Dr. Ellis examined carefully and found the vocal chords fully developed and apparently in a normal or nearly normal condition.

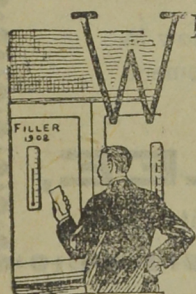
A RAY OF HOPE.

The young woman then told him of the many vain efforts her family had made to have her voice restored, and the hopelessness of the case in the opinion of the specialists. Dr. Ellis still thought his diagnosis correct and told Miss Penny that he believed that if she would try to talk, and keep on trying to talk that she would soon recover the use of her voice.

The physician then instructed Miss Penny in the methods to pursue, and before she left his office she had succeeded in producing sounds which convinced him that there was nothing wrong with the vocal cords.

She became so enthusiastic in her new pastime of learning to talk that whenever she went out to walk she practiced speaking her thoughts aloud. Many persons whom she met stopped and gazed doubtfully after her.

Miss Penny is naturally of a bright and merry disposition, and many of her efforts at speech amused her so much that she broke into laughter. Formerly when she laughed it was only a short wheezy chuckle but she found that since she had begun to speak aloud she had also developed a laughing voice. Dr. Ellis told her that laughing was the very best exercise in the world for limbering up the long disused organs of speech, and from that time one of her regular exercises has been laughing as loud and as long as she could.

A REMARKABLE FEAT.

Dr. Ellis regards the recovery of Miss Penny's voice as one of the most remarkable cases which has come within his medical experience. He refused last night to take any credit to himself for her recovery, and said that the young woman's feat purely by her own volition. The remarkable feature of the case from a medical point of view is that the young woman could have possessed a perfect set of vocal chords for twenty years and never learned to use them.

Miss Penny was born and grew up in South Brooklyn. She attended Public School No. 32, where she showed unusual ability as a scholar. As she could never speak aloud, it was necessary for her teacher to conduct all her recitations in writing. When she grew to young womanhood Miss Penny learned stenography, and she now holds a responsible position with a business house in Manhattan.

EMINENTLY SATISFACTORY.

Bank of British North America Shares in Canadian Progress.

The reports presented at the sixtieth yearly general meeting of the Bank of British North America, held in London, England, March 7th, were of a highly satisfactory character, and entirely in keeping with the strength of the institution, and the general progress of Canada, in which the Bank has played an important part. In his address the chairman, Mr. E. A. Hoare, discussed at some length the record of the year, as well as the statement made in the balance sheet for the last half year. He pointed out that the deposits and current accounts as compared with December, 1903, showed an increase of £314,000, and that 77 per cent. of that amount was in the savings bank department. Notes in circulation showed an increase of £32,000 for the year. An increase of £10,000 was made to the reserve fund. The profits for the year were £96,000, an increase of £8,000 over the previous year.

Optimistic references were made to industrial mining condition in Canada, to the wheat crop, and United States drawback as affording confidence for the future.

NEWFOUNDLAND RETALIATES.

Enforces Bait Act Against Americans Owing to Failure of Treaty.

St. John's, N. F., March 25.--The Newfoundland government has ordered the customs collectors throughout the island to refuse to American fishing vessels licenses to procure bait in colonial waters.

The government intends to introduce legislation at the session of the legislature opening next week, to enforce the bait act against Americans as stringently as it is now enforced against the French because the American senate buried the Bond-Hay treaty.

The advocates of retaliation against Americans say they can make the crusade as effective against Gloucester as they have already made it against St. Pierre.

TO RESTORE SIMPLICITY. Nature Study Promises to Offset Some Artificial Conditions.

A classroom in the Toronto University College Chemical building was filled with an attentive audience on a recent Saturday afternoon, when Dr. J. Fletcher, Dominion Entomologist, Ottawa, lectured on "Nature Study," or, more accurately, gave an exposition of the educational value of nature study, its relation to natural history, and the methods of enlisting the interest and sympathy of young people in "the common sense of common things." Dr. Fletcher, who was introduced by Prof. Ramsay Wright, throughout an hour and a half, held his audience closely, meeting several times with warm applause. He is, however, so fluent and charming a speaker, and so able to communicate the ardor of his convictions, that the event could hardly have been otherwise.

Nature study, he said, was of particular interest to everybody. It was not the fad of the few. Its value had been recognized in the Public Schools during the last decade, where it would take the place of natural history, from which it differed as the foundation from the superstructure, natural history developing out of the studious habits and careful personal observation resultant from nature study. Science was a bugbear to many people. But why? Was not science merely accurate knowledge? Nature study was its handmaid, and might be defined as a careful personal observation of some common natural objects, together with a conscious mental effort to find out all about it. It was possible thus to open up a new and intense pleasure in this glorious and exquisite world, through which the major portion of humanity was passing without seeing it. We were to-day in an exceedingly artificial condition, and nature study promised to restore to us the simplicity we had lost.

Where was the place to study? Here. When was the time to begin? Now. The one handicap was the nomenclature, which, unfortunately, was in an unfamiliar language. In teaching this might be surmounted with children by attracting their interest with beautiful objects, or enlisting their help, as had been done in the schools of Manitoba, where they had been taught to recognize noxious weeds on sight and to destroy them everywhere, on the farm, and by the wayside, and so assist in a work of vital economic importance to the country.

The second part of Dr. Fletcher's address was illustrated with a number of beautiful stereoscopic views of plants and insects and their habitat. The ecology of such objects was a profoundly interesting part of nature study. Ecology, Dr. Fletcher paused to explain, dealt with environment, with the relation and adaptation of plants and animals to their surroundings--everything having its own special locality. Passing rapidly over the several forms of the more common insect pests, he dwelt particularly on the ravages of the codling worm, which destroys half the apples in the world, and of the tussock moth, which is ruining our shade trees. In very emphatic terms he advised that steps be taken during the winter months to destroy the eggs of the moth on our trees, and that the trees be thoroughly sprayed in the early spring. "The effects of nature study," he concluded, "are far-reaching; they extend into every line of work, and bear fruit in quickened thought and accuracy of observation."

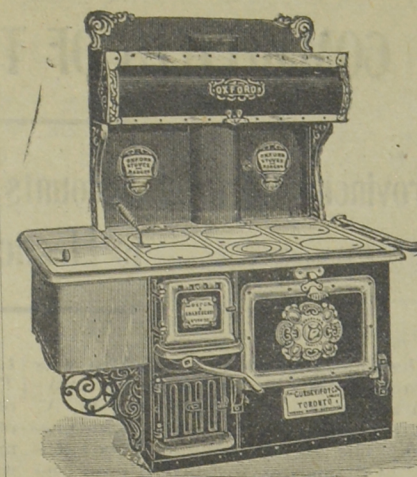

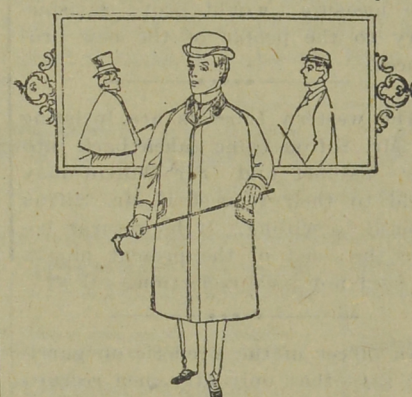
