CITY FATHERS IN SESSION.

Lot of Business Transacted at Regular Meeting.

ALD. BARBOUR'S SCHEME TO STIMULATE TAX COLLECTIONS.

Will be Charged Interest After Ninety Days.

GOOD SHOWING MADE BY STREET LIGHTING COMMITTEE.

The city council met in regular monthly session last evening and transacted a lot of business. Reports from the roadmaster, superintendent of the electric light station, and chairman of Wilmot Park Board were received and ordered to be published in the civic blue book. It was decided to ask the legislature for authority to add six per cent. interest to all rates and taxes not paid within ninety days from the time the notices are issued. A statement showing the cost of operating the street lighting plant for the past year was submitted.

Those present at the meeting were Mayor Palmer in the chair, and Aids. Barbour, Stockford, Everett, Ross, Maxwell, Farrell, McKnight, and Edwards.

The minutes of the last meeting were read by the city clerk and approved.

The auditor's report for December was read and adopted. The expenditure for the month was as follows:

On motion of Ald. Edwards the rule was suspended and small accounts from James Rodgers, Newton Jarvis and two others for doing police duty on Halloween, were ordered to be paid.

It was decided to renew the insurance on the road plant and the sum of \$13.25 was voted for the payment of the premium.

The alms house commissioner's report showed an expenditure of \$381.58 for the month, being an over expenditure of \$81.58. The report was adopted and a check for \$250 was ordered to be issued in favor of the commissioner.

THE STREET LIGHTS.

Ald. Farrell, chairman of the street lighting committee, submitted the following interesting report, on the lighting service.

Your street light committee beg to report as follows:

That the expenditures incurred in this department from January 6th to December 31st, 1904, have been as follows:

plant furnished a most efficient and satisfactory light service for the year, a saving of \$1,224.80 has been effected over the tender.

Your committee submits the first annual report of Mr. William H. McGinn, superintendent of the electric Department herewith.

Ald. Farrell expressed the opinion that the lighting service had been satisfactory and there had been no complaints. The estimates had been slightly exceeded, but this was due to the fact that the venture was a new one. The committee had economized by turning the lights off on moonlight nights, and had affected quite a saving. He felt satisfied that the committee had made a very satisfactory showing, and he trusted that whoever had charge of the department next year would do as well or even better.

On motion of Ald. Barbour the report was adopted.

The first annual report from Mr. W. H. McGinn, city electrician, was read to the meeting by the Mayor. It recommended among other things that steps be taken to duplicate the plant at the light station, by putting the Wheelock engine into use and providing an additional dynamo. It stated that the street lights were burning last year 2185 hours altogether.

Ald. Farrell thought Mr. McGinn's recommendation that the Wheelock engine be put into use should be carried out. The engine was now lying idle, and if put into use it would be necessary to procure another dynamo. It was necessary that the city should have a perfect lighting system and he believed that steps should be taken at once to duplicate the present plant. There was still to the credit of the department about \$4,000 of the proceeds of the debenture sale, and this should be expended in putting the plant in first class order. It would be necessary in the near future to procure about twenty additional poles and he would move that the report be adopted.

Ald. Ross thought the recommendation of Mr. McGinn should be given careful consideration by the council.

Ald. Farrell stated that it would cost about \$4,000 to carry out Mr. McGinn's recommendations.

Ald. Barbour thought that more information should be procured before any definite action was taken by the council and he suggested that the matter be referred to a committee to make enquires as to cost and report at the next meeting of the council.

A motion to that effect was adopted, and the Mayor appointed the electric light committee to deal with the matter.

LIGHT FOR PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

The report of the committee appointed to report on a system of lighting the public buildings, submitted a report. It recommended that the city offices, hose station and

police station be lighted with incandescent electric lights, supplied by the dynamo at the pumping station; also that the opera house be lighted for the present by electricity, supplied by the Fredericton Gaslight Company.

