A DEAD ISSUE.

Lord Dundonald has been making a speech in London, in which he was good enough to observe that while in Canada he lost confidence in Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia. What a pity! But the noble Lord did not tell his hearers that the feeling was mutual; that the minister and government lost confidence in Lord Dundonald, to such an extent indeed that they promptly gave him his discharge papers, and bundled him out of his position.

Lord Dundonald also criticized Sir Frederick Borden's management of the militia, but members of the force all over Canada know—and are not slow to say that Sir Frederick is the most energetic and efficient minister of militia this country ever possessed.

The London correspondents should save themselves the trouble of cabling to this country the mutterings of Lord Dundonald, whose dismissal was made an issue in the last general election in Canada, with a result not very satisfactory to the noble Lord and his friends.

THE TROUBLED TORIES.

The autonomy bill is proving a serious matter for the Tory party in parliament. On the first vote on the measure thirteen prominent members of the party went over to the government, and the now the party is threatened with further splits by the action of Messrs. Monk and Bergeron.

The former wants the dual language system established in the new provinces, and Mr. Bergeron wishes to fasten upon them the real Simon pure separate school.

The Tory party, in view of the position they have already taken, cannot support either of these amendments to the autonomy bill, and the vote will reveal more skeletons in the aggregation that sits to the left of the Speaker in the House of Commons.

The municipal council of Carleton County has named three of its members as delegates to go to Ottawa and urge on the government the desirability of locating the G. T. P. railway down the St. John valley in New Brunswick. The town council of Woodstock and the board of trade have also appointed delegates for the same purpose. The Fredericton board of trade will doubtless send a delegation, and they should be reinforced by members of the city and county councils.

The London Tories, who were so badly knocked out by Hon. C. S. Hyman in the recent bye election, propose to enter a protest against the minister's return. Why can't they take their licking like men?

TOURNAMENT DOUBTFUL.

Local Tennis Club Still Undecided as to Date.

The local tennis club is again a quondary with regard to the date of their match with Rothesay. A special meeting of the club was called for yesterday afternoon at five o'clock by President Bridges when matters were discussed. It was found that if the local club should play the visitors on July 1st they would do

so minus five or six of their players either from absence or other reasons and on this account several of the members favored a postponement. Secretary Randolph said that he had communicated with Mr. Fraser, the secretary of the Rothesay club, and in Mr. Fraser's opinion July 1st was the only date on which the tournament might take place, because a holiday was needed and Labor Day they intended going to Halifax. Mr. Fraser could not, however, voice the sentiments of the whole club in the matter.

After some discussion at the local meeting yesterday it was moved and seconded that the secretary should be authorized to again communicate with the secretary of the Rothesay club, laying the case before him and asking him to call a meeting of his own club to discuss the matter.

He was further instructed to state that if another date were possible a postponement would be more favorable to the local club.

Mr. Randolph's again communicated with Mr. Fraser last evening, who promised to call a meeting of the Rothesay club today to consider the matter; again stating, however, that he thought July 1st was the only date open.

As soon as word is heard from Rothesay with regard to their decision, a meeting of the local club will be held and the matter will be finally decided upon. Meanwhile preparations for the tournament are going forward, as in all probability the match will take place on July 1st.

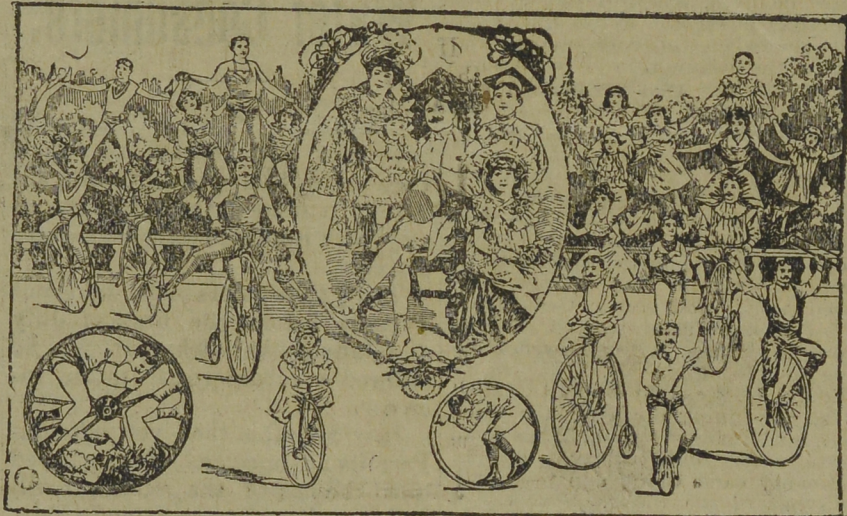
