FORESTERS' CONVENTION.

Committee Met Last Evening to Make Arrangements.

BETWEEN TWO AND THREE HUNDRED DELEGATES EXPECTED.

Preparations are being made for the annual meeting of the Foresters' High Court to be held here on July 6 and 7.

A meeting of the committee appointed from Courts Milicete and St. Mary's was held last evening, when arrangements were made for the grand parade, mass meeting and other matters.

The committee was composed of the following: Court Milicete—F. P. Robinson, Hugh Doherty and W. J. Southern. Court St. Mary's—R. Staples, Chas. Miles and James Thompson.

Mr. F. P. Robinson was appointed chairman of the committee, and Mr. R. Staples secretary.

Arrangements were completed with regard to the route of the grand parade, which will take place on the evening of July 6. The procession leaves the Foresters' Hall in the Chestnut Building, Queen Street, at 7.15 p. m., proceeding down Queen street to the Queen Hotel where Supreme High Chief Ranger Dr. Oronhyatoka will be picked up and driven made, the committee adjourned to the procession will then proceed down to St. John Street, out St. John to King, up King to Regent, out Regent to Queen, and up Queen to the City Hall, where a grand mass meeting will be held.

At this meeting the supreme high ranger will speak, and also several other officers from lodges all over the province.

There will also be a musical programme. It is expected that about two hundred and twenty-five members will be present, besides the outside members of the different provincial lodges.

After all arrangements had been made, the committee adjourned to meet again on Friday evening, June 30th, when final arrangements will be decided upon.
