The firemen were called to the ruins of the west end saw mill on Saturday evening, to extinguish a fire which had broken out among some rubbish and edgings where it had been smouldering since the night before. They remained on the scene for over an hour.

It is reported about the city today that two deer were slaughtered in the woods near Royal Road on Friday last. About eight inches of snow fell, and in some places drifted quite badly. The St. John train did not arrive this morning until eleven o'clock, and the western train is reported four hours late. The express on the I. C. R. was delayed four hours by the storm.

CRUSHED BY A TRAIN.

C. P. R. Section Man Badly Hurt at McAdam Junction.

Mr. Allan G'over, a C. P. R. section man, was the victim of a very serious accident at McAdam Junction on Saturday evening. He was in the act of alighting from a moving train, when he slipped on the steps and fell upon the rails. The wheels of the truck passed over his left leg crushing it in a terrible manner. He was also badly cut about the head and face.

He was brought to this city by the late train on Saturday evening and admitted to the Victoria Hospital, where the physicians found it necessary to amputate the injured limb below the knee. The unfortunate man is resting easily today and will recover.

A Large Funeral.

The funeral of the late Mr. D. W. Burpee took place at Sheffield on Sunday morning, and a large number of friends and relations paid the last tribute of respect to the deceased. An impressive funeral service was conducted at the house by Rev. G. M. White, assisted by Rev. Harry Harrison, and interment was made in the Congregational burying ground. The list of mourners included Mr. Tyler C. Burpee, engineer of maintenance of the I. C. R., Mr. Moses Burpee, chief engineer of the Bangor and Aroostook railway, Mr. George Burpee of Vancouver B. C., Mr. D. W. Burpee, Inspector Bridges and Mr. H. H. Bridges of this city, and Messrs. Ernest and Dugald Burpee of Sheffield. Undertaker George W. Adams has charge of the funeral arrangements.