Ald. Barbour said that the dynamo at the pumping station had a capacity of about forty lights over and above the number used at the hospital, or sufficient to light the buildings recommended by the committee. As for the opera house it would be cheaper to have it lighted by the Company.

Ald. Stockford thought that steps should be taken to find out just how much light was needed at the hospital. He had gone by the institution recently at an early hour in the morning and had found it illuminated like an exhibition building. He thought more lights were used there than was necessary.

The mayor thought that the attention of the hospital trustees should be called to the matter.

Ald. Edwards thought that what Ald. Stockford had said was correct. He had it on the authority of one of the engineers that it required 500 pounds of coal a day extra to keep the hospital dynamo running. This meant about 91 tons of coal a year, towards the cost of which the hospital trustees contributed \$75 per year, while the city's share apart from wear and tear would be \$575.

The report of the committee was finally adopted.

CONTRACT AWARDED.

The printing committee recommended the tender of W. M. Clarke for the city printing be accepted, and that the contract for advertising be awarded to Andrew Lipsett. Mr. H. A. Cropley also submitted a tender for printing, but Mr. Clarke underbid him. The report was adopted.

Ald. Barbour, in a brief speech pointed out that the present method of collecting taxes did not lead to results as satisfactory as might be expected. The finance committee had been looking into the matter and had decided that drastic measures would have to be adopted to enforce more prompt payment. It cost considerable to collect from those who became defaulters year after year, and a good portion of the cost fell upon the ratepayers who paid promptly. He closed by moving the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That a bill be prepared and submitted to the legislative assembly for enactment at the next session thereof, providing:

That all rates and taxes remaining unpaid for ninety days after the receipt of the annual assessment roll by the city treasurer shall be subject to interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, said interest to begin to run from the date of the published notice required by section 30, of 37th Victoria, Chapter 4.

Also that any rates and taxes in default and unpaid at the time of the passing of this act shall be subject to interest at the rate of six per centum per annum to begin and be reckoned from the date of the passage of this act."

Ald. Everett thought that it was only fair to those who paid their taxes promptly that the others should be made to pay a penalty. At the present time an evil existed, and he believed that Ald. Barbour's proposal, if carried out, would remedy it. He would have much pleasure in seconding the motion.

Ald. Barbour explained that his proposal was to allow a discount of 5 per cent on taxes paid within thirty days, as at present, and to charge interest the lapse of a further period of sixty days.

The resolution was put to the meeting and unanimously adopted.

A lengthy report from roadmaster McKay, on the work done on the streets and sidewalks during the past year was read by the city clerk and on motion of Ald. McKnight was ordered to be placed on file.

veying Mrs. Fradsham to the Provincial hospital was read by Ald. Farrell, and on his motion was ordered to be paid.

Ald. McKnight in reply to Ald. Farrell said the account with the government in connection with the road plant was settled two months ago.

The Mayor said that the account for stone had not been adjusted, but the amount of the city's claim had been deducted from the price of the road plant.

Ald. Everett read a communication requesting that steps be taken to enforce the law to prevent expectation on the public streets of the city.

Ald. Everett thought the matter was a most important one, and it behooved the council to comply with the request. The public should be given to understand that a bye law to prevent expectation does exist, and that the council is to enforce it. He moved that the city clerk be instructed to procure 300 posters, containing the bye-law, and have them put up monthly in public places about the city.

The communication was ordered to be placed on file.

Ald. Barbour in seconding Ald. Everett's motion expressed himself as being strongly in favor of putting a stop to the expectation evil.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

The annual report of the trustees of Wilmot Park was read by the mayor and adopted. The treasurer's statement showed an expenditure during the year of \$366, leaving a balance on hand of \$41.68. Adopted.

The fire committee through Ald. Ross, recommended that a fire alarm box be erected on the corner of Northumberland and Saunders streets.

Ald. Everett seconded the motion and it was adopted.

On motion of Ald. Stockford, the council adjourned sine die.
