THE HALIFAX GARRISON.

Fredericton Soldiers Located in Glacis Barracks--Military Vote in Parliament.

Halifax, May 26.—Two companies of the R. C. R. in command of Lieut. Col. Wadmore, reached here last night from Fredericton and Quebec, and were marched to Glacis Barracks.

The men were all tired out, having been up from 3 a. m. and by 9 o'clock were safely housed in bed.

Ottawa, May 26.—On a vote to provide for troops now being enrolled at Halifax and Esplanade, Sir Frederick Borden said that 400 men had been enlisted recently for Halifax garrison.

R. L. Borden asked if there was any truth in the report that the imperial troops were to be retained at Halifax.

Sir Frederick replied that there was no authority for such a statement. There was no difficulty in enlisting infantry, which would comprise three-fourths of the garrison. There would be some difficulty in getting artillery and considerable difficulty in getting engineers. The department expected to get over this difficulty by obtaining permission to enlist reservists of the imperial army, a permission which has been partially given, and also to enlist time-expired men. The department would be ready to assume control on July 1.

At Halifax there were now 2,000 men. It was expected to reduce this number. At Esplanade there were from 300 to 400 men.

On a vote for annual drill, Sir Frederick said that he expected 35,000 men to be drilled this year.

A DOUBLE FUNERAL.

Mr. John Ladds Quickly Follows His Son to the Unknown Country.

The death occurred at his home on Aberdeen street last evening at eight o'clock, after a lingering illness of stomach trouble, of Mr. John Ladds, sr., aged 78 years.

Deceased leaves besides a sorrowing widow, five sons, George G. of Newburyport, Mass., John, Reuben, Samuel and Aaron, of this city, and five daughters, Mrs. H. A. Aiken, Mrs. A. S. Roberts and Miss Margaret, of Newburyport, Mass., Mrs. Joseph McDonald of St. Marys, and Miss Cora of this city.

The late Mr. Ladds resided at Royal Road for forty-six years and removed to this city only a month ago in order that he might have the benefit of attention from a physician.

What makes his death still more sad is that the remains of his son Ephraim arrived only a few hours before his death.

Father and son will be buried Sunday afternoon at St. John's cemetery, Nashwaakiss. The funeral will take place at 12 o'clock with John G. Adams in charge.

IN OLD TIMES.

How May 24th Was Observed Here Sixty-seven Years Ago.

Mr. John Anderson, ex-M. P. P. of the Barony, was among the visitors to the city on Victoria Day. In conversation with a representative of the Herald he stated that it was the second time in his life that he had been privileged to visit Fredericton on May 24th. His first visit, he said, was in 1838, the year after Queen Victoria came to the throne, and he would never forget as long as he lived the enthusiastic manner in which the event was celebrated. The military joined heartily with the citizens in the demonstration, and the town was thronged with visitors. For a wind up to the day's proceedings a barbecue was held on the flats below town.

Mr. Anderson could not help remarking that the difference between the celebration of 1838 and 1905 was quite marked. Mr. Anderson is now

in his eighty-third year, but is as active both mentally and physically as most men twenty years his junior.

IT SAVED HIS LIFE.

Mr. Logan, M. P., Had a Narrow Escape.

Moncton Transcript.—Ald. Jas. Doyle is in receipt of a letter today from Miss Logan, sister of Hon. H. J. Logan, M. P., who is with her brother at Ottawa. Miss Logan states that Mr. Logan has suffered most intensely from the very serious operation which was performed upon the mastoid bones, but yesterday the suffering was not quite so intense.

The process of recovery will no doubt be very slow and his physicians state that it will be some weeks yet before Mr. Logan will be able to leave the hospital. The seriousness of the case was much greater than was anticipated. The patient could not possibly have lived if the last operation had not been performed, but it is now hoped that all danger is past.

Miss Marjorie Barnaby, youngest daughter of W. H. Barnaby of St. John, was successfully operated on Wednesday for appendicitis.

Staff Capt. Perry of the Salvation Army was drowned Wednesday while swimming in the Ottawa River. He was a native of Yarmouth, N. S., was 36 years of age, and leaves a widow and two children at Ottawa.

Sir William Mulock will leave Ottawa next week for London. He will attend a cable conference in London on June 21 as Canada's representative. He will be accompanied by Sir Sanford Fleming, who will represent New Zealand.

A sky-rocket which fell into the lumber yards of Dymont & Baker's planing and sawmills at midnight on Wednesday at London, Ont., started a fire early yesterday morning which resulted in \$75,000 loss. Besides the mills, a million feet of lumber were consumed. Benson's turning factory which was in the path of the flames, was also destroyed.

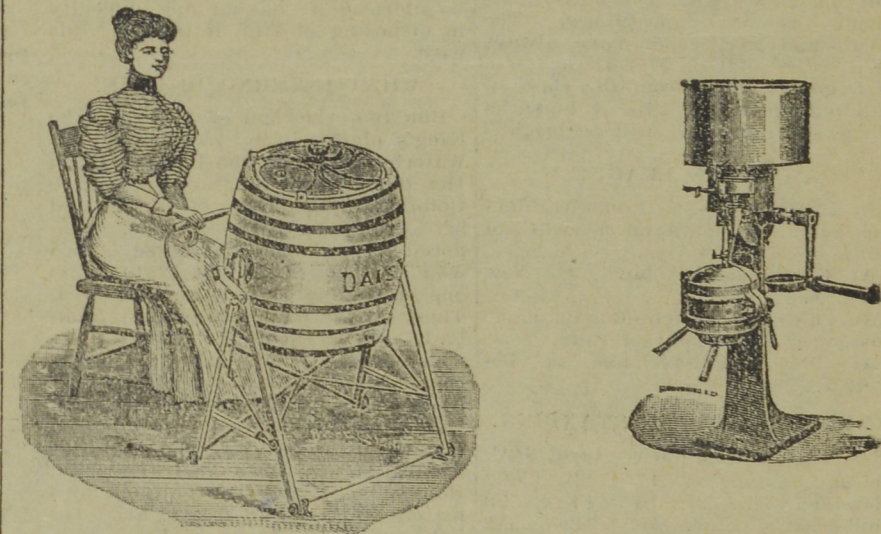
