TORY MOCK HEROICS.

Mr. R. B. Bennett, of Calgary, a former New Brunswick, who is stumping for the Tories in the Ontario federal elections, is reported in the Sun as exclaiming, respecting the school question:

"Does the west care? They tell you the west don't care, but as long as I have breath within me, so long will I never cease to agitate till we get our rights as free men, and not as slaves."

So it seems that Mr. Bennett thinks he is the whole push in the west.

Calgary, where this dramatic gentleman lives, was one of the places where Mr. George U. Hay, of St. John, couldn't get anybody to even discuss the school question.

The case of young Mr. Bennett, however, is a sad one, and he imitates his former leader, Sir Charles Tupper, when the old gentleman was trying to browbeat parliament into coercing Manitoba in 1896, and declared he was ready to die for remedial legislation.

Mr. Bennett does not exactly declare that he would sacrifice his life in opposition to the autonomy bill, but he offers the next thing to it. He is willing to battle to his last breath, taking the risk of subsequent resurrection.

"These Tory politicians are nothing if not dramatic. Some years ago we had Mr. Foster ready to die for prohibition, then Sir Charles Tupper offered suicide for the remedial bill, and now young Mr. Bennett, with a great deal to live for, throws all the wind he has in the balance against the autonomy bill."

Wonderful isn't it what patriots, what martyrs are encircled by the boundaries of the great Tory party. And yet they are politicians of the common mould and some of whom expect to fool all the people all the time. Bah!

LIMITED RESOURCES.

The University of New Brunswick from lack of funds, is forced from time to time to part with efficient members of its faculty, who cannot afford to remain in positions in which the remuneration, comparatively speaking, is a mere pittance.

In the past two decades principally for this reason, the institution has lost such eminent men as Dr. H. S. Bridges, Prof. Fletcher, Prof. Duff, Prof. Murray, Prof. Stockley, Prof. Dixon, Prof. Jack and others, who are occupying positions in which the emolument is greater than they received here.

The lack of financial resources at the University is to be greatly deplored. Not only was the Senate to cut things very fine with its present staff, but it is also prevented from enlarging the scope and usefulness of the institution, whose financial resources are no greater now than they were a quarter of a century ago.

If the University had the money, there would probably be chairs of chemistry, agriculture and forestry established, but it is no use thinking about such extensions until the money is in sight.

Where is it to come from, is the important question?

Chancellor Harrison at the U. N. B. alumni dinner, in referring to the new engineering professor, mentioned that he was coming here because he wanted to get married. All right, but how does the Chancellor explain the fact that members of his staff have come and gone without effecting a matrimonial alliance. Is there any fault with the marriageable ladies of Fredericton, or are some of the young professors so modest that they wait to be chased? In view of the Chancellor's interesting revelation the girls will be on the lookout for Prof. Muir Edwards, (it's a pretty name), about Oct. 1st. Don't all speak at once.

Auditor General Beck is receiving congratulations on having attained the 91st anniversary of his birth. The interesting event occurred yesterday and entering on his second year Mr. Beck is actively engaged in his responsible official duties. Honored by his fellow citizens many years ago with the highest office in their gift, entrusted by the government with an important office, recognized by the King for long and efficient service, Mr. Beck has the good wishes of hosts of friends for

more years of life and usefulness. The auditor general is ten years younger than the venerable Senator Wark, who still takes an active interest in human affairs.

Mr. W. E. McLellan, editor of the Halifax Chronicle, has been appointed post office inspector for Nova Scotia, and our contemporary will miss the force and gracefulness of his pen. Mr. McLellan is a native of Pictou, a graduate of Dalhousie University, and spent some years in the teaching profession. At Winnipeg, he did journalistic work for a couple of years, and on returning to Nova Scotia accepted the position of school inspector from which he was elevated to the editorial chair of the Chronicle, which greatly increased in strength, influence and popularity under his management.

Halifax Chronicle—The new principal of the Church School for Girls at Windsor is an English lady. The late principal was an English lady, all the teachers at Edgell are English ladies. All the pupils are Canadians. They were born in Canada. They will probably spend their lives in Canada. But in all of Canada there is not a teacher qualified to instill into their minds Canadian sentiment and the Canadian idea! Unhappy, stupid Canada! But happy English and Edgell.

The University Alumni Society were able to gather around their festive board a distinguished gathering of gentlemen, and the chief themes of the many excellent speeches were the large field of usefulness which the institution so efficiently occupies, and its great need of larger financial resources to meet the demands of higher education in this province.

A Bonaparte is to become a member of the United States federal government, as secretary of the navy. The distinguished gentleman is a resident of Baltimore, where he has a large legal practice, and is a relative of the late Napoleon Bonaparte, who made quite a stir in Europe a century ago.

It is suggested that as there were no birthday honors from the King on Victoria day, the members of the various provincial governments might issue a fresh batch of J. P. commissions.

The Liberals of London and North Oxford have secured the services of Mr. E. M. Macdonald, the eloquent Pictou M. P., for a stumping tour in those constituencies.

BITS OF NEWS.

