BURNED TO DEATH.

Horrible Fatality at St. John the Result of a Debauch.

ONE MAN DEAD AND SEVERAL PERSONS INJURED.

St. John, June 22.—(Special)—There are no new developments of last night's tragedy. The man burned to death has been definitely identified as Sam Dugan. Matheson, who was supposed to be burned, was not in the house at the time and is not hurt. He has relatives in Fredericton.

One of the most horrible tragedies which has taken place in St. John for some years was discovered last night, says the Sun, when alarm 43 brought the fire department to a veritable charnel house on Camarthen street, below Sheffield.

One man dead, another missing, a third badly burned, and a woman whose flesh was literally eaten by the fire from off her hands, face and breast, is the outcome of a drunken debauch in a disreputable beer shop. The scene of the tragedy was the shop kept by Samuel Dougan of Sheffield street fame, and where he dispensed such light beverages as beer and ale.

The dead man was identified by James Ferris as Samuel Dougan, because on his feet were a pair of boots, and Sam he bought a pair of boots yesterday. Others, however, contended that the corpse was that of W. G. Matheson, familiarly known as "Boxer" Matheson, from his past pugilistic record. Be that as it may it was as frightful and sickening a sight as ever the firemen saw, which confronted them in that barroom when the smouldering flames had been cleared away. Huddled in the corner lay the corpse, rigid in death, his back against the wall and his right shoulder propped against the adjoining partition. He was lying on his right side, and was in a half reclining position, the neck and head held upright by the rigidity of the muscles, which were hard as rock. His left arm lay along his leg and from it the clothing had been entirely burned. The face was gazing at the floor in much the same way as though a drunken wretch had fallen to the ground and in his unsteady efforts to raise himself had been struck dead while yet on his hands. Men turned from the sight in horror, and even the most crime-stricken inhabitants of that locality seemed terrified at the spectacle.

If this should prove to be Dougan then the question is what became of Matheson? He was known to be in the shop and has not been seen since the fire.

Ed. Armstrong, of Carleton, was said to be another inmate of the house at the time of the fire, but he escaped without serious injury.

ated. Had it not been for his release from sobriety Dougan would doubtless have been a living man today. Report also stated that Adam Wetmore was in the house at the time, but this could not be verified. There is practically only one theory in regard to the origin of the fire. It is surmised that a lamp was upset and the state of the inmates was such that they could make no effort to put out the flames or escape. It was only after the fire had gained much headway that the Hamilton girl and Ed. Armstrong got out.

ERY SUDDEN CALL.

Rev. Father Meahan of Moncton, Found Dead in His Room.

Moncton, N. B., June 22.—Rev. H. A. Meahan, the popular pastor of St. Bernard's Roman Catholic church in this city, died very suddenly yesterday afternoon.

Father Meahan had not been feeling well for the past month, but he continued to attend to the duties devolving upon him and his medical adviser did not anticipate any serious results. He had been about as usual in the morning making some sick calls and went home at noon feeling about as usual. He ate a light dinner and about 1 or 1.30 went to his room below stairs to take his usual after dinner rest.

He left word with his housekeeper to call him about 2.30 as he intended going to Mary's Hill to look after some work going on there on Mary's Hill, and at 6 o'clock intended going to St. Joseph's College to take part in the closing exercises.

The housekeeper called him at the hour named and Father Meahan answered that he was getting up. An hour later the housekeeper discovered that Father Meahan had not come from his room, and she went to the door a second time to call him.

She called several times, and, receiving no answer, she entered the room, and was shocked to find him cold in death.

She hastened for his physician, Dr. Myers, who, upon investigation, found that Father Meahan had been dead a half hour or more. The doctors came to the conclusion that death was caused by affection of the heart, from which Father Meahan had been suffering for the past few weeks.

Father Meahan's illness dates back two years. A year ago last May he spent some time in the Hotel Dieu Hospital in Montreal and was treated for liver trouble. He returned much improved in health and again took up his pastoral duties. A year or so later he was advised by his physicians to take rest and accordingly last October left in company with Bishop Casey, of St. John, Bishop McDonald of Charlottetown, and others, on an extended trip to Europe. He returned after five months and seemed to have recovered much of his energy and health.

Father Meahan was born at Bathurst, June 19th, 1853. He was a son of the late John Meahan, of Bathurst, who for some years represented Gloucester in the local legislature. After attending the public schools in Bathurst he studied for some time under Dr. Geo. M. Parkin, and took a course at St. Joseph's. He took his theological course at the Grand Seminary, Montreal, and was ordained by the late Archbishop Fabre. He spent four years in St. John as assistant at the Cathedral and assumed charge of Moncton church in November, 1882. He was the first priest having Moncton as an independent and separate charge. He was loved not only by his congregation, but he enjoyed the confidence of all classes.

LAI D TO REST.

Funeral of Mr. Francis E. Winslow Largely Attended.

REMAINS BORNE TO THEIR LAST RESTING PLACE AT FOREST HILL.

The funeral of the late Francis Edward Winslow took place from his late home at Mrs. Colwell's, corner of St. John and Brunswick streets, at 3.30 o'clock this afternoon and was very largely attended; relatives and friends coming from far and near to pay their last respects to the dead.

Followed by a sorrowing procession the body was carried to the Cathedral, where a solemn and impressive service was read; Rev. Sub-Dean Street, a lifelong friend of the deceased, officiating.

After the service the funeral cortege formed and slowly wended its way to the Forest Hill cemetery, where, after a few short prayers, all that was mortal of the late Francis Edward Winslow was laid to rest.

The high respect and admiration in which the late gentleman was held by all who knew him was plainly shown by the large number of citizens and friends which assembled at his funeral to do honor to his memory.

DEATH OF WILMOT BROWN

Deceased a Well Known Railway Man and Brother of Gilmor Brown, C. E. of This City.

Mr. Gilmor Brown, C. E., of this city, received a telegram about five o'clock last evening containing the sad news of the death of his brother, Wilmot Brown of Richibucto.

Deceased has been ill for six months from cancer of the stomach. He was known all over the province in connection with railways, and associated with his brother, John C. Brown, constructed many of the branch lines. After the completion of the Kent Northern Railway he made his home at Richibucto, and for over twenty years has operated and managed this railway. He was the lessee of the road for over fourteen years.

Mr. Brown was fifty-seven years of age and unmarried. He leaves three brothers, John C. David, W. and Gilmor, and three sisters, Mrs. W. H. Marks of Eureka, Cal.; Mrs. W. H. Maxwell, Indiana, and Mrs. J. K. McKenzie of Rumford Falls, Me. He was a very popular citizen, and his death will be heard of with regret.

Mr. Gilmor Brown left St. John today for Richibucto to accompany his brother's remains to St. Stephen.

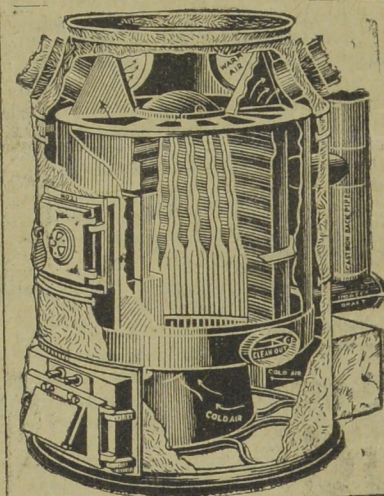
