

SURRENDER TERMS.

Port Arthur Garrison to
March Out With Honors
Of War.TRANSFER OF FORTRESS TO JAPS
HAS COMMENCED.Russian Press Comments on the
Situation.25,000 Prisoners Captured at Port
Arthur--20,000 Sick People.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Tokio, Jan. 4.—The Japanese have captured 25,000 prisoners at Port Arthur. The total number of inhabitants is thirty-five thousand, of whom 20,000 are sick.

Headquarters Third Japanese army Jan. 3, via Fusan, Jan. 4.—At the request of the Russians, food, medicine, and physicians for the sick and wounded have been granted.

Fort's Itse, Santz and Tayangko were taken over at noon today.

The Russian prisoners of war, are to be marched out of Port Arthur tomorrow.

Tokio, Jan. 4, noon.—General Nogi reports that the army department commissioners representing the Japanese and Russian armies, concluded their conference this morning, and the actual transfer of Port Arthur as the property of the Japanese government was commenced.

RUSSIAN PRESS COMMENTS.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 4.—The press here with one accord, praise the heroic work of the Port Arthur garrison, and say the record furnishes an object lesson to Russia and Japan.

The Nove Vremya says: "Unpreparedness now stands confessed before the world and reads us a lesson as to what Russia must do and how she must change her methods to achieve victory. It also shows Japan what she has undertaken, when such enormous losses are entailed in capturing a small, empty handed garrison, driven to the last ditch. Russia has had eleven mouths of hard but valuable experience of war under new conditions imposed by modern technical requirements, and it has been a costly training, but will be valuable."

The Russ says:—"Had the Japanese been able to cut off the last train which reached Port Arthur, the blockade would have found the fortress even worse prepared." Well may these few remaining heroes say: "We have done our duty, but you, oh you people of St. Petersburg and Russia, have you done all you could and should have done?" "Russia cannot afford to quit during a losing fight. The time has now come when every one must put his shoulder to the wheel and redeem Russian prestige in the Far East."

Moscow, Jan. 4.—The annual municipal banquet has been postponed on account of the fall of Port Arthur.

Tokio, Jan. 4.—The Ji Ji, in discussing the surrender of Port Arthur reviews the price of lives lost and says: "We keep Port Arthur in our hands as long as the empire exists. Port Arthur is the key to peace in the Far east, and it is our duty to keep the key."

JAPS REJOICING.

Honolulu, Jan. 4.—Seven thousand Japanese participated in a lantern procession last night in honor of the surrender of Port Arthur and the arrival of Prince Kishimi, bound for home on the Steamer Mongolian.

The Japanese marched to the residence of Governor Carter and the British and Japanese consulates, filling the air with "Banzai."

THE TERMS OF SURRENDER.

Headquarters of the Japanese Third Army, Jan. 2, via Fusan, Jan. 3.—At the conference held between the commissioners of General Stoessel and General Nogi, at 1 o'clock, Monday afternoon the terms of surrender were agreed upon, under which the Russian officers, both civil and military, will be allowed to march out, the military with arms. The officers will be granted full liberty after giving promises not to take further part in the war.

The privates and non-commissioned officers of the garrison, to the number of 20,000, will be taken prisoners of war. The surrendered fortress will be formally handed over to the Japanese Tuesday. The prisoners will march out Jan. 4. The opposing troops are fraternizing.

Following are some of the details of the terms of surrender:

All Russian soldiers, marines and civil officials of the garrison and harbor are made prisoners; all forts, batteries, vessels, munitions, etc., are transferred to the Japanese in the condition in which they existed at noon of Jan. 3, violation of this

clause to operate as an annulment of the negotiations giving the Japanese army warrant to take free action; the Russian military and naval authorities are to furnish to the Japanese army an exhibit of all fortifications, underground and submarine mines, a list of military officers, of ships, and the numbers of their crews, and of civilians of both sexes, with their race and occupations; and all public property, as buildings, munitions of war, etc., to be left in the present position pending arrangement for their transference. Officers of the army and navy are permitted to retain their swords and such of their personal property as is directly necessary for the maintenance of life, and with one servant each may, upon their parole not to take arms during the continuance of the war, return to Russia. Non-commissioned officers and privates will be held as prisoners. For the benefit of the sick and wounded Russians, the sanitary corps and the accountants belonging to the Russian army and navy will be required to serve under the Japanese sanitary corps and accountants for such periods of time as may be deemed necessary.

INTERESTING STATISTICS.

Chee Foo, Jan. 3.—Some interesting statistics concerning the defence of Port Arthur were brought here by the flotilla of Russian torpedo boat destroyers, which carried numerous chests containing complete records of General Stoessel's army.

Originally the army numbered 35,000. Eleven thousand have been killed; sixteen thousand are wounded or sick, and 8,000 remained in the forts, of whom, however, 2,000 were unable to fight.

It is learned that when General Stoessel wrote to General Nogi regarding the surrender of the fortress he said:

"I have 8,000 men in the forts and 6,000 of these are able to fight. If you do not accept my proposal these men will die fighting, but it will cost you three times their number to kill them."

During the siege 265 per cent. of the garrison were put out of action. This remarkable fact was due to wounded men returning to the front. Cases have been recorded where men have gone to the hospital four times, returning convalescent to the forts.

The number of officers killed was proportionately greater than in any battle known to history. This was due to the frequent lethargic condition of the men, who, without food and without sleep, moved only when ordered by their officers.

The Russians estimate that the taking of the fortress has cost Japan \$100,000,000.

HOSPITALS AT PORT ARTHUR.

London, Jan. 4.—The Daily Mail's Chefoo correspondent says that Russian officers who have arrived there bring descriptions of the terrible conditions existing in the hospitals at Port Arthur, which, they say, were worse than those of the battlefield. They relate how the Sisters of Charity, accustomed as they are to such ordeals, sickened under these conditions and fainted at their posts because of lack of nourishment.

The correspondent adds: "Medicines and doctors were scarce and the shrieks and groans of the wounded, mingled with the curses and yells of men who were undergoing operations without anaesthetics, combined to make such an inferno that it was a relief to rush from the foul atmosphere and horrible sights, even if the shell-torn streets were the only alternative."

GREAT MUSICIAN DEAD.

Theodore Thomas, Famous Orchestra Leader Passes Away At Chicago.

Chicago, Jan. 4.—Theodore Thomas, one of the best known orchestral leaders in the world, died this morning of pneumonia.

He founded the Chicago Orchestral Association and the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, and it was mainly through his efforts that the Orchestral Hall of Chicago was built, costing \$800,000.

CLEARING HOUSE REPORT

Shows Large Increase in Business Over Last Year.

St. John, Jan. 4.—The clearing house reports for 1904 show clearings \$51,422,858 as against \$49,013,467 last year, an increase of \$2,409,391.

The increase is not altogether due to growing business, for new bank agencies opened during the year contributed largely to the result.

A PIONEER'S DEATH

Due to Hydrophobia from Wolf Bites.
