MONCTONIANS ARE GLAD

That Remedy Has Been Found for Their Bad Tasting Water.

Moncton, March 14. Citizens are rejoicing over the result of an experiment with Dr. Moore's method of ridding the water supply of offensive tastes and odor during the winter months.

For years Moncton water in winter has been a source of trouble on account of its odor and taste, and many citizens would not use it.

Recently correspondence opened with Dr. Moore, physiologist and agriculturist, Washington, who has been experimenting with copper sulphate, in cases similar to Moncton's.

Samples of water were recently sent to Dr. Moore, who reports the trouble due to the existence of a small plant, which is killed by the use of copper sulphate.

An experiment has been tried by the civic authorities, with the result that the odor and bad taste of the water is almost eliminated.

NEW BRUNSWICK LEGISLATURE.

Premier Tweedie Submits Statement of the Cost of Consolidated Statutes.

AUTO BILL RECEIVES CONSIDERATION FROM THE MUNICIPALITIES COMMITTEE.

In the Legislature Tuesday Mr. Osman called attention to the fact that there was a great demand among the Justices of the Peace for copies of the Consolidated Statutes. He suggested to the Premier whether he might not give the matter his consideration with a view to more liberal distribution of these volumes.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie, in reply to Mr. Hazen's enquiry with regard to the cost of the revision and consolidation of the statutes read the following statement.

All the bills have not been paid. A further sum for binding and index is still outstanding.

5,000 copies were printed. 193 copies have been sold and the amount received is \$972.10.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie read the order in council relating to the distribution of the statutes as follows:

COPY ORDER IN COUNCIL, DATED JUNE 28TH, 1904.

The Provincial Secretary reports for the information of the Committee of the Executive Council, that the Consolidated Statutes, 1903, are now ready for distribution, and recommends that the Order in Council be passed;

First, That only those in the list hereinafter named shall receive copies of the Statutes free of charge: The Lieutenant-Governor, 2 copies; Ex-Governor McClellan, 1 copy; the judges of the supreme court, 1 copy; the judges of the county court, 1 copy each; the Clerk of the Peace, 1 copy; leader of the opposition, 2 copies addition; the Auditor General, 1 copy; the heads of departments, 1 copy each; the clerk of the legislative assembly, 1 copy; Clerks of the Peace throughout the Province, 1 copy each; County secretaries, 1 copy each; speaker of the legislative assembly, 1 copy; members of the cabinet, 2 copies each; High Sheriffs, 1 copy each; the commissioners of the consolidation, 2 copies each.

That the King's Printer shall have charge of the said statutes and shall give receipt to the publishers for the number received from time to time as the same are delivered, shall keep the said Statutes in a

safe place, in his own charge, and be solely accountable for them. He shall also enter in a book the names of the persons to whom the statutes have been sent or delivered, as well as those receiving them free of charge or as purchasers.

And the Committee of Council concurring therein.

Mr. Hazen enquired whether the Premier could state how much the bills, still outstanding amounted to.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie—No. These bills are for making the index and have not yet been presented. The information will be given before the end of the session.

House adjourned at four o'clock.

AUTO BILL BEFORE COMMITTEE.

The committee on municipalities met to consider the bill for the registration and identification of motor vehicles, and the use of the public highways by such vehicles.

Mr. King occupied the chair. This is a government bill, which at the instance of the premier had been referred to this committee so that its provisions might be fully discussed, and those interested heard on the subject.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley stated to the committee that he had received a memorial from the municipality of St. John asking for legislation on this subject, and also a copy of a bill that had been prepared by the municipality. He had drawn a new bill that was different in a number of respects from the one he had received. One essential difference was this. The St. John bill provided that where a man was driving a restive horse and an automobile was near the driver of the automobile would be required to stop on the driver of the horse giving a signal by raising his hand. As there would be some difficulty in knowing whether a horse was restive or not, he had thought it better to provide in the bill that any one driving a horse could compel a motor to stop by raising his hand as a signal. This provision might remain in force for two or three years until the horses got used to the motors. He had felt that it would be impossible to shut out motors altogether, and that they would likely be used quite largely in this province in the near future. It was, therefore, advisable that they should be so regulated as not to expose the public to danger.

The bill was then read. It provides that every motor must be registered with the secretary of the department of public works and properly marked so that it can be identified. It likewise provides that every person operating a motor shall be registered and receive a badge, to be worn or him when operating the motor. Stringent regulations with regard to the rate of speed are made. The highest speed allowed in the vicinity of the city, town or village being at the rate of a mile in four minutes. Motors are required to show two lights at night, one white in front and a red in the back. Heavy penalties are imposed for the violation of the law, for the third offence a fine of \$100 and imprisonment for thirty days being the maximum penalty.

After the bill had been read the chairman said that the matter now being before the committee and all persons having been notified it would be best to let the bill lie over for a future day when any one interested in promoting or opposing this bill might be heard. The committee accordingly adjourned to meet at the call of the chairman.
