### THE BAND CONCERT.

A Large Audience Enjoyed a Musical Treat At the Opera House.

The concert at the Opera house last evening under the auspices of the Fredericton Brass Band was a grand success in every particular. The audience besides being large, was representative and appreciative, and the lengthy and varied program was thoroughly enjoyed by all. The Fredericton Brass Band, under the leadership of Mr. Harry Williamson has

reached a high state of efficiency, and it is doubtful if there is an amateur band in the maritime provinces that can excel them. The band was down on the program for four regular numbers and they were rendered in a manner that called forth the highest encomiums of praise from the audience. While all the selections were excellent, and gave evidence of a great deal of patient work, the piece perhaps that made the greatest hit with the audience was a descriptive gallop entitled "A Trip by Rail." The grand melody of popular airs, was also greatly enjoyed.

The local soloists were Mr. Charles H. Hatt, Marysville's popular tenor, Miss Fanny Palmer, Mr. James Edney and Mr. W. A. Adams of this city. Mr. Hatt was in his usual good voice and his solo, "Life's all in all," was greatly enjoyed. He was compelled to respond to an encore.

Miss Palmer was also heard to splendid advantage, and her effort was most enthusiastically applauded. She is certainly one of the city's most gifted singers, and is always listened to with pleasure.

Mr. James Edney, resplendent in white duck and burnt cork, rendered a coon song, entitled "Jasper Johnson Shame on you," in a manner that put the audience in the best of good humor. His encore number was equally good.

The old favorite, Mr. W. A. Adams, as usual brought down the house with his catchy songs, and had to give an encore number to satisfy the demands of the audience.

Lieut. E. duDomaire, of the R. C. R., rendered a violin solo, which provoked a storm of applause, lasting for several minutes. The gallant lieutenant cheerfully responded to an encore.

A cornet solo by Assistant Band Master Perkins, with band accompaniment, was a most pleasing feature of the program.

Mr. E. R. Williams, local representative of the Scranton School, gave a clarinet solo in splendid style, and was warmly applauded.

Mr. W. A. Walsh, the popular elocutionist, recited "The Russian Prisoner" in a manner that would have done credit to a professional. In response to a very hearty encore he gave an excellent interpretation of Dr. Drummond's "Habitant."

A quintette, composed of Messrs. Lawlor, Boyle, Foster, Fradsham and Ley, rendered "Naples" in a highly pleasing manner and had to appear a second time.

Another pleasing feature of the program was a selection by the Methodist choir sextette, composed of Messrs. Ley, W. Bailey, B. Bailey, Young, Danphy and Maxid.

The piano accompaniments during the evening were played by Mr. W. A. McKee, the talented organist of the Baptist church.

The rendition of the National Anthem by the band brought to a close the most successful musical treat that Frederictonians have been privileged to enjoy this season.

## FATAL EXPLOSION.

### On Board British Torpedo Boat at Queenstown.

### OFFICER AND THREE MEN KILLED IN A SECOND EXPLOSION.

### And Fifteen Others Injured.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Queenstown, Ireland, Feb. 16.—While the British torpedo boat A 5 was lying in Queenstown harbor her gasoline exploded and blew up the crew.

The torpedo boat Hazard went to her assistance and when the crew boarded the A 5 a second explosion occurred.

Three men were killed, including Lieut. Skinner of the Hazard and fifteen were injured.
