## ONTARIO POLITICS.

Toronto Traitors who Plotted  
Against Prime Minister RossAND TRIED TO FORM A COALITION  
DURING HIS ABSENCE.

Toronto, Jan. 7.—The reason for the sudden departure of J. S. Willison from the chief editor's chair in the Globe office was, for the first time, made public in the columns of the Ottawa Free Press. While premier of Ontario, Hon. G. W. Ross, was absent in England, poor Willison took it upon himself to formulate publicity which would pave the way for a coalition government with Mr. Whitney and two of his followers in the cabinet of seven members. Hon. G. W. Ross was to have been forced aside and given the lieutenant governorship.

When Mr. Ross returned from England he promptly punished the leader of the cabal against himself, and so rigorous was his comment that the few men who had listened to The Globe editor, drew their skirts away from Mr. Willison. That gentleman promptly resigned his position. It was the only door open for escape from his untenable position.

His hasty exit cost J. W. Flavelle a matter of \$50,000, for that gentleman at once engaged Mr. Willison as editor of a projected newspaper. The price of newspaper properties soared high up, and the News which had been on the market and was valued at \$75,000, cost Mr. Flavelle \$135,000. This was paid for the good will, for most of the plant was obsolete. The launching of a new paper was out of the question, for it takes from five to seven years for a daily paper to establish itself in a city, and both Messrs. Flavelle and Willison were impatient to get after the Premier.

Only one member of the Ontario cabinet who seriously listened to Mr. Willison, is at present an active colleague of the Hon. G. W. Ross, and he would not be in the cabinet now but for the difficulty experienced in finding a man to take his place.

Those in the "nest of traitors" cuddled into the bull-rushes on the return of the Premier. In his good natured way Mr. Ross promptly forgot and forgave when the ringleader had deserted the nest. Nearly all the men implicated in this futile plot against Premier Ross are now publicly arrayed against the Ontario Liberal government.

Mr. Willison knew well the power of the newspaper in modern politics. He had been accorded full and free control of the Globe, but in plotting against his Ontario chieftain he forgot that he did not really own the Globe newspaper. The directors of the Globe promptly disowned Willison when they found that the talk of coalition was merely a veil to hide the traitorous conduct of a few alleged kingmakers. David Russell can sympathize with Mr. Willison.

The machavellianism of the whole plot, in which Mr. Whitney now acknowledges that he was interested, forms a complete chain of circumstantial evidence in the after conception and carrying out of the Gamey plot. That this base-fronted political lingo should manufacture his story alone is inconceivable.

The Gamey plot was hatched in the first moments of fury following the defeat of the Willison coalition plot.

Mr. Whitney is proud of the ability shown by his colleague, Gamey. The editor of The News is jealous of the same Gamey, for his plot was staged and Mr. Willison's was strangled.

Sly trickery, bold intrigues and monumental falsehoods characterize the policy of the opposition. Not by any fair frontal attack could they assail the straight administration of the Ontario Liberals.

Their reliance today is upon deception and intrigue. They arraign the government for the mistakes of over-zealous supporters.

Gamey lost his nerve when his manipulation of his stage money was being inquired into. He fled to Buffalo, and returned only after receiving the assurance from the Liberals that he would not be prosecuted.

Willison, Whitney and Gamey—is it any wonder that honest Conservatives, knowing these men as well, should heartily despise them?

Newspapers like the Toronto World are reprinting from the Globe files the editorials inspired by Willison before his hasty departure from that journal. In crediting these to the Globe they are producing the evidence of Willison's duplicity and proving the shallow foundation upon which is based Mr. Whitney's boast that he was invited to join a Coalition government by M. Ross. Whitney's assertion is absurd. He knows it.

Mr. Whitney is challenged to mention the names of the two Ontario cabinet ministers whom he alleges Mr. Willison had hypnotized during the Premier's sojourn in Britain.
