

THE TROJANS WON.

Got the Best of Sussex at Hockey Here Last Evening.

A GOOD EXHIBITION OF THE POPULAR SPORT.

The Visitors Went Down Under a Score of 3 to 1.

The Trojan hockey team defeated Sussex in a match at the Arctic Rink last evening by a score 3 to 1. The game was a lively one from start to finish, and was witnessed by a large crowd of enthusiastic spectators. The teams were fairly evenly matched and put up fast, clean hockey.

At ten minutes past eight o'clock, the referee, Charles H. Allen, blew his whistle when the teams lined up as follows:

For the first few minutes of play the Trojans were kept on the defensive, and had all they could do to keep the rubber out of their net. They soon settled down to business, however, and after series of nice combination plays worked the puck over near their opponents' goal. McManiman, Coleman and Bowman each shot for a goal, but were unable to break through the defence line. When the game had been in progress about twenty minutes Sussex shot the first goal, and the play was heartily cheered by the spectators. The Trojans tried hard to balance the score during the next ten minutes, but fate was against them, and when half time was called the score stood Sussex, 1; Trojans, 0.

The Trojans played with their old time vim in the second half and carried all before them. At the end of ten minutes play Rowan got hold of the puck at the side of the rink and drove it straight into the net, to the great surprise of the boys in green. It was a lucky as well as a pretty shot and made the spectators howl with delight. The Trojans forced the play from this on and were able to get in two more goals, both of which were shot by McManiman.

All the Trojans played well, but McManiman, Dennison and Rowan particularly distinguished themselves. They seemed to be all over the ice at once, and undoubtedly won the game for the home team.

The Sussex boys proved themselves worthy opponents, and made a gallant fight for victory. With a little more practice the team would probably be able to make it interesting for any combination in the province.

Mr. Allen refereed the game in a manner that is worthy of all.

The band of the R. C. R. rendered a splendid programme of music after the game, which was taken advantage of by a large number of skaters.

The members of the Sussex team were entertained to an oyster supper by the Trojans, at Lindsay's restaurant, at the close of last night's game, and spent an hour very pleasantly. They left for home at 11:30 morning.

CIVIC FRICTION AT MONCTON.

Mayor Thought Aldermen Treated Him Discourteously and Left Council Meeting.

A Moncton despatch says:—There was a lively meeting of the city council Friday afternoon. Ald Steeves started the ball by giving notice of a motion for new legislation to divide the city into six wards, each ward to elect two aldermen annually instead of being elected for a two-year term, half retiring annually, as at present; also that aldermen at large be done away with. Some of the aldermen complained of the lack of meetings of water and light committees, others wanted a discussion of fire matters. But the Mayor objected, saying he had not time. Ald. Steeves moved that the council go into a committee of the whole, with Ald. McFarlane in the chair. This was not seconded.

The Mayor complained of the lack of courtesy toward the chair and after some further discussion Ald. Ross moved that the council go into a committee of the whole, with Ald. McFarlane in the chair.

The mayor declared the motion out of order. Then the motion was made that the council go into a committee with the mayor in the chair. The mayor also declared this out of order. Finally it was moved that the council go into a committee of the whole and the mayor put this motion and then put on his coat and went out. Ald. McFarlane was then appointed to the chair and the committee rose with out doing anything, asking leave to sit again. There was some discussion as to how one of the city fire horses devoured six tons of hay in eight months, but without solving the problem. By this time only four aldermen and the chairman remained and the council adjourned till Monday night without really doing any business.

The Gentle Code That There Has Come Into Vogue.

Propos to the recent bank robbery at Cody, it may be of interest to know that most of the Wyoming banks display the following signs:

Member American Sharpshooting Association.

Patrons thinking an error has been made are requested not to shoot the cashier before investigation.

Strangers must enter the bank holding their hands above their heads or they will be fired on by the staff.

Deposits of persons killed on the premises remain the property of the bank.

The bank will not be responsible for lost guns or bowie knives.

Patrons desirous of keeping in practice are requested to shoot the pens from the clerk's hands and to leave the cashier undisturbed.

Persons desirous of transacting business quickly will please remember that shooting out the lights tends to delay rather than hasten the work of the staff.

Undertakers—This bank will not be responsible for the funeral bills of persons killed by the staff in the course of business.—Portland Oregonian.

Ex-U. S. Senator Indicted.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 7.—George H. Williams, once Chief Justice of Oregon Territory, ex-United States Senator from Oregon, Attorney General in President Grant's second Cabinet, and now Mayor of Portland and eighty-three years old, was indicted today by the Grand Jury of Multnomah County on a charge of malfeasance in office.

The indictment states that on July 13, 1904, Judge Williams, while Mayor of Portland, failed to enforce the statutes regulating gambling. An indictment against Chief of Police Hunt is almost identical with that returned against Mayor Williams, charging that he knowingly permitted a gambling game to be conducted at the Portland Club.

Funeral Sermon Over Phone.

Des Moines, Ia., Jan. 5.—A funeral sermon was preached here last week over the telephone.

Death from diphtheria prevented the family of Miss Alice Conrad having a funeral which friends could attend, and to comply with the last request of the girl that the sermon should be preached at the house a telephone was placed so as to connect the church with the house. By its use and with the aid of a megaphone the Rev. Sherman Kirk was able to preach to two audiences, one at the church and the other at the house.
