

THE GREATEST YET.

Russians and Japs Lining up for Decisive Battle.

BOTH ARMIES STRONGLY REINFORCED.

And Approaching Fight Will Probably Stagger Humanity.

CZAR'S TROOPS WILL MAKE DESPERATE ATTEMPT

To Avenge the Fall of Port Arthur.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Mukden, Feb. 1.—Cannonading on the centre right commenced again to-day.

The Russian army reoccupy their old positions, having returned from Sanchiapu, (Sandepas).

The main events in the interior of Russia have been published in the official army paper, and the troops, to a certain extent, realize the present conditions.

The plans of the army, however, are entirely independent of home events.

A large part of the wounded are being cared for in Mukden hospitals. The incoming trains are filled and the red cross corps is active.

Great Battle Pending.

Gen. Oku's headquarters via Tien Tsin, Feb. 1.—After three months' inaction there is now a prospect that the armies of Gen. Kuropatkin and Field Marshal Oyama will join in the greatest battle of the war.

For days past the Russians have quietly been massing troops on Gen. Oku's left towards the centre.

The Japanese have not replied to the cannonade, awaiting the attack, but the Russians, who have been heavily reinforced, believe that they have numerous divisions along the Shakhe river.

The Japanese have also increased everything and are ready for the greatest conflict yet known to history.

The movement on the part of the Russians indicates a desire to strike soon in a desperate attempt to avenge the fall of Port Arthur.

Probably the revolutionary outbreak in Russia determined General Kuropatkin to make a desperate effort to gain a victory, but the utter failure of the recent cavalry raid on the railroad shows the futility of further attempts of that kind.

With the ground frozen, the troops' advance has been made under great difficulty in entrenching to secure cover.

The advantage of the situation is entirely with the army on the defensive. The ground is covered with snow and if a battle is fought it would be over a plain, south, and the sun would be of no advantage to either side.

Recent Losses.

Mukden, Feb. 1.—There is another lull in the fighting, but it is impossible to tell how long it will last. The Russian losses the last few days were about 10,000. Many of the bodies of the killed have not yet been gathered. Lieut. General Stackelberg's corps was the heavier loser. The Japanese losses, according to Chinese reports, also were heavy. The Russians took about 500 prisoners. The Japanese forces on the Russian right were originally about 10,000, who were routed and panic-stricken, but afterwards they were strongly reinforced from the Japanese right.

General Mistchenko's wound is serious, a bullet having fractured his knee joint.

General Kondratvitch was shot through the lungs, and the bullet lodged in his spine, whence it has been extracted. His chief of staff, Colonel Andrief, was severely wounded in the head.
