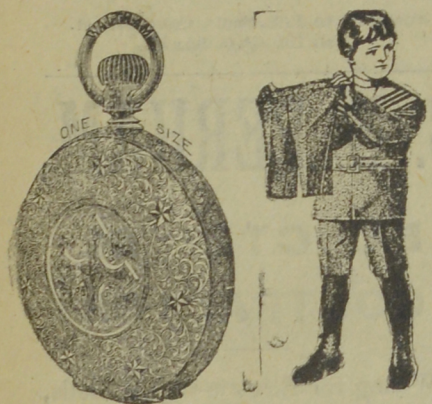

FACTORY BILL PASSED.

Mr. Smith Sets Himself Right on Certain Carleton County Legislation.

HOUSE MAKING GOOD PROGRESS WITH ITS BUSINESS

The house met Tuesday at 3 o'clock. At the instance of Mr. Ryan the Moncton bill was referred back to the committee of the whole house. He contended that it should not pass as there was only a majority of one for it in the council, and the mayor of Moncton was opposed to it.

The speaker thought the bill should pass as there was a petition in favor of it from the leading citizens of Moncton, and also as to one of its provisions from the board of trade. A vote being taken on the bill it was agreed to, reported to the speaker, read a third time and passed.

Mr. Robertson presented the petition of the Inglewood Paper and Pulp Company in favor of their bill.

Mr. McLatchy presented the petition of the town of Campbellton in favor of their bill.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie gave notice that he would refer the Maine and New Brunswick Light and Power Company's bill to the committee on corporations tomorrow for the purpose of settling some questions with regard to the driving of logs over their dam.

Mr. Clarke gave notice of motion for Friday with reference to the desirability of the Dominion government taking over the New Brunswick Southern Railway.

Mr. King introduced a bill to improve the supply of Sussex. Mr. Robertson introduced bills to remove doubts as to the extent of the St. John Harbour, and to empower the city of St. John to establish telephone poles.

The house went into committee on bills. Mr. Ryan in the chair.

On the bill to incorporate the East Florenceville Water Company Mr. Smith said: Before going into consideration of the bill to incorporate the East Florenceville Water company, I desire to say a few words to the committee, not only in explanation of the bill, but for the purpose also of correcting a wrong impression that seems to prevail in the communities which might have been affected had the bill, as it was originally presented, passed and become law.

The bill was drawn by the hon. member for Charlotte, who has since told me that it was almost an exact copy of other bills brought before this legislature seeking the same power.

The power to expropriate water privileges for domestic and fire purposes is generally incorporated in such legislation and that is why it originally appeared in this one and not because the company promoting this legislation were at all desirous of taking advantage of that clause, as there are no springs, brooks or other privileges that could to my mind be successfully used to supply water for domestic and fire purposes in the village of East Florenceville, which is the object of the bill.

A petition was sent here asking that the power to expropriate be not allowed and as soon as the bill came before the committee on corporations which was the first opportunity, the Hon. members of that committee well knew that I once stated to them that the section giving the company power to expropriate being of no use to the company that I was desirous, in order to remove all doubt in the minds of my neighbors, of having the section entirely struck out. In discussing that matter with my other two colleagues who, it appears had some correspondence with parties in our county affected by the legislation, I also assured them, as those gentlemen will testify, that the clause which was petitioned against was of no earthly use to the company and, in order to remove all doubt, I would much rather that it be struck out.

The only real object of the bill, so far as the company is concerned, is to enable them to acquire a water system that was installed by myself some years ago and also to enable the company to exercise control and repair and extend the system if necessary. Hon. members can well see the necessity of the company having the power to control at all times the supply of water to the tenants, and they will as readily observe the necessity of giving power to the company to repair. Having crossed private lands by nothing more than verbal consent, a conflict of opinion might arise when the company found it necessary to enter upon such lands in order to repair this system. This company only has the right to extend along the highway in which case it would be necessary to obtain permission from the superintendent of highways.

Another feature which has met with disfavor is that part of the expropriation clause which says in the parish of Peel and adjoining parishes. As I understand it, some have endeavored to make it appear that this would allow the company the roving right to go anywhere in the parish of Peel or those parishes bordering onto expropriate springs, wells and other water privileges now held by citizens, and compel them to take water from the company which is an entirely erroneous impression, as the object of the bill is simply and solely to supply water to the village of East Florenceville, and under no legislation asked for would the company have the power to do more. I felt it my duty, Mr. Chairman, to make this explanation in order to remove any misapprehension from the minds of the citizens in reference to the matter. The bill has been carefully gone over in the committee on corporations and now in order that it may be further considered by the full committee of this House, I move that it be taken up section by section.

Mr. Clarke stated that he inserted the expropriation clause in this bill because this clause was usual in similar bills. Mr. Smith drew his attention to the clause and asked that it be limited or struck out. This had been done when the bill was before the committee on corporations. The bill was agreed to. The bill to incorporate the Carleton Masonic Hall Company was also agreed to. The House went into committee on the factory bill. Mr. Allen in the chair. Mr. Clarke suggested that the number of employees required to constitute a factory might be increased from six to a higher number. On the section limiting the number of hours that a woman could work in a factory in case of emergency Mr. Grimmer read a letter from Ganong Brothers, representing that there were times just before Christmas when their experienced hands had to work long hours. The section was amended by allowing in an emergency that with the permission of the inspector, thirteen and a half hours a day, or eighty-one hours a week. These hours are to be allowed during not more than thirty-six days in a year. Mr. Legere said that these hours would interfere with the lobster factories, where the work had to be done under pressure and when the fish arrived. Hon. Mr. Pugsley said that perhaps an exception might be made in favor of lobster factories. Mr. Clarke thought that fish canning factories should also be excepted. Mr. Young thought that an exception should be made in favor of fruit canning factories. On the section requiring the doors of all factories to open outward Hon. Mr. Hill read a letter from Lewis Haley, whose factory employed sixty-five men at St. Stephen, asking that a change be made. Some of the large doors in his factory out of which goods were taken were sliding doors and it would be inconvenient to change them. Mr. Maxwell thought that this provision ought not to apply to doors for the reception of goods out only to doors used by the employees for entering or leaving the building. Hon. Mr. Pugsley amended the section so as to limit it to ordinary doors, and to except doors for the reception of goods. The committee separated until half past seven. The committee resumed at eight o'clock, and the bill was agreed to, with certain amendments. The number of persons required to constitute a factory was reduced to ten, and lobster, fish and fruit canneries were exempted from its operation where situated outside of towns and cities. Mr. Robertson objected to girls in cotton factories being allowed an eleven hour day. Hon. Mr. Pugsley said that their working hours were limited to sixty hours a week, which gave them a half holiday on Saturday if they worked eleven hours others days. That was the law in Quebec and as we had to compete with the Quebec mills, it would be unfair to put our mills at a disadvantage with them. Mr. Grimmer said the attorney general had hit the nail on the head: The present eleven hour system and Saturday half holiday was an arrangement made between the employers and their employees. When the speaker had taken the chair Mr. Young gave notice of a motion that the Carquet and Gulf Shore Railways should be taken by the Dominion government as part of the Intercolonial. The house adjourned at 9 p. m.