Items of Interest Culled from Our Exchanges and Other Sources.

Mr. T. M. Gaynor, town clerk of Chatham, has been appointed to the Custom House vacancy in that town that was created some time ago by transferring Mr. Benson to Boston.

Mr. W. E. McLellan, editor of the Halifax Chronicle, has been appointed post office inspector for the province of Nova Scotia, and will begin the duties of his office immediately.

Rev. F. W. Anderson, pastor of St. Andrew's Church at Brantford, Ont., will accept the call to Sydney, N. S., which was extended to him at a meeting of that congregation on Monday night.

The town of Warroad, on the Canadian Northern Railway, about ninety miles from Winnipeg, was about wiped out by fire Wednesday morning. Twenty buildings were burned, and the loss is estimated at \$200,000.

One hundred and fifty members of the Michigan Press Association will invade Canada on their annual tour next month. They will be in Montreal on June 18 and leave on the following day for Portland whence they will take steamer for St. John.

The first shipment of Canadian thoroughbred cattle to Japan will be made in the near future. A Japanese merchant, Kozie, of Shimano, Japan, is in Canada investigating butter and cheese industries looking for ideas useful to Japanese in their production.

Miss Jean Bruce, daughter of J. R. Bruce, of the I. C. R. was married at Moncton Thursday to F. O. Condon, of the I. C. R. engineering staff and the same day at Shediac Cape, Miss Edith Sumner, daughter of F. W. Sumner, ex-M. P. of Moncton, was wedded to Herbert Wood, son of Senator Wood, of Sackville.

Mr. Hugh Hay has returned to Woodstock from a visit to Philadelphia. On his way home he was accompanied by his son, Dr. Charles M. Hay, to Bristol, R. I. Dr. Hay is receiving treatment at a sanatorium at Bristol and his family have strong hopes that he is recovering in a measure from his protracted illness.

Some months ago a young man employed in running an elevator in the Turkish Bath Hotel, at Montreal was crushed to death and in due time buried. Since then enquiries have been put on foot and it transpires

he was living under an assumed name and was in fact the son of wealthy and prominent parents in France. The body was exhumed on a court order and the remains forwarded to France.

At a meeting of the Mount Allison Board of Regents Thursday evening it was decided to use \$25,000 of the Hart-Massey bequest to endow a chair in the University to be known as the Hart-Massey chair. Dr. Borden, principal of the Ladies' College, was granted six months leave of absence, providing he could get a satisfactory substitute. A grant of \$500 to help defray expenses was voted. It is not known whether Dr. Borden will take advantage of the Board's offer.

A party of Liberals left for Western Ontario last night to take part in the London and North Oxford by-elections. The party included Hon. Frank Oliver, W. S. Calvert, chief Liberal whip; Peter Talbot of Strathcona; J. G. Turriff of East Assiniboia, and J. H. Lamont of Saskatchewan. It is expected that Hon. Mr. Fielding and Hon. Mr. Paterson will go into the campaign on Monday. Walter Scott is already at the scene of activity, and has delivered some addresses.

GREAT HOLIDAY TRIP.

Rev. Father Ryan, who is directing the pilgrimage, which is to leave July 18th for St. Anne De Beaupre, is busy making arrangements for the trip. Announcement concerning departure, train arrangements and other information will be given next week. A large number from this section have already decided to go on the trip, and many persons from Halifax and other Nova Scotia points have written to Father Ryan expressing their intention of visiting the far famed shrine. It is also probable that arrangements will be made with the Eastern Steamship Company to being a party from Boston to connect with the pilgrimage at St. John. The affair promises to be one of the largest pilgrimages leaving this province in some years. All the religious exercises will be conducted in English, as this is for the benefit of the English speaking parishes of the province. Owing to the magnitude of the excursion exceptional advantages have been received and business men as well as parties of any denomination wishing to take in the trip and also pay a visit to Montreal and historic Quebec can do so at the cheapest rates.

May 30.—The sad death took place on May 23rd of John Parnham, jr., and his remains were followed to the grave by a long line of people, which showed the esteem in which he was held.

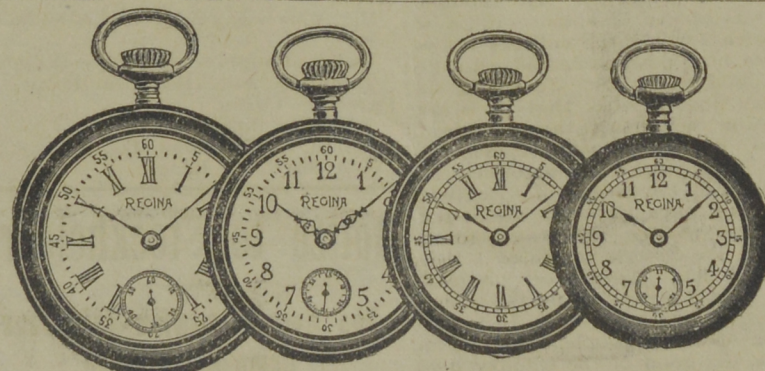
