AFTER TRAIN ROBBERS.

Hunting the Bandits of the Silverdale Affair.

THE BIG REWARD OFFERED KEEPS DETECTIVES ON THE HUNT FOR TRAIN ROBBERS.

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 31.—Death alone can make the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Pinkertons give up the chase after the robbers who held up the Pacific express at Silverdale, this province, last October. The \$5,000 reward still holds good, the company says it will never drop the pursuit till the men are caught, and the Pinkertons—well, they never say die.

A day or two after the hold-up a police man confidentially told the reporters that he believed the famous Bill Miner, alias Bill Morgan, was the leader of the gang, and the Pinkertons hold that view to this day, for they are now seeking Miner in the "Hole in the Wall," Wyoming. In that favorite refuge of bad men they think they will find him and the two men who assisted in the hold-up, whom they believe to be "Erico Scotty," alias "Curley," and "Tall Mac," alias "Ben Leonard."

The Pinkerton men are pretty sure of their facts before they let the public into such details as these given. They have information that "Erico Scotty" and "Tall Mac" were around here just before the time of the robbery, after having worked in Bellingham. They suppose that these men erroneously jumped to the conclusion—from reading a sensational article in a sensational local paper—that a big sum of gold was to be brought down from Cariboo on the day they chose for the hold-up. Feeling that the affair required a directing mind the pair got Miner across the line. As it happened the gold from Cariboo was not on the train. There is more offered as a reward for the capture of the thieves than they got as booty.

Miner is a man with a remarkable record as a daring criminal, and the Pinkertons, if they corner him in the "Hole in the Wall," will face a man who will stop at nothing to resist arrest. In 1876 he held up a stage in California; in 1880 he was one of the chiefs of a band of outlaws that terrorized Colorado. Next he appeared in Michigan as a confidence man, and when things got too hot for him, returned to his old stamping-grounds, where robbery under arms was his only occupation. Of course, he made acquaintance with many jails, and he was only released from San Quentin in 1901, after serving a term for a hold-up.

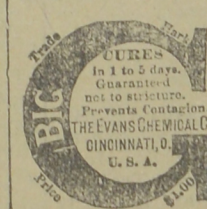
