DR. CHOWN'S LECTURE.

Temperance and Moral Reform Ably Discussed.

Temperance and Moral Reform was the subject of an interesting lecture delivered last night by Rev. Dr. Chown in the vestry of the Methodist church. Rev. Dr. Rogers occupied the chair, and after singing and prayer by Rev. Jas. Crisp, introduced the speaker as one of the church's special men set apart by General Conference for this special work.

Dr. Chown, who is a most pleasing speaker, dealt with his important theme as a man who keenly felt its importance. Man's responsibility was dealt with, and no man reaches the point intended by his Maker until he is touched by the Holy Ghost. He explained the character and extent of his work, which requires him to be travelling almost continuously through Canada. Dr. Chown discussed the labor question, the effects upon mankind of gambling, whether in the social game of Pitt or in a stock exchange. His chief effort was put forth on the temperance question. Everything is coming our way, said he, and the licensed victuallers' association are looking for a way of escape. Its members are asking the government to frame a law to prohibit the sale of liquor to minors, and are also pressing upon the authorities their great issue of compensation.

The lecture was greatly enjoyed and the exercises were brought to a close with the National Anthem and benediction from Rev. Joseph Parkins. Miss Rogers presided at the piano during the evening.

MRS. MEDLEY'S ESTATE.

Reported That Victoria Hospital has not Been Forgotten.

The bulk of the valuable estate left by the late Mrs. Medley will under the terms of the late Metropolitan, go to the two sons of the late Metropolitan, who reside in England. The executors of the late Bishop's will were Mrs. Medley, the late Geo. A. Schofield of St. John, and his son, Rev. John Beacon Medley, who resides in Eng. and.

The Bishop's estate was probated at \$35,700; all except \$2,500 being personal property. This was exclusive of a life insurance policy of \$1,000. Under the terms of the will Mr. T. C. Allen, K. C., has power, on the death of Mrs. Medley to sell Bishopscote, the homestead, and divide the property among the heirs.

Mrs. Medley was in possession of considerable property in her own right, and it is understood that the bulk of it has been willed to Mrs. Butler, of Kingston, Ont. It is said that a generous bequest amounting to a sum close to \$2,000 has been made to Victoria Hospital, and it is reported that several lady friends of the deceased in this city have also been remembered.
