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LIKE OLD TIMES.

St. John Baseballists Badly Wiped Out by the Tartars.

The St. John baseball team were badly wiped out in the match with the Tartars at Scully's grove yesterday afternoon. The score at the close was 23 to 5 in favor of the home team and they had an inning to spare. So far as the visitors were concerned it was a very rocky exhibition and if they constituted the best combination that St. John can put up, it is not much wonder that the New Brunswick League fell to the ground.

The visitors went first to the bat, and were able to frighten the local fans a trifle by putting on four runs during the first two innings against none for the Tartars. In the third inning St. John drew a goose egg, while the Tartars sent five men tripping across the home plate. From that time on the home team simply played ducks and drakes with the men from the winter port and pounded Nesbitt unmercifully. They batted him for thirty hits, although their score as well as St. John's was all made in three innings. In the seventh inning the visitors went to pieces very badly and allowed their opponents to put in thirteen runs. Frank Hughes sent the ball to the pines for a home run, and two baggers were of common occurrence.

The visiting team did not seem to pull well together and the fielding was something wretched and they had many costly errors.

The home team was much weaker than that which faced Moncton on the 24th, otherwise St. John would certainly have been shut out.

U. N. B. ENCOENIA.

Prize Winners Warmly Complimented on Their Success—Next Douglas Essay.

The university encoenia, which took place yesterday afternoon, was most successful in every particular, and the faculty and students certainly have reason to be proud of the showing made. The addresses by Dr. Murray and Prof. Clawson are generally admitted to have been quite the equal of any heard at the university if former years, and both gentlemen were warmly complimented.

In presenting the Montgomery-Campbell prize to Miss Winslow, the Venerable Archdeacon Neales warmly complimented that young woman on the showing made. He paid a tribute to the donor and remarked that the subject of classics was one in which he had always taken a deep interest. He was proud of the fact that the winner represented the town of Woodstock and county of Carleton.

He had watched her career since childhood and had a strong personal interest in her welfare.

Dr. Inch, in presenting the governor-general's medal to Miss Roach, said that the duty was to him a very pleasant one. He had been so long associated with the educational work of ladies that he learned to have a high respect for them and was always pleased to see them win prizes in competition with the opposite sex. He had the honor of being the first one to propose to the senate that they should admit young women to the graduating course at the university. It was his lips uttered the magic words that conferred the first degree of B. A. on a lady in the Dominion of Canada. He had watched with great interest the progress of feminine education throughout the world during the past twenty-five years and was always glad to see the young ladies achieve success. He was pleased to be called upon to present the medal to the daughter of a former pupil of his, and one whose friendship he had long enjoyed.

Dr. W. Brydson-Jack of Vancouver, presented the Brydson-Jack scholarship in a neat speech. He returned thanks to those who had perpetuated his father's name by founding the scholarship, and assured them though living at a distance, he still took a warm interest in his alma mater and rejoiced in its prosperity.

Just before the gathering broke up Governor Snowball announced that the subject for next year's Douglas essay would be "The English Essayists of the Early Nineteenth Century."

DEFENCE OF THE DEAD.

Friend of the Late Sir Albert J. Smith Resents Imputations Against His Attitude to U. N. B.

To the Editor of the Herald.
Sir—A listener to the very excellent speeches delivered at the dinner given by the Associated Alumni of the U. N. B. last evening would go away with the idea that the late Sir Albert J. Smith, was the great enemy of that institution.

Those who by their remarks gave that impression, must be laboring

under a misapprehension as to Sir Albert's attitude.

In the early fifties King's College, as it was then called, was a strictly denominational institution. It was almost wholly supported from public monies contributed by the people of the province of all classes and creeds, and withal was in anything but a flourishing condition. Sir Albert took the ground that an institution so supported should be entirely undenominational and that its doors should be wide open to all without distinction of creed.

The result of the agitation so taken up and carried on by Sir Albert was the abolition of its denominational character, at which time it started on the high road to success, and made possible the educational achievements so eloquently portrayed in the closing oration, and in the speeches last evening.

Instead of being an enemy, time has proved that Sir Albert was the true friend of the U. N. B., although for reasons readily explainable, the means used by him may at the time seemed drastic. He applied the remedy he thought the disease required and the present condition of the patient is the best justification of his treatment.

CHURCH DEDICATION.

Particulars Regarding the Dedication of St. Ann's Catholic Church.

His Lordship Bishop Baisey of St. John, will dedicate the new Catholic church of St. Anne at French Village on Tuesday morning next. Very Rev. Father Hebert, V. G., of Baie-Croche, will sing High Mass, and Rev. Father A. W. Mehan, of St. John, will preach the dedicatory sermon. Several visiting priests from different parts of the province will be present.

At the conclusion of the dedication ceremonies a reception will be given to Bishop Casey at which addresses will be read in English and Indian. The Indians will be attired in their native costumes.

In the afternoon of the same day the annual French Village picnic will be held on the church grounds.

Arrangements will probably be made with the steamer "Aberdeen" to make special trips to the village on that day.

If arrangements cannot be made with the Aberdeen, parties wishing to attend the dedication or picnic can arrange to go by team.

The Fredericton Brass Band will be present.

EVELEIGH RESIGNS.

THE LATE MR. POIRIER.

The Shediac correspondent of the Moncton Transcript says:

The community received a shock when at noon yesterday, (Wednesday) the sad news became known that A. S. Poirier, one of the town's most highly respected citizens was dead. Mr. Poirier had only been ill since the evening previous to his death, which was due to heart disease. He was fifty-seven years of age and leaves a widow and large family. Mr. Poirier is the third member of this family who has gone to his rest by heart disease. The death of Mr. Poirier leaves only one surviving son of the late Simon Poirier, viz., Hon. Senator Poirier. (The late Mr. Poirier was father of Mrs. (Ald.) McGinn of this city.)

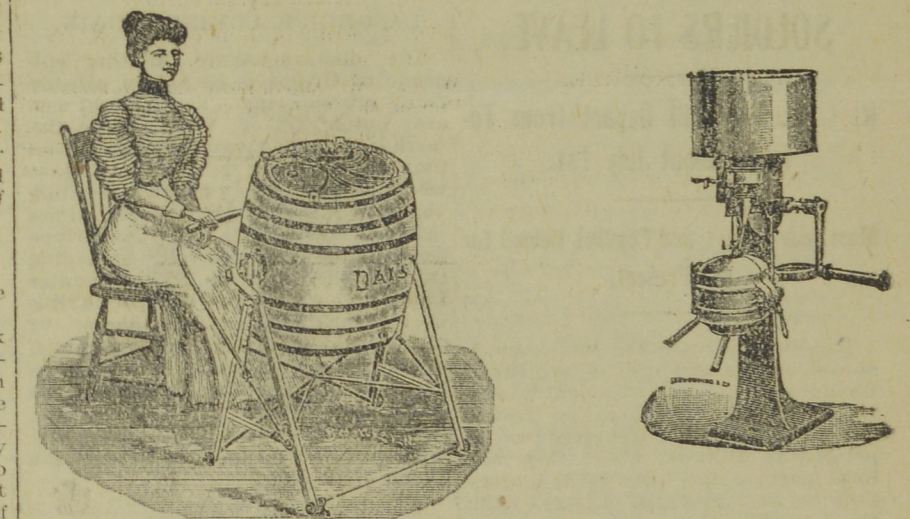
