among the Russian People.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Tokio, Jan. 13.—Japanese armored cruiser, Tokiwa, captured on the sea of Japan on Jan. 11th, the British steamer Rosely, loaned with coal consigned to Vladivostok.

Breaches of Neutrality.

Paris, Jan. 13.—The Associated Press learns authoritatively that Russia's note, addressed to the powers relative to China's neutrality, gives what Russia claims absolute proof of Chinese breaches. Three main complaints are made:

First:—That the Island of Miatiao, in the Straits of Pechili, opposite Port Arthur, have been constantly visited by the Japanese without Chinese interference, as a strategical base and as a harbor for the Japanese torpedo boats.

Second:—The Chinese army at the border accepted the command of Japanese officers.

Third:—Chinese firms have been constantly working with the Japanese, supplying them with provisions, military accoutrements and general war stores. ...

The note lengthily sets forth the details of complaints that China has not given a satisfactory explanation of the breaches of neutrality, and therefore Russia advises the powers that she intends to use complete liberty of action with regard to the future abuse of neutrality.

Tokio, Jan. 13.—A report received yesterday from the Imperial Military Headquarters of the Japanese Army at Kores says that the Japanese garrison at Ham Heug defeated a detachment of Siberian Cossacks near Honan. The Russians retreated in disorder, leaving their dead.

Suez, Egypt, Jan. 13.—The division of the Russian second Pacific squadron, commanded by Botovsky, sailed for the south this morning, presumably for Jibuti, French Somaliland.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 12.—The government seemingly is about to make the irrevocable situation that prestige abroad and the situation at home necessitate the continuation of the war till peace with dignity is possible. Beyond this point, however, confusion exists, especially regarding the immediate development of the interior situation. Emperor Nicholas is still apparently vacillating as to whether he shall allow M. Witte full sway, in the meantime declining to permit Prince Sviatopolk-Mirsky to retire, although the latter persists in the view that the confidence of the people in the manner in which the reform manifest is to be worked out is vital, and that this is impossible if the work is to be left completely in the hands of the bureaucrats. Direct consultation with the representative classes interested he considers essential.

It has now been definitely established that the third section of the manifesto as it was originally drafted by Minister Sviatopolk-Mirsky provided for representation of the Zemstvos in the council of the empire, and that it was stricken out against his earnest protest. Prince Sviatopolk-Mirsky's retirement from the ministry of the interior continues to be considered as only a matter of a short time, although there is seeming evidence that the emperor hopes by temporizing to avoid the necessity of concentrating the reins of power in the hands of M. Witte. Should a real storm break, however, no one doubts that M. Witte is the one strong man in sight who can be called to the bridge.

The lack of cohesion and alignment of the forces opposed to the existing state of things, and mutual distrust of each other's programme seem to make anything approaching actual revolution at the present time unworthy of serious consideration.

Demonstrations, and even disorders on a large scale, in the centres of population are regarded by the authorities as possible, accompanied by a recurrence of terrorism by those who believe the bomb is the only weapon with which they can fight absolutism. This last is really considered the likeliest and most deplorable possibility in the near future. For the moment, however, all is quiet in the interior, the people seem-

ingly being absorbed with the Christmas holidays.

No further disorders have occurred in connection with the mobilizing, the only active movement of any sort noted being demonstrations at Nijni, Novgorod and Moscow, both confined to meetings of school professors, who took advantage of the occasion to protest against the disabilities under which, they declared, the staffs of the universities labored, and adopted resolutions in favor of reforms on the line of the recent Zemstvo memorial but going farther than the emperor's manifesto. The meeting at Nijni Novgorod was dispersed by the police and several persons outside the hall were injured, but none seriously.

DR. BOWSER'S DEATH.

Kent County Physician Succumbed to Consumption.

Rexton, Kent Co., Jan. 13.—Dr. James Bowser died here last night of consumption, after an illness of three years.

He was forty-five years of age and a son of the late Wm. Bowser, a merchant here. Besides his mother he leaves one sister, Mrs. George A. Irving of this place, and two brothers, Frank of the Customs Department, Vancouver, and W. J. Bowser, M. P. for Vancouver city, B. C.

Dr. Bowser practised his profession here and in Sackville, also in Kingston, New York, where he practised as an eye and ear specialist.

He was considered one of the cleverest medical men in the county.

Louis Michaud, an old and highly respected resident of Richibucto, died yesterday, aged 70 years. He leaves one daughter, Mrs. Maloney, of Norton, Mass., and two sons.

AWARDED HEAVY DAMAGES.

Grand Trunk Engineer Scored Against the Company for Injuries Received.

London, Ont., Jan. 13.—In the assize court in the case of Phibbs vs. the Grand Trunk Railroad, the jury awarded a verdict to the plaintiff of \$3,800 equal to three years wages.

Phibbs was driver of a G. T. R. engine in an accident in which plaintiff was seriously injured. The court found the G. T. R. guilty of negligence.

Ex-M. P. for Halifax Persuaded to Accept.

KIDD OF CARLETON WILL GIVE UP SEAT IN FAVOR OF BORDEN.

Tory Convention to be Held this Year.

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—At the adjourned caucus of the Conservative members and senators at 10 o'clock this morning Senator DeBoucherville chairman, Mr. R. L. Borden was present and was persuaded to remain leader of the Conservative party.

Mr. Kidd, M. P. for Carleton, Ontario, expressed his willingness to resign his seat in the leader's favor and a mass meeting will be called at once in Mr. Kidd's constituency to get permission of the electorate to accept his resignation in favor of Borden.

Regarding the suggestion for a convention of the party to be held within a year, it was agreed to by Mr. Borden.
