

STUCCO BABIES LISTENED

First Day's Proceedings at the Dogger Bank Inquiry

BRITISH AND RUSSIAN REPRESENTATIVES READ CHARGES AND DEFENCE.

London, Jan. 20.—In the dull gloom of a misty afternoon in the great State dining-room, which is one of the least interesting of any of the splendid salons of the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the International Arbitration Court held today its first public sitting to judge of the famous Dogger Bank incident. The audience consisted of one hundred pressmen, chiefly English and Russian, and a sprinkling of ladies, whose toilettes exhibited but few of the characteristics of Parisian chic, being mostly of the massive and beforesaid kind which bespeak Berlin, Vienna and St. Petersburg.

The decorations of the room were in old gold, with stucco babies grouped over each panel of the wall and moulded in a listening attitude, but it is improbable that they ever before listened to anything so dull and unmusical as today's proceedings, which consisted of the calling out by the British and Russian government agents of the statement of the case on either side. The British accent was clearly noticeable in Mr. O'Beirne's delivery, while the melancholy intonations of the Slav characterized the reading of M. Nekloudoff. Both spoke without any warmth or emphasis whatever.

When they had terminated, Admiral Fournier, who presided in a frock coat of ancient cut and a black tie, adjourned the proceedings. Admiral Davis sat at the extreme left of the President, next to the Russian Admiral, Doubasoff, whose keenly-cut features and neat figure contrasted strongly with the massive, bearded chop of the Austrian Admiral, Von Spaun, and the majestic blandness of the British Admiral, Sir Lewis Beaumont, who sat at the President's right.

CALLED BACK TO LIFE.

Lancashire Woman's Gruesome Experiences.

New York, Jan. 20.—A London despatch to The Herald, dated Jan. 18, relates the following:—Mrs. Holden, a young woman of Hampton, a village in the county of Lancashire, under extraordinary circumstances was brought back to life while being measured for her coffin by an Accrington undertaker. She looked very pale and feeble, but cheerfully told the correspondent: "I have been subject to faintings ever since I was born, and this is the third time they have put me by as dead. When I was fifteen years old I was laid out for three days, and, a similar thing happened when I was a small child. But I do not remember anything about that, except what my mother told me."

Mrs. Holden was supposed to have died at 5 o'clock on Monday morning and a few minutes before the hour she told her husband she felt she was going to die. He thought her dying; her hands were very cold and her heart almost without motion. After a time her heart and pulse seemed to him without movement at all. He carried her to an upper room and laid her on a mattress. With the exception of a sheet and a night dress the poor woman lay in the room six hours in the bitter cold. Dr. Shotton of Hampton made out a certificate that she died of heart disease and exhaustion when a statement by a neighbor that she had suffered a blow on the head from a chicken thief, and this in his opinion had accelerated her death, led the physician to immediately telephone that the death certification be not accepted. The undertaker was measuring her body in the cold room when he was startled by the twitching of her eyelids. This resulted in restoratives being applied.

Bride Didn't Come.

A Halifax despatch says: F. P. Howard came to Canada last year, leaving his fiancée behind him in England. He secured a good position in Toronto and it was arranged that the young lady should come on the Parisian and meet him here to be wedded. 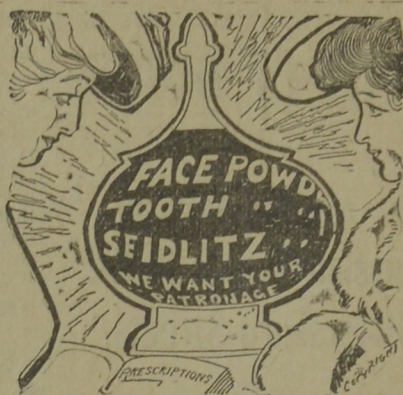

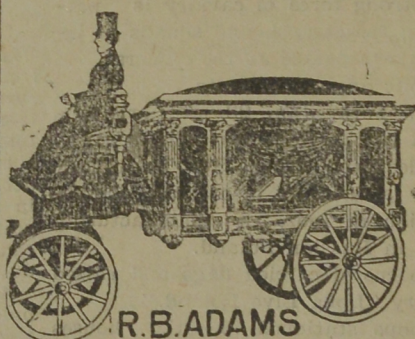
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
