N. B. LEAGUE DISSOLVED.

For the present at least, says the Telegraph, there will be no New Brunswick league schedule games. This decision is the result of a disagreement as to dates. J. Douglas Black, of the Frederickton Tartars, having sent word yesterday that his team could not agree on the schedule as drawn up.

On the receipt of this word from Mr. Black, a conference was held and resulted in the temporary decision as stated.

It has been found that with a three-team league the schedule could not be arranged satisfactorily to all but it is believed that if there were four teams all could be made workable. An effort will be made to get another team to enter and it is thought yet that the matter can be straightened out.

In the meantime exhibition games will be played, the first of which will be on the Victoria grounds on Saturday between the St. Johns and Portlands. The Tartars would like to play here but owing to the agreement of the two St. John teams to play the idea had to be abandoned. There is no doubt but that the exhibition games will be just as interesting as the league games. The north and south ends have always been rivals and the Frederickton team is a good one. From the class of ball put up on the 24th it looks as if the season's sport will be bright.

WILL HAVE TO ANSWER.

New York, May 23.—President Pulliam today called a meeting of the Board of Directors of the National League, to be held in the Hotel Touraine, Boston, at 10 a. m. Thursday, June 1, to consider the charges filed with him by President Barney Dreyfus of the Pittsburgh Club against Manager McGraw of the New York Club.

President Pulliam also sent to the directors a copy of the charges, and in a letter to the directors accompanying them to Mr. Pulliam said: "That portion of the charges relating to McGraw's alleged misconduct on the ball field on Friday, May 19, consisting of using offensive language to the president of the club, will be considered by me under the authority of the Fleischman resolution for

the maintenance of decency on the ball field. That portion of the charges in which President Dreyfus alleges that Manager McGraw openly charged him with being crooked and controlling the league umpire is of such vital importance, presenting as it does, a crisis in the National League, that I have this day called a meeting of the Board of Directors to pass upon these charges."

New York, May 23.—President H. G. Pulliam of the National League of baseball clubs has sent to the umpires of the National League an order to enforce the two league rules which provide that captains only shall have the right to protest against a decision of the umpire, and that the accuracy of the umpire's judgment shall be unquestioned. President Pulliam also warned the umpires to recognize no one as captains unless he is a player actively engaged in a game, and declares that the Manager shall not be allowed to question a construction of the rules unless he is also captain, and playing in the game. The order is in effect at the games today. The letter concludes: "Unless otherwise notified before the game, National League umpires will recognize the following players as team captains: Boston, Fred Tenney; New York, Dan McGann; Brooklyn, James Sheekhard; Philadelphia, Wm. Gleason; Pittsburgh, Fred. Clarke; Cincinnati, Thomas Cocoran; Chicago, Frank Chance; St. Louis, James Burke."

THE TURF.

NEW YORK PRICES BOOSTED.

New York, May 23.—A new schedule, which increases the price of admission to both the field and grand stand at the Gravesend races was announced by the Brooklyn Jockey Club today, and will continue throughout the season at all the tracks of the Metropolitan Circuit. Regular admission to the grand stand will be \$3 in stead of 2, as in the past, and for women \$1.50 instead of \$1. The price of admission to the field will be \$1 instead of 75 cents.

WILL NOT RACE.

W. J. Furbush, the well known horseman of Newton Centre, Mass., was in St. John on Friday. Mr. Furbush does not intend to bring any horses to Maritime Province tracks this season. In fact he has catalogued all his racing animals, and they will be sold at auction. Mr. Furbush says that the holder of the ticket, which draws Phoebe W., formerly owned by him, need not be alarmed at having any difficulty in disposing of him, if that is his wish.

WHAT INFERNO IS LIKE.

Bon Ino, the dam of Inferno, the King's plate winner, was bred at Waterloo and won the Plate of 1897. Her dam, Bonnie Ino, was second to Colonel in the Plate of 1895, and her grand dam, Bonnie Vic, produced Victorious, the horse that won Mr. Seagram's first Plate, and one of the best horses he ever bred. Thus, on the dam side of the family Inferno has a pretty close connection with the Plate, and it is on this side, too, that the chief excellence of his pedigree is to be found. He has two crosses of imported Maud (by Stockwell) and imported Australian (by West Australian), but Bonnie Ino and Ino have both got ultimately to American mares, and the influence of the blood of Etta, jun., is not desirable. She was by Bill Alexander—Etta, by Star Davis—Sally Black, by John Ross, and John Ross is recorded as by an American horse called Wax, but the name and pedigree of his dam, if she had any, were not preserved for future generations.

YACHTING.

THE OCEAN RACERS.

New York, May 24.—A yacht believed to be Edmund Randolph's bark-rigged Apache, one of the trans-Atlantic racers, was sighted Monday, 665 miles from Sandy Hook, by the Columbia, an Anchor Line steamer, New York for Glasgow. On Monday at 7 a. m., the yacht was about in the same position in which the Atlantic was sighted on Saturday, but 150 miles north of the course taken by the Atlantic, indicating that Mr. Randolph was taking the shortest route. The news of the sighting of the yacht was sent by Marconi wireless to the Marconi station at Cape Race, Newfoundland.

Captain Nierich of the North German Lloyd steamer Bremen, which arrived yesterday from Bremen and Cherbourg, believes that he sighted the Atlantic, which is supposed to be at least among the leaders, on Sunday morning, May 21. The yacht was then 827 miles from Sandy Hook, more than 100 miles further east than when sighted the previous day by three liners. The yacht, when sighted, was in lat. 41 and long. 56. She was seven miles distant from the Bremen and no signals could be distinguished, but she was recognized as a three-masted schooner yacht, of which there are only two in the race, the other being the Cio-wana.

GOLF.

Prestwick, May 24.—Geo. S. Lyon, the Canadian golfer, was knocked out of the golf championship tournament in the second round, being beaten by Wilkie.

In the fourteenth, halved hole in four.

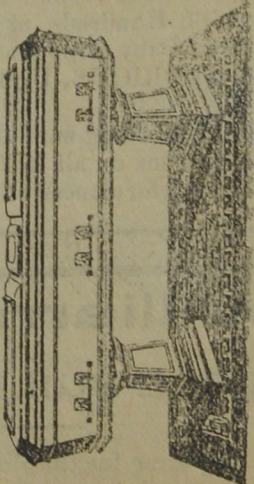
