BARON DE ROTHSCHILD DEAD.

Head of the French Branch of a Great Banking Firm.

AND RENOWNED FOR HIS LARGE HEARTED CHARITY.

Financial Circles Interested.

Paris, May 26.—(Special)—Baron Alphonse de Rothschild, head of the French branch of the great banking house bearing the name of Rothschild, and a governor of the Bank of France, died this morning at 4.30 from acute bronchitis, and aggravated gout.

The eminent financier had been sinking slowly for many days, but there was no apprehension that his death was imminent. He first took to his bed two weeks ago, but several rallies gave hope of recovery.

Two days ago the Baron began to fail rapidly, and his condition assumed a disquieting form. Although he kept up an animated conversation with members of his family and old servants, the patient became very weak, and last night entered upon a comatose state, passing away quietly this morning, surrounded by his family.

Announcement of the Baron's death caused widespread regret. Besides his position in the financial world, Baron Alphonse was known for lavish charities, one of his latest being the gift of \$2,000,000 for the erection of workmen's homes.

News of the Baron's death caused a deep impression in financial circles generally. It is said that his death would probably momentarily influence extensive interests in which the house is concerned, but that it would not have a lasting effect on the markets.

Deceased will be succeeded as the head of the Paris banking house by Baron Lambert de Rothschild of Brussels, who business capacity has earned him a world-wide reputation.

ECHOES OF BEERSVILLE TROUBLE.

Persons Interested in Late Polley Prosecution Fight Shy of Moncton.

Moncton, May 26.—(Special)—It is evident that the last trouble between certain members of the Imperial Coal Company operating at Beersville, Kent County, has not yet been healed. Since the Seely-Polley case in the police court here last fall when the information was dismissed with a reprimand to some of the parties interested in the prosecution certain New York members of the Imperial Coal Company have fought shy of Moncton.

Recently one of the parties who gave evidence for the prosecution desired to come to Moncton to attend

a meeting of another concern he is interested in, but he decided not to cross the line until he was satisfied that the defendant, Polley, would not molest him.

The outcome of the negotiations is that the New York man will be allowed to pay a short visit to Moncton, providing he does not make his stay too long.

Intimations have been made, however, that proceedings against another New Yorker who figured prominently in the case in question, and who continues his visits here may not longer be withheld.

CRAFTY RUSSIANS.

Sending Ships to Shanghai to Deceive Japs—Togo and Rojstvensky's Locations Unknown.

JAPANESE TACTICS PUZZLING TO RUSSIANS.

Tokio, May 26.—(Special)—It is believed here that the action of the Russians sending some vessels to Shanghai is part of a diversion plan to draw off a portion of the Japanese fleet.

The whereabouts of Admiral Rojstvensky's fleet is not reported. Opinion is divided whether it is on the Pacific or has returned to the lower Chinese coast.

The location of Admiral Togo's fleet continues unknown, but the Japanese are quite confident that Admiral Togo is prepared to meet the situation.

St. Petersburg, May 26.—Nothing further has been heard here respecting the naval battle south of the Island of Formosa.

Admiral Togo's fleet was reported to have blown up a bridge over a tributary of Tung Liao, twenty miles south of the Russian main line.

Gunshu Pass, May 26.—Japanese tactics are puzzling. They give way at the slightest pressure against the centre both at the railroad and the Manchurian road.

The Chinese explain the retirement by trouble among reserves, some of whom they say are almost in a state of revolt because the government has not kept its promise to return them to Japan.

The retirement of the Japanese centre is interpreted by some Russian officers as a postponement of Field Marshal Oyama's offensive because of the bad state of the roads, but this view is not shared by all the officers.

A WHOLESALE FINE.

Moncton Beer that is Said to be Intoxicating.

Moncton, May 26.—(Special)—Henry Cormier, wholesale dealer in beer, upon which a number of saloon keepers have been proceeded against for Scott Act violation, admitted C. T. A. violation Tuesday, and was fined \$50 for keeping beer for sale.

WEATHER PROBS.

Toronto, May 26.—(Special)—Maritime—Moderate to fresh south-westerly winds, shifting to north-westerly. Showers this evening and tonight. Saturday, clearing again.

LUMBER MILLS BURNED.

I. C. R. Train Delayed by Big Fire at Amqui, P. Q.

Moncton, May 26.—(Special)—The Maritime Express from Montreal this morning was delayed four or five hours at Amqui, Quebec province, by a big conflagration in Price Bros. lumber mills.

In addition to the mills and a quantity of lumber, two or three I. C. R. cars were burned.

Last night's maritime from Halifax was delayed two hours in Truro by a broken wheel on the dining car.

DIDN'T SEE YACHTS.

Queenstown, May 26.—(Special)—The steamship Caronia, which arrived here this morning from New York, did not sight any of the yachts in Emperor William's prize contest.

WAR SITUATION.

Fake News of Japanese Naval Defeat—The Land Campaign.

