THE LEGISLATIVE DEBATE.

Mr. Carpenter the mover, and Mr. Lowell the seconder of the address in the Legislature acquitted themselves very creditably, and won well deserved applause. The former is an old hand in politics, having represented Queen's since 1896, and has taken a leading position in the business and the debates of the House. Mr. Lowell is in the House for the first time, but he has had a long experience in the St. John Municipal Council, and besides being a level-headed man, is able to express himself clearly and effectively.

Mr. Hazen of course grumbled at almost everything in the Speech, and at several things that were not visible in it. It is the duty of an opposition leader to grumble. He would lose his job if he didn't. It cannot be said, however, that Mr. Hazen is a spiteful grumbler, but it is a pity that he has identified himself with the senseless charge that Mr. Jones was unfairly elected in Carleton. If Mr. Hazen has informed himself fully of the circumstances he must be aware that his friend Simms had ample opportunity to file his nomination paper within the prescribed hour, and that the accusation respecting the disappearance of the Bible is too childish to be entertained by sensible men. Even admitting that the alleged disappearance of the sacred book interfered with Simms perfecting his nomination papers in time, may it not be reasonably asked if the Sheriff or any other officer of the court is under obligation to keep a Bible on hand for the special use of a candidate, who although a lawyer, did not know that the names to his papers must be attested to before they are legal.

The real truth is we believe that Mr. Simms had no serious intention of being nominated, but was only putting up a piece of bluff at the instance of an opposition who did not dare to put up a candidate themselves. Mr. Hazen and his friends in Carleton knew very well they had no chance against the Solicitor General, and they decided on a piece of acting, with a view to raising a cry of unfairness against the Sheriff, Mr. Jones and the Government. There was no other object, and the Legislature will be wasting time if it stops to seriously discuss the Simms incident.

Mr. Hazen's complaints against the Government's policy and administration are so old and threadbare that we shall not follow him. They have been answered time and time again, and he may be safely left to the care of Premier Tweedie, who is speaking in the debate this afternoon.

THE WHITE DISMISSAL.

The Sun, which is fond of quoting as an exponent of Liberal opinions, a local newspaper which betrayed the Liberal party in the middle of an election campaign, will be interested in Hon. Mr. Emmerson's entire repudiation of that sheet. It was a piece of impertinence on the part of Mr. O. S. Crockett to attempt to palm off the paper in question as a Liberal organ, when, as a matter of fact he knows that it is the recognized Tory organ in this constituency, and is more or less under his own control.

Mr. Emmerson, however, promptly nailed the deceit, refusing to accept the paper's opinions as reflecting the views of the government or himself.

Respecting Mr. White's dismissal, Mr. Emmerson has stated on several occasions that it was not due to

politics, but was effected in the interests of the railway.

Mr. Gibson knew nothing about the matter, never recommended the displacement of Mr. White, but the minister in taking action was solely guided by his officials at Moncton, who were desirous of improving the service in this city.

Mr. Crockett is simply making himself ridiculous at Ottawa, and should go into retreat until some of his greenness wears off.

The report of the commissioners appointed to investigate conditions at the provincial hospital for nervous diseases, shows that individuals and municipalities have been imposing burdens on the province that it has no right to bear. Of the 541 persons in the hospital 293 are reported as fit subjects for the almshouses being hopelessly insane persons, who never should have become a provincial charge. These patients will no doubt be sent back to their homes for disposal by their friends, or quartered in the almshouses of the various municipalities.

The report that Russia is concentrating troops and munitions of war on the frontier of India, with a view of threatening British possession, may be taken as a product of imagination. Russia has too much on her hands just now to desire a conflict with Great Britain. No doubt she feels ugly enough at Britain because of her alliance with Japan, but until Russia gets out of her present difficulties at home and abroad she is not likely to court war with the most powerful nation in the world.

There is absolutely no truth in the report that Mr. David Russell has wired Kuropatkin that if he will but get back to Mukden he shall have "the support of myself and friends and the influence of the St. John Telegraph and Times."

Russia has handed over to Great Britain the sum of \$325,000, the amount awarded by the arbitrators in the North Sea question.

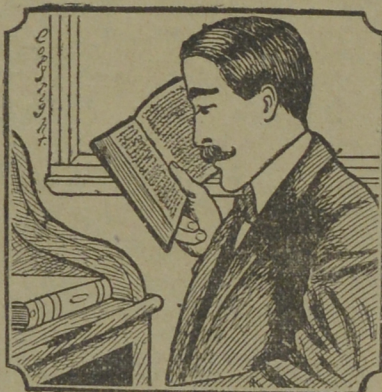

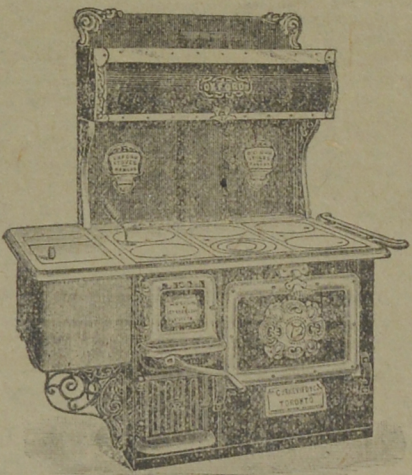
