FOUGHT BEHIND WOMEN.

Latest Stories From the Far East Reflect Seriously on Russians.

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 5.—Advices from the Far East received by the last direct mail, tell of Muscovite tricks which the Japanese strongly denounce. An arrival from Mukden states that the Shakheng engagement Russians placed a number of Chinese women in the hands of their army, and many Russians also appeared in the fighting line in the disguise of Chinese females, and fired guns from behind real Chinese women. Consequently the Japanese were compelled to reply, and a number of women were killed or wounded. Natives in the vicinity of Japanese camps claim many of their number have been cruelly maltreated by Russians.

Chinese are greatly concerned over the desecration of the Imperial tombs at Mukden. The Tseng Chi, Tartar general there, addressed strenuous remonstrances to the Russians, but despite these a large body of the Cossacks took possession of the imperial mausoleum grounds, and transformed the houses of the caretakers into stables. They also cut down innumerable trees, making of them great stockades, stretching seven miles as a protection against Japanese attack. Japan has recently released a number of Russian prisoners of war, among whom the Empress personally presented artificial limbs to take the place of those lost in war.

In an address to the released at Kobe, M. De Lucy-Fossarieu said he believed they fully realized the Japanese were too brave a nation not to respect enemies who won their esteem. Their stay in Japan under tragic circumstances which brought them to the country could not but

leave a lasting impression, but when the unfortunate war was over and passions had cooled, he was sure the remembrance would make of them staunch friends of Japan.

HUNGARIAN HOUSE IN UPROAR.

Parliament Dissolved Amid Jeers—Opposition Won't Hear King's Speech.

Budapest, Hungary, Jan. 5.—The Hungarian parliament died hard. Its expiring struggles today were continued for nearly three hours with two intermissions, and came to an end amid scenes of disorder and jeers from the opposition.

The President opened the session by reading a letter from Premier Tisza announcing that the Emperor-King would receive the deputies at the Halbarz at noon tomorrow and read the speech from the throne. Gala dress was prescribed for the occasion, officers to wear their cartridge pouches, an announcement which called out great laughter.

Francis Kossuth, leader of the Independent party, then rose and made a dignified protest against the dissolution of parliament.

After Kossuth had entered Premier Tisza rose to reply and a storm of interruption from the opposition. The Premier spoke very briefly, declaring that the government was quite ready to take the responsibility of its actions. He referred slightly to the "antics of the operaetta revolutionaries."

When ex-Premier Banffy rose to speak Premier Tisza and all his followers left the House, returning later only for a few minutes. The president declared the session ended amid shouts and jeers from the opposition.

The opposition decided several days ago not to attend the reading of the King's speech from the throne, according to Count Albert Apponyi.

"Our respect both for the constitution and the King," explained the Count in an interview, "prevents our participating in what we believe to be an unconstitutional act. Apart from this we have every reason to believe that Premier Tisza's aggressiveness will produce a speech from the throne containing severe criticisms of the opposition. In such an event some of our followers probably would express their resentment in a way calculated to cause scandal in the sovereign's presence which would be a matter of deep regret."

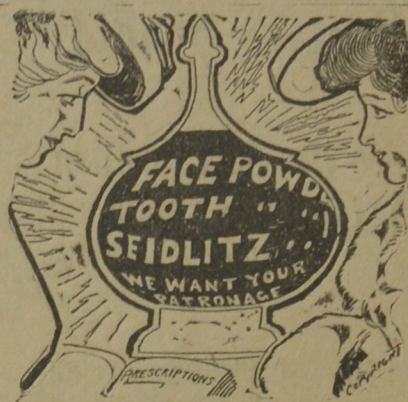

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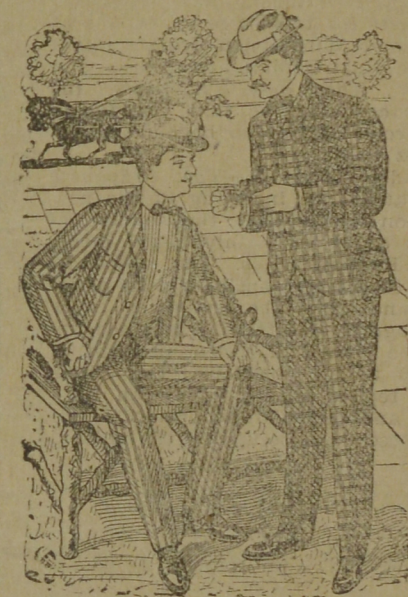
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