London, May 26.—No news has reached London up to this hour regarding the movements of the rival Russian and Japanese fleets, or in any way confirmatory of the rumor from Manila that the fleets had met south of Formosa, and that the Japanese had been defeated.

The news that Vice Admiral Rojstvensky's squadron had passed Formosa served to harden insurance rates at Lloyd's.

Gunshu Pass, May 26.—A squadron of Japanese cavalry, which has been reconnoitering deep into the Russian rear, encountered and defeated a small detachment of Russians north-west of Gunshu Pass, 12 miles from the railway, on May 22nd, and on the following day penetrated almost to the station of Taziatun, 20 miles north of Gunshu Pass.

The appearance of the Japanese so far from their base as an intimation of their desire for information preliminary to turning this flank.

Reports of the movement of Japanese in the direction of Tsitsihar, 500 miles west of Harbin, have been revived.

Chinese hands are active on the Mongolian border. They are harrying the Russian posts, preventing the purchase of supplies, and attacking cattle purchased by the Russians. One Russian detachment which has been buying cattle travelled 270 miles in 11 days. There are daily skirmishes with the bandits.

The attitude of the North Mongolian prince whose territories touch the border, is said to have forbidden Russian merchants and reconnoitering parties to enter his country.

General Kuropatkin arrived here on his special train. The platforms were crowded with brilliantly uniformed generals and members of their staffs, who greeted the former commander-in-chief. As the general's train entered from the south the mail train from the north arrived with the Princess Reuss, who is to become a nursing sister, and with Lieutenant General Sakharoff's wife, who is also to become a nurse.

The crowds on the platform of the railway station nearest the Japanese lines at train time are as elegant and well dressed as those who assemble at the St. Petersburg station on the departure of the international express.

COPPER SULPHATE.

Something About the New Method of Water Filtration.

The proposal of the water committee of the city council to make a test of the copper sulphate sterilization of water, is being warmly commended by citizens. It is generally understood that a mechanical filtration plant will cost a large amount of money, and if a substitute can be found that will answer the purpose equally as well for less expense, it is felt that the council would be justified in giving it a trial.

Investigation in regard to copper sulphate, shows that the amount used for sterilization purposes is about one part to two million parts of water. The less organic matter in the water the more speedy the effect. In favorable cases from two to three hours is sufficient, and cases have been known where sterilization was completed in fifteen minutes. In the most unfavorable cases twelve hours is just as effective as the filtration process.

Copper sulphate has been used in scores of cases to improve the odor, taste and color of water, Moncton being included in the list.

In Columbus, Ohio, the water supply system and sources of contamination are almost similar to those of Fredericton. There was an almost continuous epidemic of typhoid fever, and copper sulphate was given a trial from August 1904 to January, 1905. It was done without the knowledge of the public, and was

stopped when the newspapers raised a cry against it for fear of harmfulness. To alloy four five employees of the health department took three thirty days without showing symptoms of any kind. The report shows that in September and October there were sixteen cases of typhoid in Columbus; in November eight cases and in December four cases. The treatment was stopped on the 5th of January last. In February there were 376 cases of typhoid fever reported, and in March 279.

THE SUSSEX CAMP.

Regimental Order Issued by the Commandant of the 71st.

Following is a copy of a regimental order issued by Lieut.-Col. Loggie, commandant of the 71st regiment: Regimental orders by Lt. Col. Loggie commanding 71st Regiment.

Fredericton, 25th May, 1905. The attention of officers, non-commissioned officers and men of 71st Regiment, is directed to the matter of dress, saluting and growth of hair to be observed on all occasions where uniform is worn.

1. Dress.—The dress of all ranks requires attention, and O. C. companies will do well to inculcate the maxim that the dress appearance as well as the demeanour of soldiers, should on all occasions, and in all situations, be such as to create a respect for the service, and officers of all grades cannot too forcibly point out to those under their command the impropriety of soldiers appearing in public places improperly dressed. Any infringement of dress, not in accordance with regulations laid down will be severely dealt with.

2. Saluting.—The instructions as laid down with regard to saluting are not effectually carried out between officers, N. C. officers and men when in uniform. In the interests of discipline and example, these should be strictly maintained, and the customary observance of the service from subordinate towards superior in all respects carried out.

3. Hair growth.—The growth of hair is often neglected in the regiment and the O. C. draws the particular attention of O. C. companies and the officers and men under their command that any unseemly length of hair and violations of the regulations with reference to moustaches, whiskers and beards will also be severely dealt with. Neglect in carrying out these orders will be considered a breach of discipline, disobedience of orders, and will render the offender liable to forfeit claim to efficiency pay.

4. O. C. companies are ordered before proceeding to camp or any other turnout of the regiment to explain these orders to their commands, and it is to be distinctly understood that any officer, N. C. O., or man found on parade in contravention to these orders will not be permitted to march out with the regiment.
