TO-DAY'S TESTIMONY

In the Manslaughter Trial at Hampton.

NOTHING OF IMPORTANCE DEVELOPED AT THIS MORNING'S SESSION.

Hampton, N. B., Jan. 13.—The trial of Oscar Wright, charged with the death of McKnight, was resumed this morning. Sam Keith was the first witness on the stand. He told about figuring in the row. He hit somebody and was hit himself. He saw a scrap between Wright and McKnight.

Geo. Cosack also testified but his evidence was of no importance.

Mrs. Olive Wright, step-mother of the prisoner was put on the stand and told about the part she took in the fracas. A number of years ago she married Jesse Keith, and after living together some time he went away and she had not seen him since. Subsequently she married David Wright who died last summer.

At this stage, the witness not feeling well, was excused, and her evidence will be resumed tomorrow.

Frank Peterson and Wm. Young also gave evidence, but nothing of importance was elicited from them.

The court adjourned at 2.15 this afternoon.
