TWO EMINENT PREACHERS.

Neither President Roosevelt nor ex-President Cleveland are recognized as preachers, but both these eminent citizens of the United States spoke at religious gatherings on Sunday, the former at Washington, and the latter at Philadelphia, and the words they addressed to their audiences were well worthy the attention received.

Mr. Roosevelt delivered his message at the rededication of a Lutheran church in the capital, occupying the pulpit, and his plea was for Christian harmony.

"It is an important thing," said the president, "for the people of this nation to remember their rights, but it is an even more important thing for them to remember their duties. In the last analysis the work of statesmen and soldiers, the work of the public man, shall go for nothing if it is not based on the spirit of Christianity working in the millions of homes throughout this country, so that there may be that social, that spiritual, that moral foundation, without which no country can ever rise to permanent greatness. For material well being, material prosperity, success in arts, in letters, great industrial triumphs, all of them and all of the structure raised thereon, will be as evanescent as a dream if it does not rest on the righteousness that exalteth a nation."

"Let me congratulate you and congratulate all of us that we live in a land and at a time when we accept it as natural that this should be an inter-denominational service of thanksgiving, in which the pastors of other churches join to congratulate you upon the rebuilding of this church."

"One of the constant problems of life is to try to cultivate breadth without shallowness, just as we want to cultivate depth without narrowness. It seems to me our good fortune that men have been able to combine fervor in doing the Lord's work with charity toward their brethren who do it with certain differences in the non-essentials."

"The forces of evil are strong and mighty in this century and in this country, as they are in other countries, as they have been in all the past centuries; and the people who sincerely wish to do the Lord's work will find ample opportunity for all their labor in fighting the common enemy and in assuming toward their fellows of a different confession an attitude of generous rivalry in the effort to see how the most good can be done to our people as a whole."

Mr. Cleveland's sermon was addressed to a large gathering of Y. M. C. A. workers at Philadelphia on "Christianity," and among other things he said:

"It is not worth while to blink at the fact that, without going far from home, we can gain a hint that nations called civilized and even Christian are liable under strong temptation to backslide to barbaric standards which permit war and slaughter to count for a people's greatness and reckon ruthless conquests among glorious deeds."

"There is one effective and constant preventive against such danger and that is the sincere acceptance as guidance to the National behavior, of the honor, the love of peace, the devotion to justice and truth, the forbearance and inviolable good faith which grew out of genuine civilization and Christian spirit."

"No stream runs higher than its source; and a government by the people will be no better than the people make it. If these qualities are to be recognized as guides of national conduct under our plan of rule, the people must command it of their public servants, and they must support their command by manifesting in their individual lives and relationships their own thorough submission to such guidance."

A BACKWARD STEP.

The temperance and prohibition electors of Ontario cannot congratulate themselves on improving the

prospects of their pet hobby by the exchange of Ross for Whitney.

The former has been a total abstainer all his life and prominent in the temperance ranks, while Mr. Whitney takes a drop of Scotch, and has never been identified with temperance work.

Ross was willing to introduce a prohibitory measure, but was controlled by his party and could not move in that direction.

Mr. Whitney is opposed to prohibition, and has publicly stated so. Yet the temperance men united with the liquor interests to put Ross out and Whitney in, a peculiar combination, but one that proved very effective on election day.

A St. John policeman charges a citizen with calling the officer "a red faced lobster," a very serious offence and one which cannot be overlooked. Now if the cop had been dubbed a white faced lobster he probably would not have strenuously objected, but taken in connection with the citizen's other observation that the cop liked free beer, the extent of the original insult is obvious.

"The Liberal party do not want to win elections by tampering with ballot-boxes, and men who practise such methods are not wanted in our ranks, neither does our cause require the support of such men," was the emphatic declaration of Hon. H. R. Emmerson at the Montreal banquet in his honor, and this sentiment will be re-echoed by every honest Liberal in Canada.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson's optimistic and eloquent speech before the Montreal Reform Club, is published on the Herald's first page today, and will repay careful perusal. New Brunswick's popular cabinet minister was given a very cordial reception by the members of the club, embracing many of the leading business and professional men of Montreal.

The funny fellow of the Montreal Herald is pleased to observe that Dr. Pyne, M. P. P., of Toronto, with a majority of 2,300, looks quite spruce, and that he reduced his opponent to pulp. Would the birch be out of place for the joker, and should not his fir be made to fly for perpetrating such a monstrosity?

The Ontario government, so badly beaten in the general election last week, have companions in misery. The Austrian government has just come back from the people very badly shattered, after having been in power continuously since 1867—five years longer than the Ontario administration.

Mr. Whitney's drop of Scotch in a Napanee hotel during prohibited hours, does not appear to have injured him with the temperance people who united with the liquor dealers to put Ross out and Whitney in.

The big exposition to be held at Portland, Oregon, is to be kept open on Sundays, this agreement having been reached after a conference between the clergymen of the city and the exposition managers.

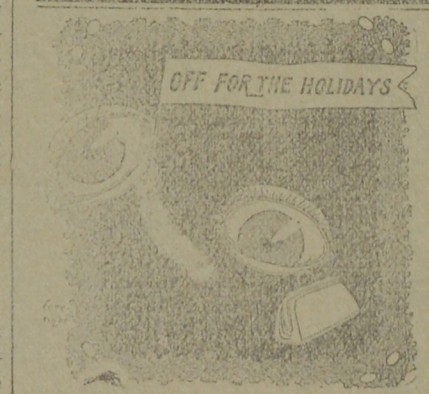
It is expected that the New Brunswick legislative session will open Feb. 23rd or March 2nd.

BITS OF NEWS.

A contract has been awarded for the construction of an electric line of railway to connect Montreal and Ottawa.

It is reported that the C. P. R. have purchased the Esquimalt & Nanaimo Railway from Mr. James Dunsmuir.

The Holy Synod of Russia has addressed a circular to the orthodox adjuring the people to render obedience to the Emperor and the authorities.



Lord Milner, High Commissioner for South Africa, expects to leave Johannesburg next April, by which time it is believed that his successor will have been appointed.

The property owners of Edmonton, N. W. T., have carried a bye-law to grant a bonus of \$100,000 to the Grand Trunk Pacific for the establishment of shops and a Union depot. The vote was 80 to 13.

W. S. Loggie, M. P., is pressing on Hon. Mr. Emmerson the desirability of making Newcastle a divisional point on the I. C. R., and a meeting of the Newcastle board of trade has been called to back up the proposition.

The Robert Simpson Co., Limited, of Toronto, who recently acquired the business of John Murphy & Co., of Montreal, have purchased a parcel of real estate adjoining the Murphy building for \$52,000, equivalent to \$15 per square foot.

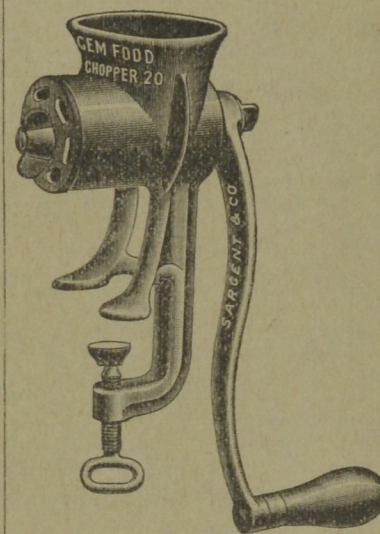
