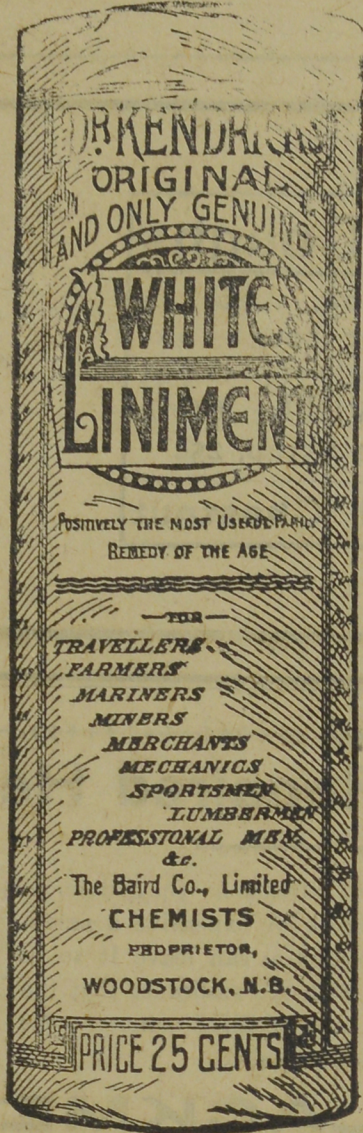




£120 FOR A COAT.

Gorgeous Apparel of a Modern Beau Brummel.

London Daily Mirror: Nine coats and waistcoats, eight pairs of trousers, twelve slips, a fancy canary Beaufort Hunt waistcoat, and a £120 fur overcoat of blue beaver lined with sable mink skins, and having a Persian lambwool collar and cuffs, were included in an unpaid account which was sued for yesterday.

Mr. Cole Hamilton was the modern Beau Brummel from whom the tailors, Messrs. Castle, of Brook street, sought to recover the price of goods sold and delivered.

The defence was that when the £120 overcoat was purchased the defendant was under age.

Evidence was given that the young man was about to be married; when he went to plaintiff's shop and ordered the articles. He had lived in an expensive flat at Victoria, at costly hotels, and at his private place at Maidenhead.

When the young man ordered the coat Messrs. Castle, said their manager, thought he was a relative of the Earl of Zetland, and he gave a firm of solicitors as his reference.

Mr. Justice Grantham: Did you tell him he had a great many more legs than most people as he wanted twenty pair of trousers?

The coat was part of a wedding outfit, and instead of returning it when he could not pay, Mr. Hamilton sold it to a second hand dealer.

His Lordship gave judgment for £120 for the overcoat, and £63, being half of the remainder of the amount claimed.

BOY KILLED AT PLAY.

Was Accidentally Struck With an Axe by a Companion.

London, Ont., March 1.—Charlie Burridge, the thirteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jos. T. Burridge, Riverview Avenue, South London, died this morning from injuries received while at play yesterday afternoon. Burridge, with three companions, of whom one was George Fox, fourteen years old, had erected a snow fort and on this Burridge was making an attack when he was struck on the right side of the head above the ear with an axe held by Fox, who was "defending" the fort. The wounding of Burridge, however, was purely accidental, the axe having slipped from Fox's hand as the latter gave it a swing. Burridge was rendered unconscious and in this condition he remained until three o'clock this morning, when death occurred.

MAY NEVER ACT AGAIN.

Sir Henry Irving Breaks Down from Overwork.

Wolverhampton, Feb. 27.—Sir Henry Irving's condition tonight is practically unchanged from the morning. The patient himself is brave and hopeful. The attending physician told the Associated Press that Sir Henry is completely run down, and that it is impossible at present to make any safe prediction concerning the prospects of reappearance on the stage.

Sir Henry Irving is occupying a

suite in the old-fashioned Star and Garter hotel, where he stopped half a century ago, when he was beginning his professional career. Two trained nurses and physicians are in constant attendance upon him. It was hoped that the improvement in his condition would enable him to travel to London on Sunday next; but tonight this is not thought to be possible. As soon as he is able to leave his bed he will go to the south coast.

Sympathy and interest in Sir Henry's condition is world-wide, as is shown by the number of telegrams and cable despatches which he has received, while groups of local sympathetic admirers and visitors are gathered all day long in the narrow streets in front of the hotel. One of his doctors told the Associated Press tonight that Sir Henry's condition is the result of overwork at his age, combined with a continuous round of entertainment at every place he has visited during this, his last provincial tour.

The messages of sympathy include cablegrams from Jos. Jefferson, Richard Mansfield, Sir Chas. Wyndham, the Lotus Club of New York, and the Bohemian Club of San Francisco.
