The Steamer Aberdeen to be Offered for Sale by Tender.

ANNUAL MEETING OF FREDERICTON AND WOODSTOCK STEAM-BOAT COMPANY.

The regular annual meeting of the Fredericton and Woodstock Steamboat Company was held at the office of Mr. J. H. Barry, K. C., this morning and was well attended. Those present were Messrs. James S. Neill, George T. Whelpley, James A. Bell, J. H. Barry, K. C., and Joseph Walker of this city, Williamson Fisher of Woodstock, H. W. Shaw of Hawkebury, Conn. E. R. Brooks of Southampton, Conn. M. B. McNally of Queensbury, and Robert Scott of Damfries.

The directors submitted a report covering last season's operations, showing that a satisfactory business had been done. The report showed that the Aberdeen had made twenty-four regular trips to Woodstock.

The following board of directors was re-elected: Messrs. J. S. Neill, John Palmer, G. T. Whelpley, Fredericton; Williamson Fisher, Woodstock; Robert Scott, Damfries; M. B. McNally, Queensbury; E. R. Brooks, Southampton.

At a subsequent meeting of the directors held immediately after the general meeting Mr. Neill was re-elected president, and J. H. Barry, K. C., secretary-treasurer.

It was decided to offer the steamer Aberdeen for sale by tender, and the secretary was instructed to prepare an advertisement to that effect. Tenders will close on February 21st. No action has yet been taken in regard to the building of a new boat.
